

Classy Card Arranged Under Auspices Of Bricklayers

GILBERT BILLED FOR MAIN BOUT

Dean and Stolz Matched For Semi-final

Featuring such fighters as Hal Hibbard, the youthful Burns cyclone, and Submarine Dean, who won a decision over Fred Gilbert this week at the Elks' smoker, a 20 round fight card will be staged at the Hippodrome on the night of June 10 under the auspices of the Bend layers' and plasterers' local. O. H. Montgomery is the matchmaker.

Dean, who broke into the limelight at the Elks' smoker, is not to be matched with Gilbert at present, although it is generally conceded that such a match would be a drawing card, regardless of the fact that Dean is considerably lighter than the local man. On the card scheduled for June 10, Dean will be matched with Earl Stolz and Gilbert will meet Hibbard.

Considerable interest in the Burns has been manifest locally since the 21 year old fighter laid away Fred Green and Eddie Clark in the K. O. morgue in recent months. Hibbard is no fighter who has already flared through the ring firmament and is at present wielding the gloves on his reputation. He is a developing boxer, and for this reason it is believed that Gilbert will have to do his stuff. The Gilbert-Hibbard fight, the card headliner, will be a 10 round go.

Jack Barron Referee

Just what Dean and Stolz will do in the semi final is problematical, but it is conceded that Earl will meet in the Wallace, Idaho, man a cross between a barb wire fence and a sledge hammer. Dean's method of attack is one of the most peculiar ever seen in a local ring, advancing under a "submerged" guard and coming to the surface to fight in a most effective manner. Dean, by the way, has met the majority of the best welterweight and light weight fighters on the coast.

The curtain raiser of the bricklayers' card, as announced by Matchmaker Montgomery, will be a four round go between Cowboy Baxter and Chief Egbert, fighting at 160. Gilbert and Hibbard will step into the ring at 140, and Dean and Stolz at 145. Jack Barron is to be referee.

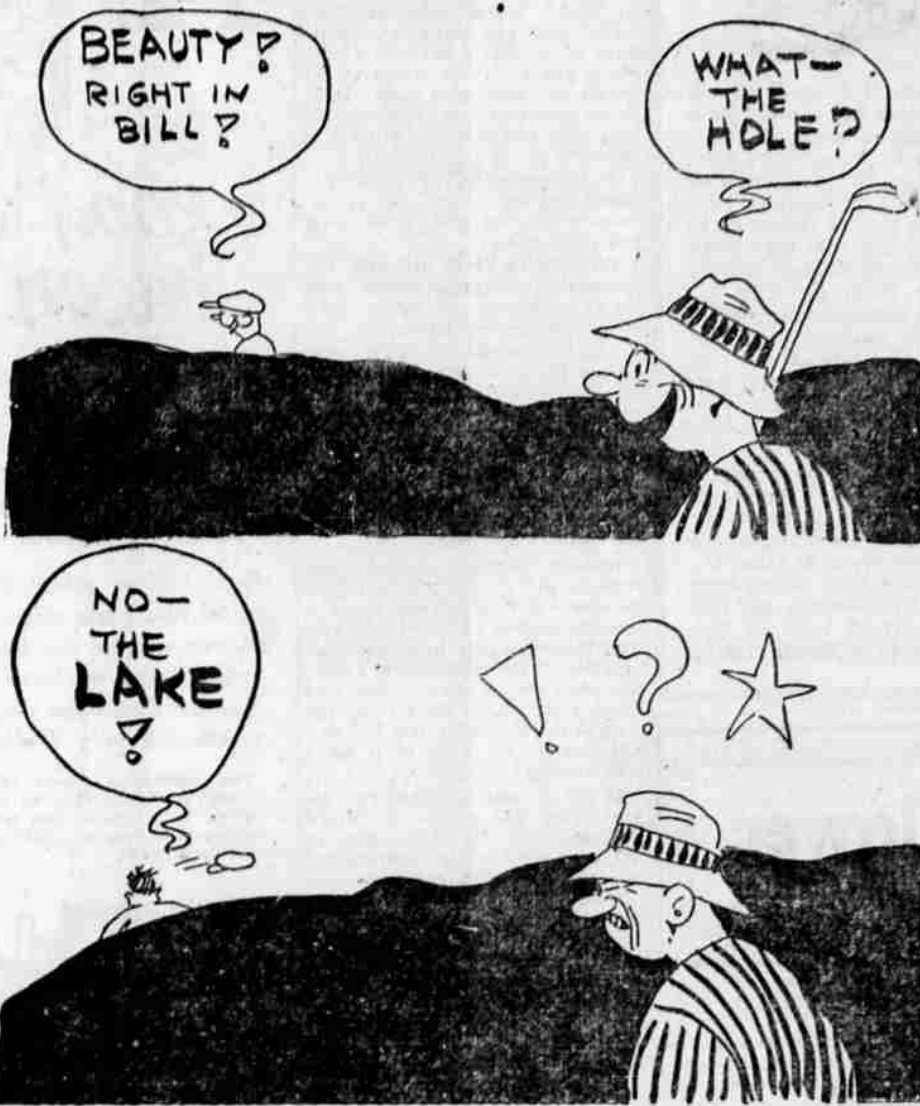

TUNNEY BELIEVES HE'LL TAKE FIGHT

Size and Strength In Favor, Pointed Out

NEW YORK, June 4.—"Somebody has to succeed Jack Dempsey as the heavyweight champion of the world and I might just as well be the

one," Gene Tunney, of the marines and the American light heavyweight champion, said today.

