London Still Possible as
Meeting Place

COOLIDGE IN FAVOR

Italy Given \$50,000,000 Credit by J. P. Morgan to Stabilize Lire Value

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)
WASHINGTON, June 2.—President Coolidge today opened the door which Secretary Kellogg and Secretary Mellon slammed yesterday on the suggestion of a French-British-American debt conference in London. The White House spokesman said that although the debt funding commission thinks Washington is the proper place for funding negotiations, Coolidge understands this decision is not final. The president is willing to abide by the advice of the commission, which has jurisdiction over the matter.

Without naming the valedictory editorial by Colonel George Harvey in the Washington Post, proposing the London conference, the White House spokesman said the president deems such suggestions helpful, whether they come from official or newspaper sources.

London Not Convenient
Officials of the state and treasury departments yesterday disapproved the Harvey proposal as untenable on the grounds that Washington is the natural place for the funding of debts to this country and that cabinet members of the debt commission could not meet conveniently in London.

ROME, June 2.—Minister of Finance De Stefani announced in the chamber today that Italy had reached an agreement with the J. P. Morgan banking interests whereby the Morgan company will open a credit in the United States amounting to \$50,000,000 in behalf of Italy.

McKenzie Pass Route Will Be Opened Soon

Steam Shovel to Start on
Drifts in Few Days

Tractor and Grader Then to Be
Brought Into Play Against
West Slope Snow Fields

That the McKenzie pass road will be open to automobile travel before June 29, about a week before the dates set for the American Legion state convention in Prineville, is the information brought to Bend by G. E. Hoffman, in charge of the bureau of public roads crew now working near the pass summit.

Hoffman, who succeeds C. A. Pfaff as foreman of the bureau of public roads crew working west from Sisters, when in Bend today said that the steam shovel on the ground near the big cut in the lava, will be placed in operation in the next few days. The great drifts which block the east approach to the cut will be attacked this week.

After the cut is cleared, the tractor and grader will be moved over the summit, piercing the other snowfields which block the summit highway. In the past few days orders have been received from headquarters to hurry the pass clearing work.

Pfaff has been transferred to the Mount Hood loop. Pfaff was in charge of the work of widening the McKenzie pass highway between Sisters and the lava fields.

No Progress Possible, Says Colonel Mitchell

WASHINGTON, June 2.—Colonel William P. Mitchell, former assistant chief of the army air service, packed his trunks today to leave Washington for his new post at Fort Houston, Texas. Mitchell and his wife start tomorrow.

"I have enjoyed my duty here, but I am glad to leave because conditions have become such that no progress is possible in the war and navy departments," the fighting aviator said in a farewell interview with the United Press.

Middle West Suffers Under Early Wave of Heat

Scores Prostrated, Many More Bitten by Maddened Dogs
—Drownings Add to Death List

(By United Press Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)

The "perfect weather" month of June, about which poems have been written and songs have been sung, made its 1925 debut on the crest of a heat wave that left several deaths and scores of prostrations in its wake and gave some of the larger cities record breaking temperatures.

At the same time, various sections of the country experienced wide varieties of weather. It snowed in Wyoming. Four persons were injured and scores of buildings were demolished by a terrific windstorm at Weir, Kansas. Rain was reported from many cities.

During the past 24 hours New York's maximum temperature was 86, Chicago 92, Cleveland 90, while Kansas City's maximum was 81.

Four deaths from the heat were recorded in Chicago. New York had six heat prostrations. Nineteen persons were bitten by heat maddened dogs in Cleveland and nearly as many in Chicago.

New England was visited by severe storms during the night which did considerable damage, but afforded relief from the terrific heat of the day. At Boston a downpour brought nearly an inch of rain within an hour, and flooded cellars.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., June 2.—Ten persons were drowned in lakes of Wisconsin yesterday and last night while seeking relief from the torrid wave which has kept this section in its grip for the past few days.

PITTSBURGH, Kan., June 2.—Four persons were injured and considerable property damage was done by a tornado which struck near here late yesterday. A heavy downpour of rain accompanied the high wind. Wires were blown down, tipples at coal mines were wrecked and outbuildings demolished.

