

Pacific Coast Records Will Be In Danger On Saturday

STANFORD TEAM THE FAVORITE

Hartranft and Devine Likely Stars

SEATTLE, May 29.—Several Pacific coast conference records may go by the boards Saturday when teams of eight Pacific coast universities and colleges will put forth their best in the annual conference track meet.

Stanford looms as the heavy favorite to capture the meet with Washington considered second in the possibilities. Oregon, winner of last year's meet, lost many of her best men and is not considered a possibility.

The outstanding figure of the meet will be "Tiny" Hartranft, great Stanford field man. He recently exceeded the world's record in the discus with a toss of 157 feet 1 3/4 inches. Saturday he is expected to at least pass the conference record of 148 feet six inches set by Pope of Washington in 1921. He is also an expert performer in the shotput.

Stanford men also have the best marks of the coast this year in the high jump and the javelin throw. Other teams have outstanding figures in various events. Sweet of Montana has done the 100 yard dash in 9.3 seconds and he may take first in that event.

John Devine's sensational two mile run of last Tuesday's meet of 9:35.9 was under the standing coast conference. He is in good condition for the grueling race Saturday.

Charteris of Washington, in the half mile, and Nardin, in the pole vault, are expected to place well.

The eight schools participating in the meet are: Washington, Washington State college, Oregon, Oregon Agricultural college, Whitman, Stanford, Idaho and Montana.
