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FIND AMERICAN IN NATIVE JAIL AMONG CHINESE

Incident Held Proof of Shanghai Enmity

RIOTING INCREASES

New Outbreaks Reported to Authorities—Little Loss of Life Among Foreigners

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)
SHANGHAI, June 3.—F. J. Trellan, a sergeant in the American volunteers, was found today locked in a prison in the native section of the city after being missing five days.

He had been hustled into the prison after native police mistreated him when he passed the foreign settlement boundary in full uniform.

The American consul brought strong pressure to bear upon the highest authorities to obtain his release.

The incident was taken as conclusive proof of the Chinese police hostility to foreigners.

OFFICIALS ASK HELP

SHANGHAI, June 3.—Mad rioting of students and strikers here is on the increase.

Several new outbreaks in which lives were lost have occurred and the local authorities, finding the situation rapidly getting out of hand, have not only issued orders to shoot to kill, but have begged foreigners to assist in maintaining order.

With American marines guarding the reservoir, other American and foreign residents were today pouring into headquarters to volunteer assistance against the rioters, who, it is claimed, are urged on by bolshevik agitators.

Twenty-one deaths and 100 persons wounded are known to have resulted since the start of the trouble last Saturday but the casualties among the foreigners are slight.

American and British naval forces are expected tonight.

Small bands of rioters tonight were attacking foreigners in outlying districts with clubs and stones.

Tram car service is being suspended due to the smashing of car windows by the rioters.

Sailors Take Hand

With strikes in all lines increasing, British sailors took over the manning of the power plant so that the city might not suffer from electricity shortage.

Chinese police, outside the foreign settlement, were accused of encouraging the rioters and of not aiding the foreign citizens properly.

Student demonstrations were lacking while funerals of bullet victims were being held outside the foreign colony limits.

Forces from an American destroyer are on patrol at the water works, following an attempt by rioters to cut off the city's water supply. Though these forces are comparatively small, they have instilled fear into the hearts of the rioters insofar as a further attempt to shut off water is concerned.

The consensus of opinion in the foreign quarter was that the present test of strength will affect materially the future relations between Chinese and foreigners, probably encouraging the Chinese materially if strong action is lacking.

SAYS U. S. CONSUL VICTIM OF ATTACK

"No Information" Only Comment in Washington

LONDON, June 3.—Because he allegedly failed to salute fascists at Leghorn, Italy, Acting American Consul Franklin Gowen of that city was beaten and had to be taken to a hospital, according to private letters received today in foreign consular circles.

Gowen, who is related to a wealthy Philadelphia family, was clubbed in to unconsciousness and left lying in the street until police recognized him and sent him to a hospital, the letter said.

The advice added that the attack was made by a group of "fascist railway military" from near Rome, attending a fascist anniversary celebration at Leghorn May 24.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—The state department today said it was without information of an alleged fascist attack upon Acting Consul Gowen at Leghorn, Italy, on May 24.

President Coolidge Salary Exempt From Taxation Is Ruling Handed Down by U. S. Supreme Court

Saving of Between \$7,500 and \$8,000 a Year Effected—Refunds to Be Allowed Estates of Woodrow Wilson and Warren G. Harding, as Result of Opinion

WASHINGTON, June 3.—President Coolidge has been exempted from paying income tax on his \$75,000 a year salary.

Congress overstepped its constitutional powers by inserting clauses in the 1918, 1921 and 1924 revenue laws specifying that judges of federal courts and the president must pay taxes.

The White House has been notified that a decision by the supreme court Monday ruling these provisions of the laws invalid insofar as they affect federal judges' salaries also applies to the president's salary.

Southern California Swarms With Shriners

Los Angeles Traffic Halted by Many Marchers

Grand Parade Scheduled for Tonight, With 200,000 in Line—Quakers Make Bid

LOS ANGELES, June 3.—James C. Burger, Denver, was officially installed as imperial potentate of the Shriners at the annual meeting of the imperial council today, succeeding James E. Chandler, Kansas City.

Burger was automatically elected to the high office, having been imperial deputy potentate the past year.

Philadelphia will be the 1926 Mecca of Shriners, the imperial council declared.

LOS ANGELES, June 3.—Southern California literally swarmed today with the marching hosts of Shriners.

From the hills of Hollywood to the beaches, the fezzed merrymakers did their romping and performed their stunts.

