

NORSEMEN FEAR WHEN AMUNDSEN SENDS NO WORD

Arctic Weather Bad, Is Latest Report

MAY HAVE WAITED

Explorer Would Have Re-
mained At Pole Until Ob-
servations Possible

OSLO, May 25.—Four days have now passed and Captain Roald Amundsen and his American colleague, Lincoln Ellsworth, have not yet returned to civilization from their attempt to reach the north pole by airplane.

Many "experts" claimed Amundsen would still return, but some Norsemen feared differently.

Adding to the spirit of pessimism was a report indicating that the Arctic weather was bad. There had been reports yesterday of a snowstorm, then it was reported there had been an improvement, but now come fresh stories of unfavorable conditions.

THEORIES VARIED

COPENHAGEN, May 25.—Arctic experts clung today to the theory that the north would still send back Captain Roald Amundsen and his polar air pioneers.

Captain Peter Freuchen, who knows well the terrors of the Arctic, told the United Press that he believed the reason for the long delay in return of the expedition might be the bad weather reported from the northland.

"No observations can be taken around the pole except in sunshine and over a period of 24 hours," he pointed out, "and such observations are necessary if Amundsen, on returning, wishes to furnish absolute proof that he has been at the pole. He has fuel for 2,600 kilometers and food for 30 days. Furthermore, it is necessary to allow some time for sleeping, as one is scarcely able to work more than 40 hours at a stretch."

Landing Conditions Good

Colonel Jorck, chief of the Danish army aviation service, who has been as far north of 83.5 degrees, opined that conditions for landing at the pole had been excellent. He thought the Norwegian would continue on to Alaska, as this would afford an opportunity for exploration of the polar ocean, which Amundsen several times has said he would like to map.

TEACHER INDICTED ON EVOLUTION LAW

Trial to Test Tennessee Stat-
ute to Be July 10

DAYTON, Tenn., May 25.—John T. Scopes, science teacher and foot-
ball coach of the Dayton high school, was indicted by the Rhea county grand jury today in the first test case against Tennessee's anti-evolution law.

The true bill was based on evidence furnished by students who took science courses under Scopes at the last term. The opening date of the trial was tentatively set for July 10.

Both sides anticipated the grand jury's verdict and have gone ahead with plans for the trial. The question involved is whether a state, having police powers can forbid the teaching in its public schools of anything the legislature considered harmful to Christian morals. Whatever the outcome of the trial, it is certain to be carried to the United States supreme court.

For the purpose of establishing a test case, Scopes was induced to violate the law.

Train Wreck Results In League Game Delay

Outing of Cascadians Features Three Peaks

May Attempt to Scale All
of Sisters, Announced

Washington Club In Plans for Sum-
mer Trip, Interested By
Hodge Volcano Theory

The Cascadians, mountaineering club of Washington, will establish their annual summer camp this year on the west side of the middle Sister, about six miles from Frog camp, near the McKenzie highway, according to information received from W. E. Richardson, president of the organization.

"Members are very desirous of attempting all three peaks if possible, and it is for this reason that the camp mentioned was selected," writes Richardson to the Bend Commercial club. "Green lake, lying south and east of South Sister, is too far from the other peaks to make ascents feasible without a temporary outlying camp."

"Weather conditions and time permitting, a trip will be made around South Sister to Green lake and to Broken Top. We expect to do as much glacier work and general exploration as time will permit," continues Richardson. "Plans call for camp from August 3 to 15." It was recommended to the Cascadians that they establish their camp west of the summit.

"We very much appreciate your calling to our attention the article by Dr. Edwin T. Hodge in the Oregonian. This has come to our notice and we have taken the liberty of quoting him in the annual bulletin on the summer outing."

"We very much appreciate the efforts you have made to furnish us with information making possible our summer outing in the Three Sisters region, and regret that it does not seem feasible to come via Bend," Richardson extends an invitation to the local commercial club secretary to visit the camp of the Cascadians.

Road Connecting With Albany Held Possibility

Funds to Be Made Available for Survey of Santiam
Pass Route, Says Congressman Hawley

Hailed as the first step in the plan to connect Central Oregon and the Albany country by a modern highway, giving the mid state region two routes over the mountains to the Willamette valley, funds for the survey of the Santiam road from Cascadia ranger station to Fish lake are being made available.

This is the information contained in the Albany Democrat, which prints a letter from Congressman W. C. Hawley.

"Yesterday I had a conference with the district forester in Portland regarding the survey of the Santiam road from the Cascadia ranger station to Fish lake, and prompt attention was promised," Hawley wired.

"This morning I am advised by District Forester Granger that arrangements are being made with the bureau of public roads for the survey of the section of the road in question as soon as possible." How soon the work will start is not stated, but it is presumed that the survey will be completed this summer.

"It is considered that the ordering of this survey will mean reconstruction by the government of the Cascadia-Fish lake road in the near future," states the Albany paper. "Once this section is completed, the next step toward completion of the entire road across the mountains will be a natural consequence, for the remaining distance will be comparatively short and construction problems comparatively simple."

