

SPEECH SCORES WITH HEARERS

Special Train Carries President Home

Two Weeks' Work Left At White House Before Cool- idge Starts Vacation

ABOARD PRESIDENT COOLIDGE'S TRAIN, en route to Washington, June 9. — With cheering crowds of thousands still ringing in his ears, President Coolidge early today was speeding south through Wisconsin aboard his special train, bound for Washington and his summer vacation beyond.

His train, which left St. Paul shortly before midnight last night, was due in Chicago at 11:10 a. m. and at the national capital early tomorrow morning. It was the same train of five cars which took him to the twin cities.

The trip of the president to Minneapolis and St. Paul and his speech to the Norse-American centennial yesterday afternoon was generally regarded as a distinct success. It was believed that the president himself viewed it in this light, for the reception accorded him at each place was cordial in the extreme.

Not even the wretched weather could detract much from the genuine enthusiasm demonstrated by the crowds for the man who has been looked on as too cold to provoke an emotional response.

Bad Weather Braved

They braved howling winds and driving rains by the thousands to wave flags and shout cheers at the silent man in the trim tan car with Mrs. Coolidge at his side, and lined the road in solid phalanxes for 10 miles between St. Paul and Minneapolis for a wave of his hand.

But the president seemed to score despite these element handiaps. His lavish praise of the Norwegian people and their contribution to the up-building of the United States, his sympathy for their racial aims and aspirations—the question of politics aside—warmed the crowd to him.

Mrs. Coolidge with a personal success, too. With her usual charm, she walked right into the affections of Minnesota women, a sphere where politics is barren.

Ahead of the president on his return to the capital in two weeks of clean up work preparatory to abandoning the White House to the expatriates for the summer and moving to Swampscott, Mass.

By warrants drawn on the general fund, claims numbered 1 to 23 inclusive, 25 to 37 inclusive, 39 to 41 inclusive, 44 to 49 inclusive, 73 to 77 inclusive, 128 to 132 inclusive, 134 to 138 inclusive, 141, 144, 145 and 147. By warrants drawn on the road fund, claims numbered 78, 79, 81 to 86 inclusive, 124, 125, 133, 140 and 146. By warrants drawn on the market road fund, claims numbered 89, 111 to 117 inclusive, 119 to 123 inclusive, and 139. By warrants drawn on the 1923 Lower Bridge-Terrace fund, claims numbered 91 to 110 inclusive, 118 and 126. By warrants drawn on the 1923 The Dalles-California fund, 127 and 143. In the matter of issuance of certificates of delinquency on Lot 10, block 11, Boulevard addition, to Bend, Deschutes county, Oregon.

It appearing to the court that the taxes charged and assessed for lot 10, block 11, Boulevard addition, to Bend, Deschutes county, Oregon, are unpaid and delinquent for the year 1921, and that it is advisable at this time that certificates of delinquency should be issued against said property to private persons, now, therefore, it is hereby

Ordered that the sheriff of Deschutes county, Oregon, shall upon demand of any person or persons upon the payment of taxes, principal and interest, make out and issue to any such person or persons certificates of delinquency against the above described property.

In the matter of The Dalles-California highway, Crooked river bridge approach section.

Whereas, it is hereby considered that a public necessity exists for the establishment of the road hereinafter described, said court does hereby declare its intention to establish a county road in Deschutes county, Oregon, by resolution, described along the center line thereof as follows, to-wit: Beginning at a point on The Dalles-California highway (Bend to Jefferson county line section); at or near the south quarter corner of section 4, township 14, range 13 east of the Willamette meridian; thence in a northwesterly direction to a termination at the north line of section five of said township at a point located westerly from the Oregon Trunk railway on the line between Deschutes county and Jefferson county, said road to be 60 feet in width, now, therefore.

It is hereby ordered, that the county surveyor or his duly qualified deputy, shall give notice of this resolution by posting true copies thereof, properly certified to as such by the county clerk, at the place of holding county court and also at three public places in the vicinity of said proposed road 30 days previous to the consideration of this resolution by the county court, notifying all persons concerned that said resolution will be considered and passed upon

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by this court at its term on the 5th day of August, 1925, at which time the report of the board of county road viewers on said road will be read for the first time, and at which time and until the second reading thereof the court will consider any objections, remonstrances or petitions for damages which may be filed on account of said proposed road. And it is further

Ordered that Robert B. Gould, John Ringer and A. I. Wright be appointed viewers to meet on said proposed road on June 15, 1925.

In the matter of The Dalles-California highway.

This matter came on to be heard upon the viewers' report herein, and upon its appearing that this was the time for the first reading of the viewers' report, said viewers' report was read for the first time.

In the matter of lost warrant. It then appeared from affidavit filed by Anna Forbes that Deschutes county warrant No. 21412, in the sum of \$123.17, dated March 6, 1925, payable to said Anna Forbes, had been lost, and upon its further appearing that said Anna Forbes had filed a bond holding the county harmless in case said lost warrant was found and cashed, it was

Ordered that said warrant No. 21412 be cancelled and that a new warrant in the same sum, or \$123.17, payable to said Anna Forbes, drawn on the general fund of the county, be issued by the county clerk and given to said Anna Forbes.

In the matter of remission of penalty and interest on taxes levied in Deschutes county, Oregon, for the years 1921, 1922 and 1923.

Whereas, this court entered its order on April 18, 1925, remitting all interest, penalties and costs on all taxes levied in this county for the years 1921, 1922 and 1923, provided the original amount of such delinquent taxes for said years were paid before May 1, 1925; and

Whereas, it is now the desire of this court to extend the time in which interest, penalties and costs may be remitted on taxes levied in this county for the years 1921 and 1922 to the dates on which foreclosure of certificates of delinquent taxes could be instituted under the law if delinquent certificates had been issued thereon, now, therefore, it is hereby

Ordered by this court that from and after this date all interest, pen-

alties and costs which have been or may be incurred on all taxes levied in Deschutes county, Oregon, on the tax-rolls for the years 1922 and 1923 be remitted, to all taxpayers who, prior to the date on which foreclosure of certificates of delinquent taxes could have been instituted under the law if certificates of delinquency had been issued, shall have paid the original amount of such delinquent taxes on the property affected.

The above order having been made by the county commissioners, the county judge, Robert W. Sawyer, requested that there be noted on the proceedings the fact that in said matter he voted in the negative.

In the matter of indemnity bond for lost warrant.

It appearing to the court from affidavit on file herein that warrant No. 21501 of the County of Deschutes, state of Oregon, issued to Elmer Peck, drawn on general fund of said county, has been burned and that Elmer Peck was at such time the sole owner thereof, and it appearing that there has been filed herein indemnity bond approved by this court in the amount of twenty-six (\$26) dollars as required by law, indemnifying said county against all claims on account of said warrant and costs and expenses by reason of the same, it is hereby

Ordered that said warrant No. 21501 be and the same is hereby cancelled and the county clerk of said county is hereby directed to issue to said Elmer Peck a warrant in said amount in lieu thereof.

There being no further business to come before the court, adjournment was then had to Thursday, June 4, 1925, at 2 o'clock p. m.

The county court of Deschutes county met this day pursuant to adjournment, all members being present, and there being no business to come before the court, the court adjourned to Saturday, June 13, 1925, at 2 o'clock p. m.