A California real estate man and Shriner was the first casualty of the annual convulse. This was Fred M. Shelton, who broke a leg when he was thrown from the back of a camel he was attempting to ride at a rodeo.

Shrine bands and chanters kept downtown traffic at a virtual standstill.

Tonight for the first time since the 51st annual convulse opened yesterday morning, the entire rank and file of the marching nobility will be seen in massed formation. The nobles and their bands, patrols and chanters go on parade, nearly 200,000 strong.

The million dollar cinema pageant will take place tomorrow night when the stars of the films parade downtown streets in their best movie makeup.

With the festivities at their height, the imperial council of the Shrine went into session behind closed doors to plan for the business section of the convulse tomorrow.

At this time the Shriners will select their next meeting place, which many predict will be Philadelphia.

Bend School Director Candidates Prove Coy

Although the annual school election of the Bend district is less than two weeks distant, no candidates have as yet filed. The final date for candidates to make known their intention is June 8.

The vacancy on the board this year will be created through the expiration of the three year term of J. O. Gibson. Gibson informally stated that he will not be a candidate to succeed himself.

A meeting of the school board will be held this evening, with little other than routine business scheduled for consideration.

Holdup Suspect Is Taken, Asked Deputy for a Ride

PEACE IS PLEA TO MIDSHIPMEN AT GRADUATION

Defense Navy Purpose, Says Coolidge

PROTECTION NEEDED

Progress Dependent Upon Security of Nation, Emphasized in Address

NAVAL ACADEMY, Annapolis, Md., June 3.—The American navy can only fulfill its highest functions if it exists as "an instrument of righteousness," protecting the proper security of this country while serving to maintain world peace, President Coolidge declared today in delivering the commencement address to the graduating class of the naval academy.

"I do not believe the American navy can succeed if it represents mere naked force," said the president. "I want to see it represent much more than that. We must make it an instrument of righteousness. If we are to promote peace on earth, we must have a great deal more than the power of the sword. We must call into action the spiritual and moral force of mankind."

The president seized the occasion to reemphasize the universal peaceful aims of the United States.

"It is known of all the world we have no present or traditional enemies, that we covet no territory, harbor no imperialistic designs and are not arming ourselves with the expectation of attacking or being attacked," he said. "So far as we can look into the future, so far as we can gauge the power and temper of other peoples, there never was a time when it was less likely that any other nation or combination of nations would or could make any attack on us."

Alarmists Denounced
In this connection Coolidge vigorously denounced persons both in and out of the navy.

Scottish Rite Masons Escort for Marshall

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., June 3.—The body of Thomas Riley Marshall, former vice president of the United States, was brought back to his native state of Indiana today.

High officials of the state and city and an escort of Scottish Rite Masons met the train bearing the body of the war time vice president when it arrived from Washington shortly before noon.

Funeral services, in charge of the Scottish Rite, of which the late vice president was a state officer, will be held at the Marshall home at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning. The body then will be taken to the Crown Hill cemetery and placed in a receiving vault, pending final arrangements for burial beside the father and mother of Marshall in the cemetery at Marion, Indiana.

Bad Check Is Charged Woman Posing as Man

LOS ANGELES, June 3.—Mrs. Edna Brittendall, alias Jack Sargent, was under arrest again today, this time on a charge of passing worthless checks.

Mrs. Brittendall was arrested several weeks ago for alleged fraud in an automobile sale. She was doing carpenter work at the time and told officers she had successfully masqueraded as a man for years.

When Hollywood officers arrested the woman, she was dressed in male garb and it was several hours before her sex was revealed.

Mrs. Brittendall claims it is necessary for her to don men's attire to get work to support her children. Police said she lived for a time with Mrs. Thomas Foster, posing as the latter's husband.

Cassiar Gold Stampede Second Klondike Rush

Planes and Tractors Figuring in Migration

Alaskan Steamers Go on Double Schedule to Take Care of Thousands of Miners

VICTORIA, B. C., June 3.—The new gold rush to the Cassiar fields in British Columbia may rival the famous stampede to the Klondike two decades ago, old time sourdoughs here believe. It took on a far different aspect from the rushes of early Alaska days, however, when airplanes and tractors began to figure in the migration up the Stikine river.

In a big Vickers-Viking flying flying boat Archibald Little, Detroit mining engineer, was today winging his way north for the Cassiar district via Wrangell, Alaska. The plane left northward yesterday, piloted by Colonel J. Scott Williams.

