Y., May 28.—The Glenn Riddle farm's American Flag, a 3 year old by Man o' War Lady Comfy, today won the 50th running of the Withers stakes which with \$5,000 added money, had a gross value of approximately \$20,000. The Hancock stable's Silver Fox was second and A. Barklie's Gold Stick, a 30 to 1 shot, finished third, ahead of such good ones as Coventry, winner of the Preakness; Pique, Candy Kid and Buckbone, the Whitney pair, and others.
