SILAS BARCLAY, INDIAN OUTLAW, AGAIN ESCAPES

Pries Way Out of Jail At
Copco

HELD ONLY 3 HOURS

Suspected of Part In Death
of Freddie Jackson At
Klamath Falls

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., May 28.—Klamath county authorities were making a new search for Silas Barclay, Klamath Indian outlaw, following his break from jail at Copco yesterday.

This was the third time he escaped from jail since he was first suspected of being involved in the death of Freddie Jackson. The latter is believed to have died as a result of injuries received in a drunken brawl in which Barclay participated, although he was actually found dead after he fell from a horse.

Barclay pried loose the bars of the jail within three hours after he was arrested.

Blankets Aid Escape

Previous to his escape Wednesday afternoon, Barclay escaped from the Klamath county jail by tying blankets together and descending three stories.

Arrested at Chilquien several days later by Indian Officer Shadley, he was taken to a Chilquien restaurant to be fed just before the trip back to the Klamath county jail.

In the midst of the meal he dashed out of the restaurant door, mounted a pony tied at the hitching post outside and made good his second escape.

Barclay had eluded officers at Red Bluff and Sacramento, Cal., where he had been reported. Nothing had been heard from him for a month prior to his arrest Wednesday afternoon.

Bend Gets Convention Of Oregon Cattlemen

The 1926 convention will be the second of the Oregon Cattle and Horse Raisers' association to be held in Bend in six years.

Says Lawmakers Fear Personal Power Loss

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., May 28.—Opposition to a change in the rules of the United States senate comes only from those whose individual power is threatened, according to Vice President Charles G. Dawes.

The vice president set forth his views once more last night when he spoke here from the same platform as Senator Oscar W. Underwood, democratic leader.

"These rules," Dawes said, "in their present form encourage parliamentary misbehavior of individual senators and invite selfishness, mediocrity, vanity and personal purpose to cloak themselves in the robe of arrogance."

Surgeon Blames Germs In Blood For Cancer

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J., May 28.—Medication as a cure for cancer in preference to the knife was advocated by Dr. Jacob Glass of New York, addressing the American Medical association in annual convention here. Cancer, he said, was the result of a germ in the blood and was not a localized disturbance. He said this conclusion had been drawn from the fact that after cancers had been cut out they frequently developed in other parts of the body.

Present high tension living was blamed for the spread of gonorrhea, Dr. Israel Bram, noted Philadelphia specialist.

Liquor Making Plants Idle, New Law Working

It's a Felony Now to Moonshine In Oregon

Parts of Big Outfits Found By
County and Federal Officers
In Squaw Creek Section

The fact that at midnight last night moonshining became a felony in Oregon, may have been the reason for the abandonment of the two liquor manufacturing plants which Sheriff S. E. Roberts and his deputies, together with federal officers, sought along Squaw creek and the Metolius river early this week, Sheriff Roberts believes.

One of the stills was found, but part of the equipment had been removed and it was apparent that the operation was ended. The other plant had been removed entirely, although it had been, according to the evidence seen by the officers, one of the most complete ever operated in Central Oregon.

The law which went into effect last night provides a year's imprisonment in the state penitentiary as the lightest penalty which may be imposed for illegal manufacture of liquor.

Rumor of Man's Death Is Unfounded, Learned

That a man had been mangled and killed by a saw in one of the local mills yesterday, was a rumor current around town yesterday evening and this morning. The rumor was unfounded.

So certain were some people that a man had been killed that even the name of the supposed victim of the saw was coupled with the rumor. One man today approached Coroner C. P. Niewonger and asked how badly the man had been mangled.

It is believed that the rumor had its origin in the mill tragedy of Tuesday evening when C. I. Stingle was smothered to death in the fuel house of the Brooks-Scallion Lumber Co. The body of Stingle was shipped to Ontario this morning for burial.

Scouts to Get Prizes For Securing Members

Plans for a membership contest for boy scout troop No. 4 have been outlined by the troop committee. For the boy getting the most members before the start of the scout training camp, S. R. Brown has offered a week free at the camp. A second prize of one-half a week at camp is offered by P. B. Johnson. Boys registering for the summer camp must first pass the tenderfoot tests.

June 27 is the tentative date selected by local boy scout leaders for the scout field day of the Bend council, according to an announcement this afternoon. The field day, featuring various competitive events, is to be open to all scouts in Bend.