To care for the big rush the Canadian Pacific railway will put its Alaska steamers on double service next week. The Admiral Line, operating out of Seattle, and the Canadian National Steamship company of Vancouver are carrying large lists of miners with each sailing. Over 1000 miners are expected to get away from Wrangell for Telegraph creek within the next ten days.

Many have already started for the interior. Special Wrangell advices reported that George Plattner and Robert Suratt, motion picture men, left Wrangell last night to film the dramatic march to the interior in search of gold.

Grand Jury to Probe Kidnaping Complaint

LOS ANGELES, June 3.—Habeas corpus action to free C. Z. Stevens, Claude Holcomb and Adrain Wood, accused of conspiring to kidnap Mary Pickford, was dismissed today by Superior Judge Harry A. Holtz.

The men were ordered held in city jail until Friday, when a special grand jury will meet and determine whether there is sufficient evidence against the trio to warrant indictments.

Complaints charging conspiracy were filed against the prisoners last night by District Attorney Asa Keyes.

Central Oregon Recreation Grounds to Gain Fame

National Convention of Elks at Portland Will Be Told of Region's Advantages

That Central Oregon is one of the few remaining recreation grounds of the nation will be proved to thousands of Elks from all parts of America attending the national B. P. O. E. convention in Portland July 13 to 19, if plans now being formed by the Bend Elks are carried to completion.

The attractions of the mid state recreation ground and anglers' and nimrods' paradise will be shown to the Portland visitors, estimated at 10,000, by the use of floats, a parade and a display in a window of one of Portland's largest stores.

According to present plans, the wild life float of the Central Oregon Elks will hold a strange group of animals—deer, a bear, coons, a wildcat, rabbits and other kinds of wild life of the mid state country. Arrangements have been made with Pearl Lynes, superintendent of the Tumalo fish hatchery, to use some of the animals in his small zoo.

One of the exhibits in the store window will be a large mounted elk, at present in the Harney county court house. This elk, which formerly ranged in the Burns country, is one of the largest of its kind even seen in the west. It was on display at the Lewis and Clark exposition in Portland. Arrangements have been made with Harney county to place the mounted elk in the Central Oregon exhibits at the convention.

Central Oregon as a fisherman's paradise will be brought to the attention of the American Elks in a parade to be staged by the Bend lodge. A large group of local Elks will take part in the parade, dressed as anglers. One of the anglers, trailing in the rear, will carry a large trout, taken from one of the Central Oregon streams or lakes.

One of the Central Oregon displays, which will likely be shown at the local Elks, headquarters in the Imperial hotel, will be a topographic map, showing the streams, lakes and snow-capped peaks of this part of the state in relief. This large relief map is at present being made in Bend by Clarence Jackson. Roads leading into the Central Oregon playground will be shown on the map.

Judging from plans being made by Central Oregon Elks, a delegation of several hundred will attend the Portland convention.

T. E. J. Duffy is chairman of the committee making arrangements for the participation of the local Elks in the convention.

"Otto, I'm killed!"

He rushed into the room and found her dead.

Rose said his wife gave the revolver to the baby because the child "cried for it."

CARROLL APPEALS BOOZE CONVICTION

\$500 Fine and 30 Days in Jail Sentence Passed

Notice of appeal from the police court verdict of guilty, was filed today by Charles Carroll, local realtor, following his conviction on a charge of possession of liquor. Bail was fixed at \$1000 by Recorder Louis Bennett, who had sentenced Carroll to pay a fine of \$500 and spend 30 days in jail.

Carroll was found guilty following testimony relative to his part in the loading of liquor into automobiles in front of the house at 29 Greeley avenue, when the police raided there last Thursday morning.

Only Thompson of Wagonette is ready serving out a 30-day sentence following a plea of guilty to the same offense. Thompson has not yet paid the \$500 fine imposed.

The appeal, it was reported, was to be based on a claim that Bennett went into the jury room while the jury was deliberating, to give the jurors additional instructions, instead of giving the instruction in open court.

Bennett explained that he did enter the jury room, but not for the purpose of giving the jury additional instructions. The jurors, at a time when it appeared an agreement could not be reached, asked the recorder to discharge them, and he replied that they had not deliberated long enough.