DENVER, Colo., June 2.—Colorado entered its second day of cool weather today with wind blowing from recent snowfalls in the mountains. Temperature varied from 40 to 70.

Reports from Wyoming indicated snow had fallen in mountain sections there.

PLOT FRAME UP TO AID POLICE SAYS ATTORNEY

Asks Writ for Release of
"Kidnapers"

POLITICS, CHARGED

Would Reflect Glory on Detective Chief, Who Would Be Sheriff, Stated

LOS ANGELES, June 2.—The alleged plot to kidnap Mary Pickford and other film stars was a "frameup," designed to "reflect glory" on the Los Angeles police department, it was charged this afternoon by S. S. Hahn, noted criminal lawyer.

Hahn is attorney for C. A. Stevens, Claude Holcomb and Adrian James Wood, held on suspicion of conspiracy in what police claim was a gigantic scheme to abduct Miss Pickford, Jackie Coogan, Pola Negri and a grandson of E. L. Doheny, oil magnate.

Hahn has filed a writ of habeas corpus, returnable tomorrow, and if formal charges are not lodged against the men by that time, it is probable they will be released.

"This entire plot was the handiwork of the local detective force," Hahn told the United Press. "The Los Angeles police have lent themselves to a scheme to further the political ambitions of Chief of Detectives George Home, who retires from office next week. Home, I understand, will be a candidate for county sheriff."

"There is no case against these men and I feel certain they will be released tomorrow."

Hahn claimed Louis Geck, whom Home had previously said would be an important witness against the alleged conspirators, as a party to the plot.

Liquor Possession Charged
After Police Raid

Realtor Claims He Was Just By-stander—Police Testify He
Handled Moonshine

Charles Carroll, tried today in municipal court on a charge of possession of liquor, was anxiously awaiting a verdict at 3 o'clock this afternoon, the jury having gone out about half an hour before that time.

The trial was the result of a raid conducted early last Thursday morning at a house at 29 Greeley avenue, when Carroll, local realtor, was arrested along with Ony Thompson, while several kegs of moonshine and a case of liquid labeled Gordon gin, were being loaded into two automobiles.

Brewery Fined \$10,000 For Boozie Law Breaking

ST. LOUIS, Mo., June 2.—The Griesdeck Brothers Brewery, which pleaded guilty to charges of conspiring with Heber Nations and others to violate the national prohibition law, was fined \$10,000 in federal court today.

The case against Charles S. Prather, former food and drug commissioner of Missouri who confessed to his part in the conspiracy, was continued until the September term of court.

Holdup and Gun Fight Claims Bandit Victim

ROSEVILLE, Cal., June 2.—An unidentified Mexican is dead, a second is seriously wounded and a vigorous search is being conducted for a third as the result of a daring holdup and gun battle staged here last night.

Entering the soft drink establishment of Angelo and Joe Lera here shortly before midnight, the trio of Mexicans forced the men into a back room of the building, where they were bound and gagged.

The bandits then proceeded to search their victims, removing \$1,000 from Joe Lera's pockets and taking \$200 from the cash register.

ENTIRE COURSE OF SCHOOL LAW TO BE CHANGED

Supreme Court Opinion
Sets Precedent

LIMITS STATE RIGHT

Hundreds of Thousands of
Children Throughout Na-
tion Are Affected

WASHINGTON, June 2.—By its decision in the so-called Oregon school law case yesterday, in which it held that the parent and not the state has the deciding word in what the child shall be taught, the supreme court may have altered the entire course of legislation regarding religious teachings in the schools, it was believed here today.

The Dayton, Tenn., evolution case may fall on the supreme court's ruling because the decision opens the way for a declaration that the anti-evolution law in Tennessee is unconstitutional in that it means dictation by the state and not the parents as to what a child shall be taught.

Opinion Far Reaching
Laws for and against teaching or reading of the Bible in the public schools and giving school boards the right to permit churches to conduct "church schools" at stated times each week as they do in many cities in connection with school work, may be affected in the same manner.

"The child is not a mere creature of the state," the decision of the supreme court said.

The decision is expected to end the drive against private and parochial schools which was backed by the Ku Klux Klan and other organizations and resulted in the adoption of the law in Oregon at a referendum.

