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U. S. OFFICIALS WANT DIRIGIBLE SENT TO NORTH

Aid for Amundsen Now Considered

COOLIDGE APPROVES

Wants Plans Held Up, How- ever, Until Certain Res- cue Party Is Needed

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)
WASHINGTON, May 26.—Sentiment for the ultimate dispatch of the United States naval dirigible Shenandoah or the Los Angeles to the arctic to search for the Amundsen expedition grew swiftly in official quarters here today.

Developments included:

A statement by the White House spokesman that President Coolidge favored the use of all practical and possible means of carrying relief to the missing exploring party if it finally appears necessary.

A declaration by Secretary of the Navy Wilbur that while no official consideration was being given yet to plans for such use of the giant airship, he personally was giving much thought to the project.

The president was represented by the White House spokesman as entirely favorable to the use of either or both of the great airships in the venture, if expert opinion of naval aeronauts regards the project as feasible.

The president, however, was said to believe that it is not yet certain that dispatch of a rescue crew party is needed and until the need is manifest, plans should be held in abeyance.

FATE IN DOUBT

OSLO, May 26.—That some misfortune had befallen Captain Roald Amundsen, had been the fear, besetting the Norwegian capital today as no news of the polar fliers arrived up to this afternoon.

This potent misfortune did not necessarily mean that the explorers had met death. But with zero weather reported from Spitzbergen and storms brewing above the arctic circle, there was today a genuine fear that perhaps the expedition trying to conquer the north pole from the air had been forced down and then was unable to get into the air again.

In this case, it meant that they would be compelled to set out on skis for the nearest Greenland point, several hundred miles from the pole. Such a venture would be fraught with tremendous dangers. The expedition's supplies suffice for a month and they can be augmented by killing game en route.

But, at the best, such a hike is a gamble.

With unusual luck, the fliers might get back to a point where they could be picked up by rescuers.

Alarm Increases

However, the general populace began to have a sinking pessimism about the fate of the birdmen.

Learned scientists and polar explorers still continued predicting that Amundsen and his mates would find their way back to the base at King's bay, Spitzbergen. The argument that on his south pole venture he had browsed about, making observations lengthily and that he might again be taking his own time, verifying his position and noting facts of scientific importance.

These optimists, however, did not serve to dissipate the growing alarm about the expedition.

American reports of possible airplane hunting parties to rescue Amundsen met with polite skepticism. The American comments that such proposals were "misplaced, though well meant."

Bathing Suits Barred As Attire In Parades

PORTLAND, May 26.—The Y. W. C. A. and the Federation of Women's Organizations have won a crusade against the undampened bathing suit.

As a result of their activities the directors of the Portland rose festival agreed last night on a rule that "objectionable apparel" and "scenty attire"—which means bathing suits—shall not be worn in any festival parade.

The crusaders took the stand that the bathing suit was made to be worn in the water and not for displaying the charms of bathing beauties on the streets.

President's Bodyguard Will Include Bend Man

Thomas Tweet One of Old- est of Union Veterans

Norse-Americans to Celebrate Ann- iversary In Minneapolis—Lo- cal Pastor Going, Too

To serve as a member of President Coolidge's bodyguard at the Norse-American centennial celebration in Minneapolis, Thomas Tweet, Bend pioneer and civil war veteran, will leave for Minnesota on June 2, going from Portland on a special car.

Although it was known for several weeks that Tweet had been selected for the president's bodyguard, it was not definitely certain until today that he would be able to make the trip. Tweet will be the third oldest member of the bodyguard. The civil war veteran was 88 years of age this month.

The two members of the bodyguard, all Norse-American civil war veterans, older than the Bend man will be Carl Nelson, Milwaukee, 96, and John Johnson of Sauk Center, Minnesota, 92. A few of the other members of the president's bodyguard will be Charles Olson, Madison, Wis.; Erik N. Baraness, Glenwood, Minn.; Elbert Sorkness, Colfax, Wis.; Borra Olson, River Falls, Wis.; Martin Halverson, Finley, N. D.; and Martin Jacobs, Walnut Grove, Minn.

Another Bend man who will attend the Norse-American centennial celebration, commemorating the first Norse settlement in the United States, will be Rev. R. Rogstad of the local Lutheran church. Rev. Rogstad will leave for Portland probably next Sunday evening. He will go east on a special car from Seattle. The car from Portland and Seattle will join a special train in Washington.