Tunney meets Tom Gibbons, St. Paul heavyweight, tomorrow night in a 15 round bout at the Polo grounds and he believes that the winner will be entitled to claim a position next to Dempsey in the class.

"I feel confident that I am going to be the next champion," he said. "I know that I can beat anyone who wants to claim the title and I believe I can beat Dempsey if he ever fights

again.

"I am confident that I can beat Gibbons," Tunney said. "I am bigger than he is and stronger and although he is 10 years older than I am, I know that I have had enough experience in the ring not to be a sucker for anyone. I know that I can outpoint him because no decision can be given justly for a defensive fight. If he opens up and fights, I'm sure I'll knock him out."

Tunney, like Gibbons, has been amused with the stories that they

are both too cautious to make a good fight and that the bout will be a bugging affair.

"I never knew that I was cautious and, with the exception of the Dempsey fight, I never heard of Gibbons being so terribly careful," Tunney said.

Tunney, who finished training yesterday, will weigh around 185 pounds when he enters the ring. Gibbons may be a couple of pounds lighter.

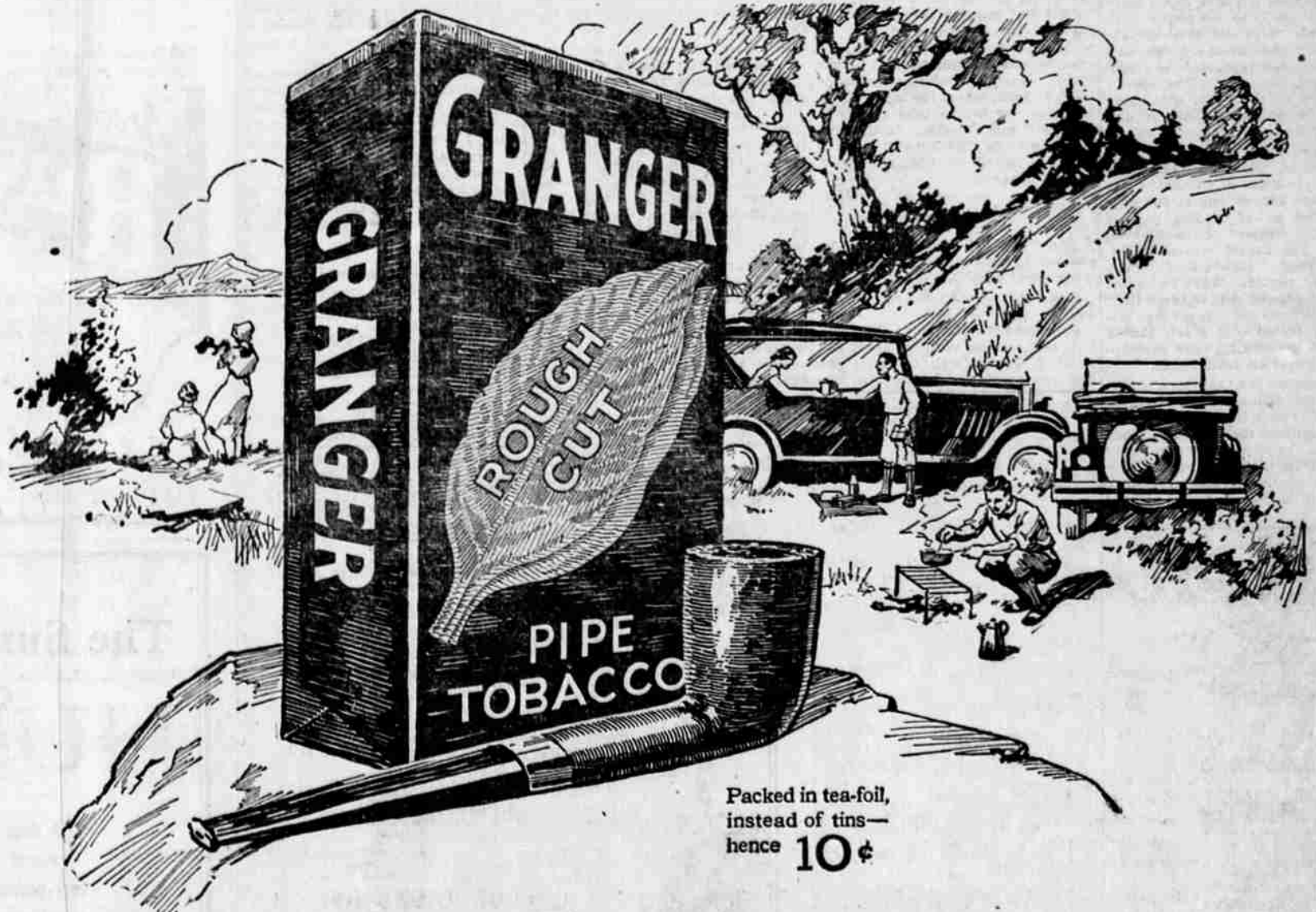
