

Babe Back in Game But Still Far From His Old Self

HOSPITAL LIFE IS WEAKENING

Utterly Worn Out With Six Innings of Ball

NEW YORK, June 2.—Babe Ruth is back in the game, but he is not ready and it may be two weeks or more before he will be of any real assistance to the distressed and diminished New York Yanks.

This much was shown clearly when an exhausted Babe had to be taken out in the sixth inning of his first game of the season. The confinement of six weeks in the hospital had so weakened the Babe that he collapsed in trying to make the circuit from first base home on a triple by Bob Meusel.

When he rounded third it was apparent that he could not beat the throw from the outfield and it was doubtful that he would be able to just the distance, but he stuck it out and made a dive for the plate. He was completely done up and remained on his face in the dust for several minutes. In the next inning he made one of the greatest catches ever seen in the Yankee stadium when he ran far up on the mound in right center field and pulled down a safe home run from the bat of Joe Judge, the Washington first baseman. He fell and rolled over and over down the hill, but kept his hands on the ball. That finished the Babe. He washed up and went home.

"I won't get strong sitting on a chair," the Babe said. "I gotta get out there and get going. The weather was against me yesterday, but I guess I gotta get used to it because it's time for it to be hot."

"One thing that pleased me," the Babe continued, "was that I still got the old eye. It was tough for me to be shoved in against Walter Johnson. You think he still ain't got a fast one? Well, you stand up there and look. That old fellow still can throw 'em past you."
