

STUDENTS TAKE EXACTING ROLES

Final Recital Is Held At Gymnasium

Excellent Musical Program Given In Connection With One Act Playlets

Dramatic interpretation of roles difficult enough to demonstrate the progress which the students have made toward mastering the spoken art during their year's work, but with those roles so well taken as to provide pleasing entertainment for the mixed audience which attended, featured the final recital of the public speaking class of the Bend high school Friday evening at the school gymnasium.

The most diverting of the three one act plays was the first, "The Maker of Dreams," both because of its fantastic setting and situations, and because of the excellent acting of those who took part.

Wilma Bennett as the volatile but

wistful Pierrette had a role which was not so difficult to enact as to sustain, but she did both with remarkable ability. Stuart Rae's interpretation of the self important and undiscerning Pierrot was even better, and his revelation of the characteristic mountebank traits was especially pleasing. Michael Mahoney took the role of the Maker of Dreams in a manner which brought out all of its possibilities.

Play Advanced

In "Rosalind," the students sought to portray characters and situations which were distinctly beyond the scope of any players of their ages, the role of Rosalind being one which only a great actress of considerable maturity could interpret fully; yet the play was pleasingly presented and served admirably to reveal the advancement which the students have made toward mastery of such difficult subjects. Mary Bennett played the dual role, subtle and at the same time overwhelmingly dramatic, of Rosalind. Her work was the best of the entire evening's program. Frieda Jaeger and Ray Solberg were pleasing in the less exacting roles.

Audrey Smith as the clerk was the outstanding character in "The Florist Shop," revealing perfectly the tender friendliness which, results prove, is a business asset when it is genuine.

Thelma Thompson played the part of the spinster, Stuart Rae that of the dilatory fiancee, Erick Moeller

the short sighted and exettable proprietor and Lucien McLaughlin the messenger boy, all with exceptional ability.

Large Crowd Attends

The three plays were directed by Mrs. Blanche Drake, instructor of the dramatics class, and their excellence was a tribute to the training which she has given those who took part.

The high school orchestra played several well appreciated numbers, and Mrs. J. O. Gillfillan and Fred Dallas, with Ethel Gillfillan as accompanist, played a violin duet which drew much applause.

The auditorium was filled almost to its seating capacity for the recital.

Coach Picks Mack Club for League Pennant

NEW YORK, May 23.—"Connie Mack has organized a team of Philadelphia Athletics as potentially strong as the champions he disbanded in 1914 because they were too good, and he'll win the American league pennant sure," a veteran American league coach said here today.

"I'm not working for the Athletics and I might get a call from the boss if he heard I was going around plugging for them, but by this time it certainly is no state secret that the Athletics are not a flash and that they are up there to stay," he said.

"Mack has everything that a championship team needs—young, hustling players, smart players, well schooled; fine pitching and a winning spirit. In Cochrane, the former college star, he has the best catcher in baseball. He is the one new player who has really made the team."

"Harris, Gray and Rommell are the best working trio of pitchers in the league and they will have another one in Lefty Groves, who has had a hard time getting started. Mack found he was too nervous to start a game and he's getting him cooled off by working him as a relief pitcher."

"I can't see the Yankees at all. The White Sox can't keep up their pace. The Tigers are shot with an infield weakness, and the Senators haven't the real class to go over the entire route with the throttle open."

"From what I have seen of the National league teams, and our paths have crossed several times, the Giants are a cinch for the pennant. With better pitching than they have had in years, the club does not lack a thing."

The race was won by James Butler's Sting, which was conceded 14 pounds by the Vanderbilt gelding. A. C. Bostwick's Shuffle Along was second and William Daniel's Saranader third.

Earl Sande rode Sarazen, which carried 128 pounds and was made a favorite in the betting. The popular jockey got his mount up in the first half of the mile race and was leading coming into the stretch, when Brauning shot Sting up from fourth place to win the race.

Crook County Streams Get Fall River Trout

Eastern Brook trout from the Fall river eyeing station are being distributed this week in various streams of Crook county. Before the work is completed, approximately 300,000 young trout will be planted. The Crook county stream now being restocked are the north fork of Crooked river, Ochoco creek and Deep creek. Young trout are also being planted in the Ochoco reservoir. Most of the eggs hatched at Fall river were taken at Crane prairie.