QUOTA IS PASSED IN LEGION DRIVE

\$1100 Cash and More Given In Single Day

In a campaign lasting only one day, Bend's quota for the Boerboer children's hospital and the American Legion endowment campaign was over subscribed. The quota was \$1,100. The cash subscriptions totalled \$1,157.

When the quota was reached, John Ruge, commander of the Percy A. Stevens post of the American Legion, wired to the state headquarters at 6 o'clock yesterday evening, that Bend had reached its mark. The committee handling the campaign in Bend was headed by Carl A. Johnson.

Other members of the committee working Monday in the successful campaign were Frank R. Prince, John R. Runge, S. R. Brown, H. Cato, Howard Young, Jack Davis, Lloyd Kelley, Jephtha Smith, Don McBain, Charles Erskine, Leon Devereaux, Paul Mayette and Irving Hardendorff.

When the campaign is cleaned up this evening, it is predicted Bend will have over subscribed its quota by at least \$100. Bend is one of the first towns in the state to raise its quota in such a short time.

Body Found In River Is Thought Officer's

Antles, who recently accepted the secretaryship of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce, plans to leave Bend the first of next week for a trip east before reporting for duty at Roseburg.

Rescue By Bend Woman Is Finally Explained

Mrs. Benn then took Collett to The Dalles where he first started to enter a hospital, but decided his injuries were too trivial to do so.

Speed Boat Is Winner Over Century Limited

It arrived at the Columbia Boat club, 86th street, New York, at 9:50:20 a. m. The running time was 2 hours, 45 minutes, 20 seconds. The distance is approximately 150 miles.

Buildings Constructed To House Large Stills

Labor Saving Devices Are Found By Raiding Party

Cooling System, Pipe for Trans- ferring Mash, Elaborate Fur- nace Are Reported

Moonshine plants in specially built factory buildings with all the detail of arrangement, say, of a flour mill, are getting to be the rule. Sheriff S. E. Roberts reported today on his return from a trip into the northern part of the county and across the line into Jefferson county.

Recently the federal prohibition department was apprised that there was a big still in operation on the Metolus river four miles below the Heising ranch.

Monday's raiding party found where the plant had been operated, but the equipment had been moved. In one building, however, they saw the marks of 23 mash barrels on the floor.

From this building a pipe led to the separate building in which the still had been located, so that the mash could be transferred without labor. Another pipe conveyed cold water from a spring to the cooling system.

The furnace was an elaborate affair, and the boiler had apparently been of 200 gallon capacity.

Sheriff Roberts and his deputies did find a 49 gallon still on Squaw creek several miles below Sisters. Seven barrels of mash were found and destroyed, and the still was brought in to Bend.

This plant was in operation, but the officers did not have it located exactly, and they believe that while they were searching through the brush for over an hour, the moonshiners took warning and fled.

EUROPEAN TREATY NOT FOR AMERICA

President Disapproves Invi- tation to U. S.

WASHINGTON, May 26.—President Coolidge does not approve the reported suggestion of the German and French governments that the United States participate in the proposed western European security pact.

The president told callers today he had no direct information of the proposal but felt that the security pact was entirely a European question, to be settled by the nations concerned.

This government is always willing to help, however, in such ways as will not involve it in European political questions, the White House spokesman said.

Drunkenness Is Charged. Talk Augments Penalty

L. E. Amon was arrested for drunkenness Monday night, and when the officers searched him they found a quart and a pint of grain alcohol in his possession. He claimed that he was using this for external medicinal purposes, and that his intoxication was caused by moonshine furnished by friends. Amon was a trifle "sassy" to the officers, so Recorder Louis Bennett fined him \$10 instead of the usual \$10.

Presbytery of New York Sustained In Modernism

COLUMBUS, Ohio, May 26.—Ultra fundamentalists in the Presbyterian church lost another battle today when the general assembly, by an overwhelming vote, dismissed the charges against the radical New York presbytery for permitting Dr. Harry Emerson Fosdick, a liberal, to occupy the pulpit of the First Church of New York City.

Former Kansas Governor To Face Second Charge

In the new case Davis and his son, Russell Davis, are jointly charged.

Income Tax Payers' Names Sold For Prospect Lists

WASHINGTON, May 26.—Names and addresses of income tax payers who paid on more than \$100,000 last year have been compiled by several companies and put in book form for sale to stock salesmen as lists of "prospects," the treasury department has been informed.

