The International Ladies' Garment Workers' union, organized 25 years ago, is observing its silver jubilee with the publication of a book reviewing its history and progress.

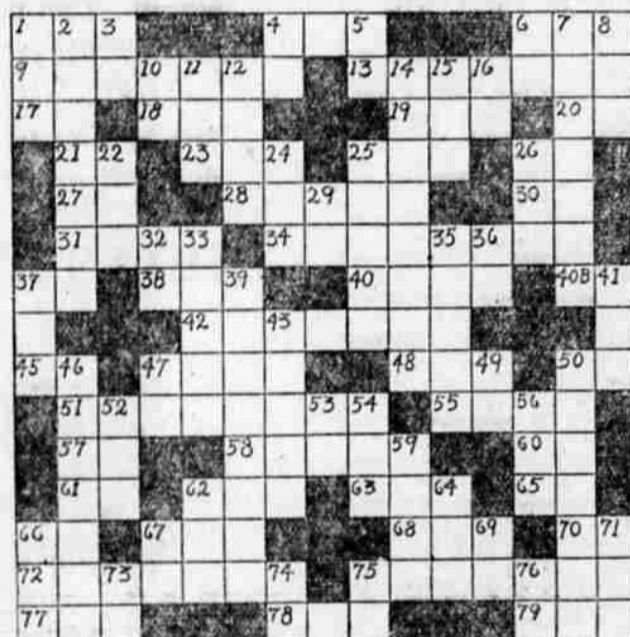
LANDLADY DROPS COMPLAINT

From the columns of The Bend Bulletin of the issue of June 1, 1910.

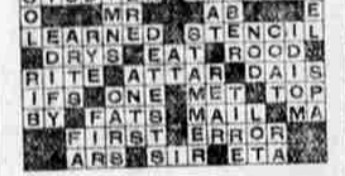
