

INDIAN RELICS FIND REPORTED

Thick At Abert Lake,
Thinks Trapper

Region Interesting From a
Geological Standpoint As
Well, Says J. J. Simpson

That the sedimentary deposits near the place where the Chewaucan river flows into Abert lake are rich in relics of the early day Indians, is an opinion held by J. J. Simpson, pioneer trapper of Central Oregon, who has lived in the lonely country south of Bend for the past 15 years. Simpson is in this city at present, returning from his trap strings in the south-central part of the state only a short time ago.

One of the reasons why Simpson believes that the river wash holds relics of great value to paleontologists is that once when he was plowing on a ranch near Abert lake he found the skeleton of a large Indian, entirely intact. The skeleton was stretched out in such a manner that it appeared the Indian had fallen to the earth, probably killed by the spear or arrow of an enemy. It was probably in place for centuries.

Simpson is deeply interested in Indian artifacts, and has one of the finest collection of stone war implements, missiles and grinding utensils in Central Oregon. Part of the collection has been brought to Bend, and the remainder will be brought

here from his former home in Lake county soon. Simpson has a collection of artifacts which is fairly representative of the utensils used in the domestic life of the Indians.

Simpson in his travels through the central part of the state, especially in the Warner lake region, has found many traces of the immigrants, and knows of several localities where it is evident the Indians and immigrants met in battle. Simpson tells of one place where he found the head of an ox, the horns tipped with brass knobs. Localities where wagon trains were discarded, probably following an attack by Indians, are also known to the pioneer trapper.

One of the most peculiar finds ever made by Simpson out in the desert country was a huge fossilized mollusk, found at a point about 8,000 feet above the present level of the sea. This fossil is of the mollusca known by scientists as the Planorbis schubertii, and has been identified by the pioneer geologist, Thomas Condon, as a form of life that lived in an inland pliocene sea. Simpson has the fossilized mollusk at his present home, just south of Bend, east of The Dalles-California highway.

In his recent trip into the country south of the Deschutes, Simpson killed two cougars and two bears. He greatly resents the practice of government trappers in setting poison stations, having lost several of his valuable dogs.

CAMP SITES NAMED, NO PERMIT NEEDED

Designations Are Made for
National Forest

That there will be certain places in the Deschutes national forest where camp fire permits will not be required this season, is the information given out today from forest headquarters.

Places in the Deschutes forest where permits will not be required to start a camp fire are as follows: Elk lake at south end of lake and the camp ground at the Wicwaxen resort; head of Fall river; Crane prairie dam; East lake; Riverside camp, near the head of the Metolius; Allingham ranger station camp site; Suttle lake camp ground at east end of lake, near resort; Odell lake camp ground at lower end of lake, near resort; Crescent lake camp ground at both ends of lake; Big river ranger station.

Permits for starting camp fires in these designated camp sites will not be required because the sites are fairly safe. Although no permits will be required at these places, it is emphasized that campers must extinguish their fires before leaving, and must exercise every care with fire. It is believed that the new ruling will have a tendency to concentrate campers in the designated camp sites.

Permits to start camp fires in places in the national forest other than those designated will be required after June 1. This will make it possible for the Memorial day week and campers to go into the woods tomorrow and Sunday without camp fire permits, it is explained by Supervisor H. L. Plumb.

A. H. Bruce, who accompanied Workman, is suing for \$10,000 for injuries received, which he alleges are permanent.

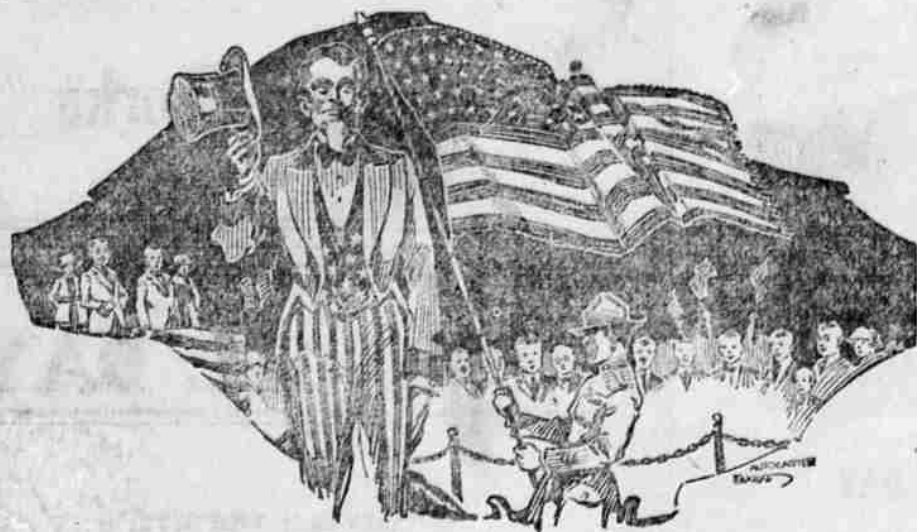