PUBLIC TO GET ONE MORE LOOK AT TAX PAYERS

Lists Prepared for Gen- eral Publicity

REPEAL IS SOUGHT

Coolidge and Mellon Both Apposed to Use of Names In Newspapers

WASHINGTON, May 26.—The treasury department today prepared to give the American people about July 1 what may be its last glimpse of individual income tax payments.

As the internal revenue bureau hastened to prepare the tax lists for publication as authorized by the supreme court yesterday, lines were redrawn for the fight to repeal the publicity provision of the revenue law.

President Coolidge, Secretary of the Treasury Mellon and powerful business interests vigorously oppose the publicity principle. Both the president and Mellon are expected to recommend that the new tax bill repeal the publicity provision.

Arrayed against them, however, are the forces which originally secured the publicity clause and they believe publicity has come to stay. They are reinforced in their belief by the supreme court's vindication of full publicity.

Instructions to internal revenue collectors governing publication of tax lists will go forth from here, directing that they be made available for "inspection" and "publication" on or about July 1. Some of the lists may be made available before then, however, as many payments were made before March 15, the first payment date, and are in shape to be given out.

Roosevelts Now Over Rugged Asiatic Pass

DRAS, Kasir, May 26.—The Roosevelt expedition, composed of Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, his brother Kermit, and the veteran explorer George K. Cherrie, bound for the little known Tian-Shan mountains in search of the oryx polio-tanestor of the sheeps, is safely over the rugged Zoji pass. The journey ahead is difficult, owing to heavy snow.

The party reached Dras, about 75 miles northeast of the starting point, Srinagar, Monday evening, and left for Chimsakarcu this morning.

The rough trip to Leh, next important junction point before heading for the mountains, consists of nine stages. The members of the expedition are in good condition and face the hardships ahead with eagerness.

Surplus Accumulating In Mexico's Treasury

LOS ANGELES, May 26.—Mexico is steadily rehabilitating itself after its many years of civil war and there is now a surplus of 40,000,000 pesos in the treasury, according to Dr. I. M. Puig-Casas, minister of public instruction.

"When President Calles took office the treasury was exhausted," said Puig-Casas, who was here today on a visit. Now there is a surplus of 40,000,000 pesos in the treasury and by September there will be 70,000,000.

"Mexico is at peace, order prevails and industry, not war, is the actuating motive of our people."

Bright Lights Shining On Harry Thaw Again

NEW YORK, May 26.—Harry K. Thaw is back among the bright lights of Broadway again.

Ending what had been virtually 10 years of exile from the "White Way" since the fatal evening when he killed Stanford White, Thaw appeared at a cabaret in Broadway. A pretty dancer graced his table.

Thaw was in a gay humor as of old when he was known as a "well to do young man about town," but time and prison confinement had left their marks. He was recognized by the oldest Broadway patrons, but to the younger merry-makers he was at first simply an elderly gray haired man with wrinkles in his face.

Methodists Will Fight Against Naughty Shows

Program Now Under Way In U. S. Capital

Board of Morals Would Strip Dis- guise of "Art" From In- decency, Is Said

Washington, May 26.—A national campaign to suppress risqué burlesque shows, art magazines and photographs is to be instituted by the Methodist Episcopal board of temperance, prohibition and public morals.

The program already has proceeded in the national capital to the extent that 24 magazines have been ruled off the news stands, a burlesque show proprietor has been arrested, and a photographer who specialized in nude portraits has been compelled to change his methods.

Plans have been laid for extension of this drive into cities of size throughout the country.

The board's intentions were made known today by Deets Pickett, research secretary, who gathered the evidence upon which the Washington cases were based.

"Art covers a multitude of sins," Pickett said. "The musical comedy producers, the editors of magazines and even the photographers are using it as an excuse for improper business in violation of American principles and in many cases in violation of the law."

JURY IS FAR OFF IN SHEPHERD CASE

One of Four Accepted Finds He Has Opinion

CHICAGO, May 26.—Taking of testimony in the trial of William D. Shepherd, accused of murdering Billy McClintock, seemed dimly remote today as prospects of obtaining a jury were dealt a setback.

Harry Pillar, one of the four jurors sworn to serve in the Shepherd \$1,000,000 germ murder trial, was excused by Judge Thomas J. Lynch when he appealed to the court, declaring he had formed an opinion since he had been sworn in and could not give Shepherd a fair trial.

Dismissal of Pillar breaks the panel of four and makes it possible for either the state or defense to challenge and dismiss the other three. This seemed likely in view of the fact that bailiffs reported Pillar had talked freely about the case to the other jurors.