Over a Hundred Pickets Are Guilty of Contempt

FAIRMONT, W. Va., May 28.—One hundred and sixteen union pickets were found guilty of contempt of court for violation of a strike injunction by Judge Meredith in circuit court here today.

The miners were fined \$1 and \$3 costs. Fifty-five of those convicted refused to pay the fine and were sentenced to serve 10 days in jail.

Judge Meredith dismissed the cases of 11 women.

No Defense Test Likely For Oregon Is Indicated

HOPE GIVEN UP FOR MINE CREW HELD IN EARTH

Recover Twelve Bodies,
36 Thought Left

FEAR GAS WAS FATAL

List of Victims In North
Caroline Disaster May
Be Increased to 71

SANFORD, N. C., May 28.—Four more bodies were brought to the surface today from the Cumcock mine of the Carolina Coal Company, wrecked yesterday by three gas explosions.

Twelve bodies have been recovered so far, company officials announced at 3 p. m., expressing the belief that at least 36 bodies are still in the workings.

This would place the death list at 48. All hope for rescue alive of any of the miners has been abandoned.

The four bodies located early this afternoon by the crew of the mine rescue car rushed here from Thomas, W. Va., were found at the 2,000 foot level, which precluded the possibility, officials said, of finding any miners alive.

Gas Stows Search

Hope for rescue alive of any of the miners entombed following the explosions yesterday was abandoned by mine officials early today. If the explosion did not kill them, the after-damp snuffed out their lives, officials believed.

Bodies of eight miners had been recovered from the mine by a rescue squad which had penetrated to the 1800 foot level before stopping work for the night.

The death list probably will show more than 50 killed. The mine records show that 52 men—39 whites and 20 negroes—went into the mine at 8 o'clock yesterday morning. On the other hand, 71 miners' lamps were out and the list of dead may be increased to that figure.

At 10 a. m. today no additional bodies had been brought to the surface. Heavy gases prevented prolonged search and at that hour the rescue workers awaited the arrival of the mine rescue car which was expected "any minute."

WEALTHY OIL MAN KILLS WOMAN, SELF

Frustrated Love Is Blamed
For Double Tragedy

LOS ANGELES, May 28.—Tom W. Greer, wealthy oil operator, shot and killed Mrs. Alma Mapstead, 36, at his home here today and then sent a bullet through his own head, dying instantly.

Police said it was a case of frustrated love, evidence indicating the pair had agreed to end their lives together.

Mrs. Margaret Dowdy, Greer's housekeeper, and his two children were in the house at the time. Greer was a widower and had long been in love with Mrs. Mapstead. The woman had made regular visits to the oil man's home, detectives said.

Town of Five Thousand Is Left Without Banks

HUGO, Okla., May 28.—Without banking facilities, business in this town of 5,000 population today was practically at a standstill. Checks of large business houses could not be cashed; bills of large denomination could not be changed. It was predicted that one-third of the crops in Choctaw county would not be harvested this year.

With this situation before them, caused by the failure of the last bank in town yesterday, business men took a "holiday" on the golf links or went fishing or worked in their gardens.

Two Killed In Car Wreck When Auto Leaves Grade

PORTLAND, May 28.—Marvin Allen Bishop, 28, and Mrs. Ethel Newton, 42, wife of Dr. Harvey F. Newton, dentist, were killed yesterday afternoon when their automobile rolled and plunged down a 200 foot bank from a highway to the Sandy river, about 20 miles east of this city.

Referendum Petitions Filed At Last Minute

Attack On Bill Diverting
Fees Goes On Ballot

Barely Enough Names Attached to
Make Instruments Effective—
3 Measures Referred

SALEM, May 28.—Referendum petitions attacking the state bill which would divert 10 per cent of all commission fees to the general state funds were filed 10 minutes before midnight last night, and just 10 minutes before the closing time for legal filing.

The secretary of state was called out of bed to receive the petitions, which bore 9,350 certified names, barely a sufficiency to make the petitions effective.

Two other referendum petitions were filed early this week, one attacking the bus and truck bill and the other the cigarette and tobacco bill. All three measures will be referred to the people at the general election in November, 1926.