W. C. Baughn, charged with possession of the same liquor which resulted in conviction of Carroll and Thompson, was on trial in Bennett's court this afternoon, before a jury, members of which are W. O. Best, A. A. Symons, D. H. Peoples, J. L. Gaither, J. D. Davidson and J. N. Hunter.

The city is attempting to prove that Baughn was the man arrested with Carroll and Thompson. This man made a successful dash for liberty while in the custody of Officer Taylor Rhoads, who fired his revolver after him but missed.

Rhoads was to testify, according to City Attorney C. S. Benson, that he had studied the man's face carefully and that he is certain Baughn is the man.

It will also be shown, said Benson, that one of the cars into which the liquor was being loaded, belongs to Baughn, and that Baughn went to the police station early Friday morning, apparently knowing it would be there. The city also promised to show certain discrepancies in Baughn's story.

The defense claims that Baughn was not the man arrested, that he came here from Illinois recently to purchase a Deschutes county farm, and that he discovered the automobile was stolen when he got up early Friday morning to call a physician to attend his wife. H. H. De Armond is representing Baughn.

Obscene Mail Charge Made Against Pastor

CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 3.—Rev. Albert Sidney Gregg, head of the American civic reform league, was arraigned before a United States commission here on a charge of sending obscene matter through the mails.

The arraignment was the outgrowth of a series of "poison pen" letters said to have been sent by Gregg to the Rev. William C. Hicks, pastor of Grace Episcopal church here, and members of Hicks' vestry.

One of the letters had to do with a libel suit in Spokane, Wash., in which Rev. Hicks figured.

S. P. MEN ON GROUND

Dyer, General Manager, Confers With Engineers—Division Point Hoped

KLAMATH FALLS, June 3.—High railroad officials of the Hill lines were here today, speeding up the survey work of the proposed line of extension of the Oregon Trunk railway from Bend to Klamath Falls.

The data is being assembled for presentation to the interstate commerce commission, to which an application has already been made for permission to make the extension.

L. C. Gilman, Seattle, vice president of the Great Northern, and C. A. Hart, Portland, general attorney for the Oregon Trunk line, arrived here last night for the conference with A. J. Wichel, state engineer of the Oregon Trunk railway, and other engineers now here in the field.

The party will leave in a few days for Bend.

J. H. Dyer, general manager of the Southern Pacific, rival in this territory for the Hill lines, and a party of engineers arrived last night in a special car and went into conference, which was kept secret. The visit strengthened the belief here that Klamath Falls may be made a division point on the main Southern Pacific line upon the completion of the Natron cutoff.

KILLING BY CHILD IS LAID TO FEUD

Youngster Defended Mother, Is Inquest Testimony

HARRISONVILLE, Mo., June 3.—A feud of long standing was believed responsible today for the slaying of 15 year old Harold Beamer, fired upon yesterday by William Meyers, Jr., 13, and Louis Alley, 10.

At a coroner's inquest Mrs. Meyers said Harold walked into her house with a black mark over his face and carrying a shotgun. The youth commanded her to hold up her hands, she testified.

The woman called her son and young Alley, and Beamer told William to turn over all the guns in the house. When William entered the room with a revolver, Beamer fired at Mrs. Meyers, she testified, and her son fired once at Beamer. As the latter fled from the house, young Alley snatched the revolver from William's hands and fired three times at Beamer, who fell dead in the road.

No arrests have been made. Neighbors of the two families are forming into two camps, one siding with the Meyers family and the other with the Beamers.

New Murder Record Set By Chicago This Year

CHICAGO, June 3.—Already known as the "crime capital of the nation," Chicago is setting a new record for murders this year.

Figures made public today by the Chicago crime commission showed there were 170 murders committed in the first five months of this year—an average far above one each day for the 151 days.

The month of May, with 37 murders, exceeds any other similar period, with the exception of the 1919 race riots, since the crime commission was organized January 1, 1919.

School Girl Murdered, Slayer Kills Himself

LOS ANGELES, June 3.—Louise Yebra, 18, high school girl, was shot and killed today during a street quarrel with her sweetheart, Gus Juarez, 28. After killing the girl, Juarez turned the gun on himself, dying instantly from a bullet in the head.

According to information gathered from witnesses, the couple was walking along the street when Juarez suddenly drew a revolver from his pocket and opened fire.

Miss Yebra died a few minutes after arriving at the hospital.
