

# Brooks-Scanlon And Redmond Divide Week End Series

## SAWMILL TEAM ADDS STRENGTH

### Infield Speeded Up, New Pitcher Has Class

The Brooks-Scanlon and Redmond baseball teams broke even in the week end series here, but in so doing the erstwhile downtrodden lumber handlers administered to the Redmond team its first defeat of the season and demonstrated that they have finally hit a stride which places them on an even footing with the other Central Oregon clubs.

Redmond won Saturday's game 11 to 6, largely due to the fact that Brooks-Scanlon hadn't yet corralled a real infield. H. Dieters, a new recruit from Portland, pitched good ball, and although Redmond got 12 hits, only four of the visitors' runs were earned. Brooks-Scanlon's 10 errors told the rest of the story.

Dieters had more smoke than has been exhibited by any pitcher here in several years, and he also demonstrated control and remarkable ability in fielding his position, knocking down five fast drives that should have been hits. But the Redmond boys liked his fast ball, especially Tetherow, who gathered four hits, two of them three baggers. Dieters walked the veteran slugger the fifth time and struck him out the sixth. Largely due to Dieters' pitching, the game wasn't a walk away for Redmond in spite of the continuous hooding in Brooks-Scanlon's front yard. The visitors got four runs in the first two innings, the home team taking two in the third. In the sixth Brooks-Scanlon took the lead by pounding the ball until three men had crossed the home slab.

Redmond took one more in the seventh, making the score five all, where it stayed until the final inning opened. Then the combination of Redmond's three hits and Brooks-Scanlon's four errors caused Redmond to score six runs. Brooks-Scanlon got one in its half.

**Win Second Game**  
With the hole in its infield stopped up by the presence of Swick, and with everybody on the team hitting the offerings of the overworked Tetherow, Brooks-Scanlon took the second game with more ease than the score indicates. The home team stowed down several times when it had an apparently safe lead, then buckled down to work again when Redmond came up from behind and threatened to steal their victory from them.

Redmond got more hits off Oliver than it had when Dieters was pitching, but the errorless ball played by Brooks-Scanlon's infield kept the score down. In this game, Redmond's fielding was not so good as in Saturday's contest, although a number of its errors were excusable.

Swick, Stapleton and H. Dieters each got three hits, and Stapleton, in addition to playing a good game behind the plate, made the almost unique record of scoring every time he came to bat.

Weigand, O. Holloway and Van Matre distinguished themselves with the willow for Redmond, Holloway getting four hits and the others three. Van Matre, coming up with two out in the ninth inning, smacked out the only home run of the series, although one of H. Dieters' hits would have been a home run except for a ground rule. Holloway hit for three bases twice.

Injudicious base running kept Brooks-Scanlon from scoring in the first inning and robbed them of a probable run in the second. The locals did get one score in that frame, and Redmond got two. Brooks-Scanlon got a run that it didn't earn in the fourth, tying the score.

In the fifth the real damage was done, when the sawmill gang forced over five runs, on a basis of four hits and two errors. Another was added in the sixth, and it looked like a game all stowed away, with the score 7 to 2.

**Visitors Fight Hard**  
Then Redmond got busy, pounding in two runs in the sixth and two more in the seventh. Brooks-Scanlon cut loose again with three in the last half of the seventh, two of them being earned.

Redmond picked up on that lead in the eighth with three earned runs,

## BERLENBACH TAKES LIGHT HEAVY CROWN

### New Champion Not Expected to Hold Title Long

NEW YORK, June 1.—"You're a fine boy and I hope you'll hold it a long time," Mike McTigue said to Paul Berlenbach Saturday night after the judges had transferred the world's light heavyweight championship to the former Olympic wrestler.

The descent of McTigue from the throne did not cause any national mourning and the elevation of Berlenbach did not prompt any outbursts of enthusiasm. It is the general opinion that the new champion will not be much better than his predecessor and that it will take more than the good wishes of McTigue to keep him in office.

McTigue remained the champion for a long time by refusing to fight any formidable opponent in a decision fight. His bout with Berlenbach was the first one he fought since he won the title from Black Battling Siki in Dublin on St. Patrick's day. Berlenbach can reign as long as McTigue did or longer if he follows the same safety first tactics but he is a frugal young man and he will take chances for the money.

Berlenbach is not a great fighter. He knows absolutely nothing about boxing and he can do nothing but hit. He is the hardest puncher in the game, but McTigue was not particularly hurt by any blows that landed on him. It was McTigue's age more than anything else that beat him.

For the past five years these two ladies have fought it out tooth for tooth. It started in 1920 when Joyce won her first championship. Miss Leitch was the runner up that year and also in 1922. Then last year they met in three private matches with Miss Wethered having the edge each time. This time they fought it out on an extra hole to settle the argument.

Miss Wethered is a sister of Roger Wethered, a former British amateur golf king.

The Limey critics acclaimed Miss Wethered the best woman golfer in the world when she trimmed her rival last year. American fans became a bit peeved and let out a