MANY WILL ATTEND GLEE CLUB SHOWS

Californians, On Tour, Due
Here Monday

Judging from the patronage which has been accorded to previous appearances of college entertainers in Bend, and taking also into consideration the unusual merit of the one which is coming next week, it is predicted that seats for the concerts of the University of California Glee club, Monday and Tuesday evenings, will be sold out long before the first concert opens.

Three such organizations have appeared in Bend in the past, and each one was greeted by a packed house. In 1917, when Bend was little more than half its present size, the grand theater was filled to capacity for the concert of the Willamette University Glee club.

Three years later the University of Oregon Glee club came, and the school gymnasium wasn't big enough to hold all of the people who applied for tickets.

It was three years more before a college musical organization came again—the O. A. C. band, which found it necessary to give its concert here on Sunday, and in the afternoon at that. A band concert does not draw so well as a college glee club, but still the gymnasium was crowded for this attraction.

Seats for the California glee club's two performances are already selling rapidly.

Think Stolen Jewelry Perhaps Belongs Here

The Portland police have arrested a thief who has been in Bend within the last nine months, and who had in his possession a watch and a lady's bar pin, the owners of which have not been located, according to a letter received by Chief of Police Peter J. Hanson.

The watch is described as an Elgin, seven jewel, size 12, gold filled hunting case, movement No. 1654-2572, case No. 7256714, engraving across inside back lid looks like "P. E. Maughlin."

A photograph of the bar pin was sent to Chief Hanson. The pin contains 34 stones, the center stone being 1-10 karat.

If the owners of these articles are in Bend, they may get in touch with the Portland police through the local police department.

Appreciation of Antles
Told By Speakers

CRAMB PRESENTED

Retiring Official Asks Even
Better Support For His
Successor Here

Appreciation of the work done by L. Antles during his incumbency as secretary of the Bend Commercial club, sorrow at his departure, and felicitations to the commercial body of Roseburg in having secured his services were expressed by speakers on the program at the farewell dinner given last night for Mr. and Mrs. Antles. Representatives of the many organizations with which Antles has served, were in attendance, and the high points of his service, and the work done by Mrs. Antles, for several years a member of the Bend high school faculty, were told by one after another as the evening progressed.

The presentation of a watch, following appropriate remarks by H. H. De Armond, brought an emotional response from Antles in which, after expressing his gratitude for the gift, he urged on the community the importance of its civic organization, and bespoke for his successor even better cooperation than that which he himself has received.

Known as True Sportsman

R. S. Hamilton, toastmaster, speaking for the Rod and Gun club, described Antles as a true sportsman, then delivered the farewell address of the evening in which he spoke of the retiring Bend secretary as one of the leading men in his line of work in the northwest, and declared that many developments now taking place in Bend, and others still in the future, are built upon foundation which Antles has laid.

Autoists Lose Fight Against Snow Drifts

Unusual Progress Made On
McKenzie Road, However

Attempt In Early Morning More
Probable of Success, Say
Abbott and Van Huffel

Reaching a point about 14 miles west of Sisters, or one mile east of the Three Sisters lava fields, three Bend men in a Ford car yesterday penetrated the McKenzie pass snow fields to a point never before reached this season by a motor vehicle. The three men were A. D. Abbott, manager of the local Standard Oil Co. plant; J. L. Van Huffel, manager of the Central Oregon Motor Co., and C. Clark.

The three men battled the summit snow during the entire day in an attempt to cross the lava beds. They left Bend Wednesday morning at 8:30 and returned to Bend at 6:30 last night. It is the belief of the men that they would have had a much better chance of crossing the snow mantled lava beds if they camped Tuesday night in the McKenzie pass country, making the attempt early in the morning when the snow was hard.

According to the local men, both farm wagons attempting to cross the snow fields from Central Oregon to Eugene were successful, the second wagon getting across yesterday. This wagon was driven by Walter O'Neill, of the Snake river country. The first wagon to cross the pass this year was driven by Lester Larkin, I. Neil's partner. The Bend men report that the horses and wagons did not sink very deeply into the snow.

Bureau of public roads men late yesterday evening were preparing to discharge a large quantity of dynamite in the great drift which blocks the east approach to the cut, according to the Bend men. This drift is very large. Central Oregon legionnaires in their pass clearing work Sunday will center their attack on this cut. Abbott, Van Huffel and Clark were not able to reach the drift in their car.

Much of the time of the three men when in the pass country yesterday was spent in opening a road through smaller drifts.