Crowd Likes Glee Club, and Glee Club Likes Bend

City of Los Angeles In Hands of Shriners

LOS ANGELES, June 2.—Los Angeles was completely taken over today by conquering hosts of Shriners.

The last of the straggling caravans to complete the long trek over burning sands reached the oasis this morning when Karbella temple from Knoxville, Tenn., and Syrian temple, Cincinnati, crashed the gates of the cinema citadel with their thundering hoards of noise makers. Other late arrivals poured through the petals of Mecca during the night, and by 9 a. m. when the triumphant hosts assembled to officially take possession of the western oasis, Los Angeles was literally police-less, traffic-less and given over to the conquerors.

Woman Leaps to Death Under Wheels of Train

There were no identification marks on her clothing. She was about 35.

Chief Engineer of O. T. Heads South From Bend

Party Believed Checking on
Extension Surveys

Location Crews Not At Work Between Bend and Klamath—
Private Car Is Sent Out

A. J. Witchel, chief engineer of the S. P. & S., arrived in Bend yesterday on a special car, accompanied by a small group of other railroad officials, most of them engineers.

Since the special car which brought Witchel to Bend was returned to the main line last night without the engineers, Witchel and his party came here for the purpose of going into the interior.

Four or more Oregon Trunk surveying crews are now working on the proposed parallel extension of a line south from Junction Point, and north on a single extension to Bend. Witchel will undoubtedly make a personal inspection of the proposed routes.

When it became known yesterday that a private car bearing railroad officials had reached Bend from the main line, a rumor was current that President Turner of the Oregon Trunk had arrived here.

WRECK IS BLAMED TO TRAIN ROBBERS

Spikes Removed, Seven
Coaches Leave Tracks

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., June 2.—Derailing of seven coaches of Santa Fe passenger train No. 6 northbound, Oklahoma City to Kansas City, at 4:15 a. m. today, was believed the work of a gang of train robbers.

The spikes were found to have been removed from the ties, allowing the rails to spread. The seven coaches rolled down a 25-foot embankment.

Whether the mail cars carried a valuable cargo or not could not be learned.

All of the coaches and the engine left the track.

The train had just slowed down on a danger warning from the block signal. It was moving along cautiously at a speed of less than ten miles an hour when the rails gave way.

The passengers were transferred to another train sent from Guthrie.

Garage, New Auto Wrecked By Big Dynamite Charge

Lives in Shanghai

REDS IN CUSTODY

Accused of Fomenting Trouble Among Chinese Labor Organizations

WASHINGTON, June 2.—A landing force of 2,000 men from American and foreign naval vessels at Shanghai has been arranged by American Consul Cunningham and other foreign representatives at Shanghai, the state department announced today.

SHANGHAI, June 2.—As result of grave developments in the rioting which has grown from student agitation against foreigners here, martial law has been declared and foreign consuls have asked that more warships be sent to protect this city.

Several foreign warships already are reported en route to Shanghai in response to the consuls' pleas.

Thus far 13 persons have been killed and 60 wounded, including several policemen.

The general strike declared by the Chinese is spreading rapidly.

Several Russian communists have been arrested on charges of fomenting trouble among Chinese labor organizations.

The present student outbreak in Shanghai is the most serious of a long series of agitations which started in 1919 when the students realized their political power following a campaign for a boycott on Japanese goods. The boycott was a protest against awarding the Kiao Chow territory in Shantung to the Japanese.

Officials Cowed
Officials dared not stop them for fear of being called unpatriotic and pro-Japanese.

Since then the students, most of whom are radical in politics, have staged demonstrations at frequent intervals against all foreigners. They are not supported by any other group, but by organization have seriously embarrassed both foreigners and Chinese officials.

The present campaign has been going on all winter and is against all foreigners. The students declare that the time has come for the foreigner to give up the treaties imposed on China and which give the foreign powers virtual control of the customs, salt revenues, postoffices and foreign commerce.

In the last six months there have been strikes or demonstrations organized by students in Peking, Tientsin, Hankow, Chang Sha and in smaller commercial cities.

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
