**INVITE WOMEN TO MEET HERE**

**Club Seeks Grange Convention, Too**

**New Secretary Urges on Membership Need for Concerted Action**

Bend in the next few years will be accorded the honor of being Oregon's "convention city" it was indicated at today's forum luncheon of the Bend Commercial club when an invitation was extended to the Women's Federated clubs, meeting this week in Marshfield, to meet here next year. Also, an invitation was extended to the state grange, now in session in Dallas, to meet in Bend in 1927.

Today's forum luncheon was featured by an address by the new secretary of the commercial club, L. K. Cramb, who recently succeeded L. Antles as executive secretary. The value of a commercial club organization to a city was stressed by Cramb, who made a plea for cooperation in carrying out an effective program of community betterment.

"I have been honored by our board of directors in being named your secretary," said Cramb in preface to his address after being introduced by H. E. Allen, club president. "I feel more keenly the responsibility, and in the discharge of my duties I hope I may justify the faith you have placed in me."

**Responsibility General**  
"However, the responsibility is not mine alone," continued the new secretary. "While the success of this organization is determined to a large extent by the secretary, yet, unless he can have the full measure of support of the members, there can be no other result than failure. I feel assured of that support, and believe we will, in working together, accomplish great things for Bend."

"I want to urge upon you, if I may, the value of the commercial club to the city and to each individual, whether banker, wage earner, manufacturer, merchant, professional man or clerk. The work being done by the commercial club cannot be performed by any other organization. What other organization can bring together all types and conditions of men to work together in true democratic spirit for the betterment of the place in which they live?"

An appeal by a private citizen, however prominent and eloquent he may be, raises the suspicion of personal benefit, whereas, if backed by the commercial club, attention is immediately aroused and the fact impressed that the entire community is speaking."

"The secretary, however capable and efficient, can not run the organization alone—it is up to you, he members, to give your moral and the members and others who should financial support and of your time," said Cramb in concluding his introductory talk to the club members.

A report of the recent visit of two representatives of the commercial club to a meeting of the Klamath Falls Chamber of Commerce was made by H. H. DeArmond. C. S. Hudson and DeArmond attended the Klamath Falls meeting Friday. Members of the Klamath Falls club will come to Bend later.

The invitation to the Federated Women's clubs of Oregon to meet in Bend next year is to be wired to Mrs. J. F. Arnold, representative of the Civic league, who is attending the meeting. The commercial club, the Allied Arts club and the Civic league are now back of the movement to get the next meeting of the federated clubs for Bend.

The point I want to make clear to everyone is that if I had bought the load of liquor from Mr. Thompson and taken it to the lake, that Mr. Pringle would not have been involved in the transaction in any manner or form, and I would have done so on my own initiative, taken my own risks and involved whatever gain or loss that might have come of it.