SMALL BOY SHOOTS HIS LITTLE SISTER

Can't Explain Reason He
Pulled Shotgun Trigger

VIRGINIA CITY, Mont., May 26.—A little ruff six year old boy today tried to explain why he pointed a shotgun at his three year old sister and fired it—but he couldn't.

The little boy was John Hickman, son of Mrs. E. Ford Hickman. Last night he came down stairs and announced to his nurse:

"Betsy Ann is dead."

The nurse rushed up stairs to find the little girl lying on the floor with the top half of her head blown off. The children, playing alone, had found an old 16 gauge shotgun with an old wooden ramrod in the barrel. John pointed it at his sister and pulled the trigger. The charge of shot followed the ramrod through the tot's head.

San Francisco Woman, Sleep Walking, Drowns

SAN FRANCISCO, May 28.—The body of Dr. Edith Bronson, drowned in Merced river, Yosemite valley, while sleep walking, was expected to be brought here today by friends who were with her on a camping trip in the valley.

Dr. Bronson, associate professor of pediatrics at the University of California, went to Yosemite to attend the state medical society convention and take a rest for shattered nerves. Her companions said she was subject to somnambulism and probably walked into the river and drowned without awakening.

Clothing Catches Fire, Five Year Old Girl Dies

FEDERAL JUDGE ORDERS DOHENY TO GIVE UP OIL

Not Entitled to Lease, Is
Decision

WILL APPEAL CASE

Value of Property Involved
Is Estimated At More
Than \$200,000,000

LOS ANGELES, May 28.—The famous Elk Hills naval oil reserves, leased to E. L. Doheny's Pan American Petroleum and Transport company, were ordered returned to the government today by Federal Judge Paul J. McCormick.

Judge McCormick held that the Doheny companies had obtained the leases through fraud and conspiracy and were not lawfully entitled to develop the vast oil properties.

"We will appeal to the supreme court from this decision," Judge Charles Wellborn, chief legal advisor to Doheny, told the United Press when the ruling was made known.

The decision involved leases to United States naval reserves No. 1 and No. 2, near Bakersfield, Cal., with an estimated potential value of between \$200,000,000 and \$300,000,000.

Suit to recover the lands was instituted by the government in connection with the oil disclosures in Washington which culminated in the resignation under pressure of Secretary of the Interior Albert B. Fall.

Conspiracy Claimed

The trial was staged in Judge McCormick's court here October 29 to November 13 last year.

The government, through its special counsel, charged the Pan American Petroleum and Transport company, headed by E. L. Doheny, Sr., had obtained the valuable oil lands through conspiracy and fraud.

The leases, it was claimed, had not been open to competitive bidding and were not awarded through the regular channels in the naval department.

The sensation of the trial was a disclosure by Mrs. Doheny that she had her husband's signature to a \$100,000 note to Fall, which had been mysteriously absent at the hearing at Washington.

Government attorneys sought to link the \$100,000 loan to Fall with the latter's purchase of a ranch near Three Rivers, New Mexico.

Payment Scored

"The payment of \$100,000 by Doheny to Fall was against public decency," Judge McCormick said in his decision. "The making of such payment constitutes a fraud upon the United States of America and renders voidable all contracts and concessions made between the Pan-American Petroleum & Transport Company and the United States of America."

"It was an act of such flagrant and wrongfulness by Fall and Doheny as to vitiate and annul all of the contracts in question."

"During the negotiations between Fall and Doheny approximately \$100,000 passed between them for the purpose of influencing the furtherance of the alleged conspiracy."

"The contract of April 25, 1922, was not let upon competitive bidding. The lease of June 5, 1922, was part of the consideration for an illegal contract, to wit, the contract of April 25, 1922."

Two From Bend To Attend Klamath Community Dinner

Bend will be represented at Klamath Falls' annual community dinner by H. H. DeArmond and C. S. Hudson of the Bend Commercial club. DeArmond and Hudson planned to leave for Klamath Falls today. The community dinner will be held at the White Pelican hotel in Klamath Falls Friday night.

Operation Is Performed On Injured Gun Fighter

Jack Turnbull, injured in a pistol fight with members of the Bend police force late Saturday night, is at present in the St. Charles hospital, where he was taken for an operation. The operation was for the purpose of removing pieces of shattered lead from Turnbull's leg. According to the attending physician, Turnbull's injury is not considered serious.