The proposed route from Fish lake on over the summit involves a new road from the lake to Hog pass and thence into Deschutes county down the eastern slope to a point of intersection with the present Santiam road. This plan would avoid Sand mountain. Just where the proposed trans mountain highway is to connect with the Central Oregon highways is problematical.

Plans for a connective highway over the Cascades between the Santiam country and Central Oregon were outlined at an inter community meeting held in Bend last year. A large delegation of Linn county people, from Albany, Lebanon and other towns, attended the meeting in the Pilot Butte Inn. The Linn county country and various commercial clubs are backing the connective highway.

An item of \$1,200 has been set aside in the Linn county budget for the purpose of aiding the proposed survey and this will now be made available to the government.

Ownership of One Animal Causes Battle

SURVIVOR IS HELD

Claims Murphy's Head Hit
Rock—Brother Charges
Rifle Was Used

KLAMATH FALLS, May 25.—A fight between Timothy Murphy and Frank Way, sheep herders, over the ownership of a little black sheep was fatal to the former, according to a story told by deputy sheriffs today.

Way was being held in jail pending investigation of the case.

According to the account of the fight obtained from Way by authorities, it occurred after the two had been dividing a flock of more than 1,000 sheep which they owned jointly. They disagreed on the possession of the black sheep.

It was in the isolated Devil's Garden country that they dismounted from their horses and began their encounter. Flats flew and blood streamed in the battle—a typical story book fight for any sage brush country.

Head Hit Rock

Twice Murphy went down but returned in the fray. Then under a terrible blow he fell, his head striking a rock. Murphy was done.

Way then helped Murphy on his horse, he told authorities. Murphy rode away towards his own camp. Just as he reached it he tumbled into the arms of his brother, Frank Murphy, and within a few hours he was dead.

Frank Murphy told authorities that his brother said Way hit him with a rifle. An investigation by the coroner here showed Murphy died of a fractured skull.

Three Meet Death In Garage Flames

One Fell Asleep While He
Smoked, Thought Cause

MARTINEZ, Cal., May 25.—Three men were burned to death as they slept early today on a ranch six miles south of here.

The dead:
Joseph Azevedo, 19, Concord truck driver.

James Greppan, 45, Concord truck driver.

George Jones, Oakland, painter.

The fire, occurring on the Parmelee dairy ranch, under lease to Alfred Brown, was discovered by Brown in a two story garage building, on the upper floor of which the men were sleeping. He attempted to rouse them, but received no response.

The garage, five automobiles, a tractor and a milk house and machinery were destroyed in the blaze, with an estimated loss of \$25,000.

Origin of the fire is undetermined, although it is presumed one of the men fell asleep while smoking.

To Execute Communists For Cathedral Outrage

DECLARE CAMPAIGN ON FADDIST CURES

Gland "Cures" to Be Con-
trolled, Says Speaker

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 25.—A campaign against "fads, cults and fallacies" which impose upon the public worthless "cures" for diseases, was recommended here today by Dr. Frederick C. Warnshuis of Grand Rapids, Mich., speaking before the American Medical association. Wide publicity for scientific medicine was the most effective weapon against such methods, Dr. Warnshuis said.

"The public should remember," he said, "that scientific medicine has no secrets that it withholds. That which benefits the public also benefits us."

Dr. Oscar Dowling of New Orleans, chairman of the board of trustees, said that during the past year "gland cures" had been more extensively exploited than any other pharmaceutical product. The association, he added, was giving special attention to control of these products.

Finds Check for \$20.00 He Drew 20 Years Ago

Discovered In Campground,
Had Never Been Cashed

C. H. Erickson At A Loss to Explain
Payment Intended for J. J.
Allen In 1905

An uncashed check made out 20 years ago, on April 1, 1905, to the order of J. J. Allen was found the latter part of last week in the local auto camp grounds. The check, made out by C. H. Erickson, was on the Central Oregon Banking & Trust Co. "Bend, Crook county, Oregon," preceded the date.

It is certain that the check, made out for approximately \$29 and endorsed by Allen, was not cashed because it did not bear the cancelling stamp by a bank or clearing house. Also, it had not been pierced by a spindle. The check did not bear any of the ear marks of age, being well preserved.

How the check found a temporary resting place in the auto camp grounds is rather a mystery. Since it was well preserved, it is evident, in the opinion of persons who have seen the check, that it had not been carried in some person's pocket.

Erickson, who made out the check more than 20 years ago, lives at 1522 Hill street, directly across the highway from the camp grounds.

Announcement of the resignation of L. Antles, secretary of the Bend Commercial club for the past four and one-half years, was made today. The resignation is effective the end of the present week.

Antles goes from Bend to Roseburg, where he has accepted the secretaryship of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce. Antles originally planned to report for duty in Roseburg June 1, but has been granted an extension of time.

As local commercial club secretary, Antles has been active in the readjustment work in Bend—work made necessary by the rapid growth of the city and agricultural development in adjacent communities. In his work as secretary, Antles has been assisted by Miss Nell Markel.

