POWELL BUTTE, May 27.—Powell Butte last Tuesday about 6:30 p. m. was hit by the severest hail storm this country has ever experienced. The hail centered along the old river bed and devastated the alfalfa and grain fields on the east side of the river bed through to the north of Powell Butte, where it seemed to have spent itself. The rain which accompanied the hail spread over the whole of Powell Butte and extended east and north and was in the nature of a cloudburst.

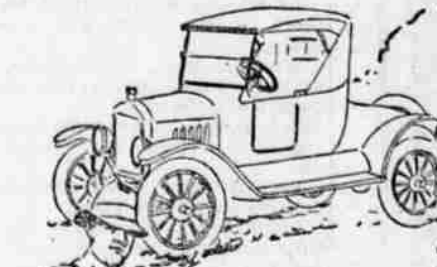

Juvenile Shoplifting Again Local Problem

Juvenile shoplifting has again become a problem in Bend, city officials reported today. The particular cases discovered were thefts of fishing tackle from local hardware stores. Two boys, one 14 years of age and the other 12, were arrested in the act of taking fishing equipment, and were brought before Recorder Louis Bennett this morning.

A third boy, aged 16, who was with the two who stole the fishing tackle, was charged jointly with them. All three were lectured severely by the recorder, and sentenced to 10 days in the city jail but paroled to their parents.

Mayor R. H. Fox today asked that parents warn their children that such offenses may result in commitment to the state training school.
