RAIL SHARES SWING UPWARD

Standard Investment Value Moves Ahead

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, May 22.—Rail shares swung into the upward procession in today's session, giving the forward movement an increasingly healthy aspect. Standard investment shares of the caliber of New York Central, Canadian Pacific, Delaware & Hudson, Lackawanna, Atchafalaya and Reading moved ahead almost in unison. Active buying also took place in Frisco common, Southern Railway, Pittsburgh and West Virginia and in the shares of the various other roads whose earnings record in recent years entitle them to classification as business investments.

As a whole the market enjoyed the greatest freedom from irregularity it has known in several months. Some profit taking naturally developed in the late afternoon, but this was offset by the sustained upward tendencies in various groups.

See General Strength In Futures In Grain

CHICAGO, May 22.—General strength was shown in grain futures on the Chicago board of trade today. Poor crop prospects were the dominating influence in wheat that created sufficient buying to bring about substantial gains. Attention of the trade was centered on crop complaints from every direction over the wheat belt. Lack of moisture is affecting the northwest spring crop. The southwest needs warmer weather.

Corn borrowed its strength from wheat. Most of the day the market lagged. Toward the close commission house buying rallied prices. Spot oats was firm despite sale of 450,000 bushels for export. Foreigners bought late, causing rally in provisions.