Antles came to Bend from Denver, Colorado. For a number of years he was commercial club secretary at Grand Junction, Colorado. Antles succeeds W. E. Holbein as secretary of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce. Holbein goes from Roseburg to Pocatello, Idaho. Mrs. Antles, a member of the Bend high school faculty for a number of years, will accompany her husband to Roseburg.

The probable successor to Antles as secretary of the Bend Commercial club is L. K. Cramb, formerly city editor of the Klamath Falls News. He has had 12 years experience in newspaper work and some 10 years experience in commercial club work. Cramb is well acquainted with the state, especially with that part east of the Cascade. He was formerly in Baker.

Man's life is a composite picture of the choices he has made from babyhood until life ends, each choice related to the last one, Rev. James said in introducing his subject, "Building a Life," and the sermon throughout was marked by equally vivid illustrations. The speaker took for his text the advice given by Paul: "Whatsoever things are true, whatsoever things are lovely, think on these things."

Accomplishment depends on the individual's ideals, and ideals depend upon vision, the minister declared. Whatever one strives for he attains, said the speaker. "For one transcendent moment."

The graduating class, numbering 58 seniors, marched in, while Mrs. J. J. Schwendker played a processional march, and occupied seats at the front of the auditorium. The invocation, led by Rev. James, was followed by the singing of De Koven's arrangement of Kipling's "Recessional," by the high school girls' glee club, with Miss Alice Wood, director, at the piano. Rev. R. Bogstad, pastor of the Lutheran church, read from the scriptures, after which Fred Dallas, with Ethel Gillfillan at the piano, played a violin solo, "Meditation."

Following the sermon Rev. Bogstad pronounced the benediction and Mrs. Schwendker played the recessional march while the graduating class marched out, the rest of the audience standing until they had gone.

Native Born Japanese Can't Become Citizens

Service With U. S. Military
Forces Doesn't Help

Chief Justice Taft Dissents In Op-
inion Handed Down By Su-
preme Court Today

WASHINGTON, May 25.—A native born Japanese is not eligible to become an American citizen by having served in the military forces of the United States, the supreme court ruled today.

A Massachusetts federal court decision holding that Midemitsu Toyota was not eligible for naturalization, although he had served in the United States coast guard from 1913 until 1923, should be affirmed, the court said. A circuit court of appeals had asked for the ruling to decide the appeal.

The case involved a unique conflict of laws. Congress in 1913 passed a law providing that "any person of foreign birth who served in the military forces of the United States during the present war" may acquire naturalization under the rulings of the 1906 citizenship law for aliens. The 1906 law and previous naturalization laws permitted the extension of citizenship only to persons of the white and black races.

Toyota was naturalized on his application in 1921, but the court subsequently revoked his first naturalization papers.

Chief Justice Taft dissented. Justice Butler read the decision.

Willamette Claims One When Canoe Turns Over

PORTLAND, May 25.—Mrs. Emma Cyr, 50, a nurse, was drowned in the Willamette river Sunday while canoeing with her 14 year old son, Raymond. The boy swam to a sewer pipe and clung to it until he was rescued. It was the first fatality of the boating season here.

Armistice Day Disliked For Second Defense Test

WASHINGTON, May 25.—Formal disapproval of the war department's selection of Armistice day for the holding of a second defense test and a recommendation by President Coolidge that it be held on July 4, were announced by the White House today.

Cartridge Jams

Wound Not Dangerous

Turnbull is a painter, and has recently been employed on the Pilot Butte Inn addition. He was rooming at the Inn annex, and it was through finding an empty cartridge carton in his room that the officers made certain that he was the man who had shot Francis.

Before coming to Bend about eight months ago, Turnbull followed his trade of painter at Baker. He has been a mining prospector at some time, articles found in his room disclosed.

Officer Francis is resting easily at his home. The wound is painful but the bone was not touched and he will be able to resume his duties within a short time.

Fred Merrill Conviction Upheld By Higher Court

BULLET STRIKES POLICE OFFICER IN NIGHT FIGHT

Jack Turnbull Subdued When Gun Fails Him

MONEY SAVES BONE

Fugitive, After Firing At
E. J. Francis, Taken By
H. Selde and Mayor Fox

Captain Jack Francis of the Bend police force and Jack Turnbull, painter and "bad man," are both laid up with flesh wounds in the leg today as the result of pistol battles early Sunday morning. Neither injury is serious.

About 12:20 o'clock Turnbull, who had been drinking, had an altercation with V. M. White, in the alley back of the Cashman building. White went to the police station and complained that Turnbull would not let him have his automobile.

Francis went to investigate, and as he approached, Turnbull began firing at him. Francis advanced steadily, drawing his own revolver and firing the five loads which it contained at Turnbull, but did not hit him. Turnbull shot Francis in the leg, then disappeared.

The rest of the police force and Mayor R. H. Fox spent the next several hours hunting for Turnbull, finally locating him near the railroad station, where it is believed he planned to board the freight train, which was just pulling down to the station when the officers arrived there. Turnbull had shaved off his mustache, apparently with a view to avoiding arrest.

Mayor Fox, unarmed, approached Turnbull and attempted to capture him by stratagem. Officer A. H. Selde was watching proceedings from behind the corner of a building.