John Kelly, a real estate dealer, was taken into custody by State Attorney Crowe's men today on a tip that he knew of the whereabouts of Robert A. White, one of the state's most important witnesses, who has been missing more than a week.

Much Old Rye Whiskey Tendered Government

WASHINGTON, May 26.—An offer to sell to the government 1,800,000 gallons of rye whiskey, acquired yesterday by purchase of the Old Overholt distillery, was made today by Park and Tilford, in a telegram to Surgeon General Cumming of the United States public health service.

Park and Tilford said the liquor was at the government's disposal at the "exact purchase price." Their action, the telegram said, was "in the interest of preserving the health of the nation."

Dr. Mark White, acting surgeon general, in replying, telegraphed that the public service health department was not interested in the proposition.

Record At Indianapolis Broken By Earl Cooper

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., May 26.—Breaking the official track record for the Indianapolis motor speedway, Earl Cooper this afternoon qualified his Junior Miller special for Saturday's 500 mile auto race, at a speed of 110.4 miles an hour for 10 miles.

His speed was nearly two miles an hour faster than the official record made by Tommy Milton in a previous race.

Dawes Receives Report On Senate Reform Vote

The Bulletin has received acknowledgment from Vice President Charles G. Dawes of its report on the vote taken through the columns of the paper here, in which it was shown that local sentiment is overwhelmingly in favor of senate reforms advocated by the vice president.

OFFICERS SEEK TO SHED LIGHT ON DEATH CASE

Dying Statement Is Used Against Sheepman

CHARGE UNCERTAIN

Investigation to Determine Whether Manslaughter or Murder to Be Alleged

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 26.—Sheriff Hawkins and District Attorney Myers returned here today after a 24 hour search in the barren Devil's Garden country to learn how Tim Murphy, Klamath county sheepman, was killed Sunday.

Frank Way, Prineville sheepman, is being held in jail pending the investigation. Way said Murphy was killed as a result of being knocked down in a fist fight.

Benjamin Murphy, brother of the dead man, however, said his brother declared before he died.

"He ordered me to hold up my hands and then he hit me over the head with his gun."

"Then he stopped to wash the blood from his face and fell dead with an exclamation."

Brother Goes to Aid

District Attorney Myers indicated an outcome of the investigation will determine whether manslaughter or murder charges will be brought against Way. The coroner's jury reported Murphy died of a fracture of the skull.

Albert Way, brother of Frank Way, passed through Bend late yesterday from the Way ranch in the Prineville country, going to Klamath Falls, where his brother is held in connection with the death of Tim Murphy.

The Way brothers have a summer range allotment in the Umpqua national forest for 1,200 head of sheep. Frank Way is quite well known in Bend, coming here from Prineville frequently in connection with the range allotment, which is handled through the local forest office.

Disputes Many, Stated

Should Frank Way be charged with manslaughter or murder, it is probable that he will be defended by Jay H. Upton, Bend attorney, who is well acquainted with the two Prineville stockmen.

The Way brothers recently bought an interest in the Murphy holdings in the Klamath country. Following the lambing season, the sheep were being divided when the trouble which resulted in the death of Murphy occurred. The final dispute over the ownership of the black sheep culminated a series of disputes and was the "straw that broke the camel's back," according to information received locally.

Irrigation In Klamath Made Subject of Probe

KLAMATH FALLS, May 26.—Former Governor Thomas Campbell of Arizona, chairman of the reclamation board of survey and adjustment, spent Monday touring the Malin and Tule lake sections of the Klamath country, prior to the opening of the irrigation inquiry here Wednesday.

"The inquiry will last longer than I expected," Campbell said. "I am going to hold an open investigation. Anyone who has any complaints as to the local project will be heard. He may talk hours and hours at a time, as long as he sticks to the subject."

Efforts will be made by the Klamath Irrigation district to prove that the California-Oregon Power company obtained land and water rights fraudulently in 1915, it is understood. The district also will ask for a readjustment of prices paid by the power company for land and water rights the last 10 years.

Emphasize Need of Boys For Scout Work In Bend

Need of more boys to take part in the boy scout movement in Bend was emphasized at a meeting of the Bend scout council members today noon in the Pilot Hotel. Myron H. Byrmons, a member of the camping department, that a scout field day should be held here was proposed by John Dubois, but no definite action was taken. A considerable number of local business and professional men attended today's meeting.
