STOCK MARKET IS AIDED BY OIL

Interest Rate Advances to 4 1/2 Per Cent

NEW YORK, June 5.—Again the market opened uncertain. Oil was an important factor in steadying the market. The statistical position of gasoline is bullish on the stocks. The rise in oil came at the right moment, for the market was stale and in need of a new leader.
Rails were obviously under accumulation in response to consolidations and rumors thereof, besides substantial earnings.
Ice sold at a new high of 114¢, nearly 10 points up since the heat wave started.
Money ran up to 4 1/2 per cent, but it did not disturb anyone, as it represented a normal situation incident to the first week of the month.
