STOCK MARKET LIVELY AGAIN

New Strength Noted In Motor Shares

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, May 27.—Last week's bullish vigor was in a large measure revived in today's session as a result of the pronounced strength which developed in several sections of the list, particularly among the motor shares. This group was enlivened by a further remarkable uprush in Maxwell "B" by the achievement of record highs in Mack Truck and Hudson, and of new high ground on the movement by Studebaker and Pierce-Arrow issues.

Weekly freight traffic statistics continued their testimony to the large volume of business the country is handling, while the weekly reviews of the steel trade described further improvements in the industry. Iron Age asserted that the final week in May added to the recent indications that the adjustment of demand and output of finished steel had been practically completed.

Grain Futures Slide, Partially Recovering

CHICAGO, May 27.—Grain futures closed at lower levels on the Chicago board of trade today.

Wheat was extremely nervous and erratic. Partial recovery was made from the opening low point on pessimistic crop news. Advances showed the cold wave did not cause so severe losses as anticipated. Raising in the final hour brought about recovery of some of the day's losses.

Corn was weak with wheat. Although it is realized that some cold weather damage was done, the crop has more time to recover and make good gains under favorable weather. Important export sales helped oats to firm up after a fractional recession.

The feature of higher provisions was the advance in hogs. Shipments increased.
