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CLEANUP URGED AS PROTECTION AGAINST FLAME

Leroy Fox Speaker At Club Luncheon

CITY IS RESPONSIBLE

Single Pumper Used Here Has No Chance For Aid, Emphasized

With a city spring cleanup in its relation to fire prevention as his subject, Leroy Fox, president of the Bend volunteer fire department, today noon at the weekly forum luncheon of the Bend Commercial club touched on a few of the many benefits which will accompany such a proposed cleanup. Other speakers were Mrs. J. F. Arnold, who recently attended the convention of the State Federation of Women's clubs in Portland, and F. B. McCord, director of the Shelvin-Hixon band.

Reasons why a cleanup will be beneficial to Bend were outlined by Fox as follows: Community pride, Portland convention visitors who will come to Central Oregon this summer, pride in individual property and grounds, and fire prevention. The one pumper of the Bend fire department carries more responsibility than any other such machine on the coast, it was mentioned by Fox, who pointed out that other cities can call on the fire equipment of nearby cities.

Band to Leave
Mrs. Arnold gave a report of the Marshfield convention and discussed the possibilities of the convention being held in Bend in 1926. This will be decided by the executive board of the women's state organization.

McCord in a brief talk announced that the Shelvin-Hixon band would leave for Portland to attend the rose festival next Tuesday morning. A plan was made that local business and professional men accompany the band to Portland.

Whether Bend is to have a cleanup week this year was not decided at the luncheon. This matter will be considered by Fire Chief Tom Carlson, who is out of the city at present, and L. K. Cramb, commercial club secretary. R. S. Hamilton presided at the luncheon.

Killing of Professor To Bring Arrest Soon

BATON ROUGE, La., June 10.—An arrest in connection with the axe murder of Professor Oscar B. Turner of Louisiana State university may be made within 24 hours, Chief of Police King Strenze promised today.

Finger prints of the 23 students in agronomy, the class taught by Professor Turner, have been made and police are comparing these with the finger prints found on the scene of the murder.

A new angle was given the mysterious case when a waitress in the university's restaurant told of having seen the professor in an automobile with three strange men on Saturday, the day before the murder.

Brooks-Scanlon Foreman Weds Grades Instructor

Miss Edith Swick, a teacher in the Reid school during the past school year and a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. M. Swick of this city, was married to Chris Kostol, foreman in the moulding department of the Brooks-Scanlon Lumber Co., this morning at 10 o'clock by Rev. F. H. Beard at Baptist parsonage.

After a dinner at the home of the bride's parents, the newly married couple left on an automobile trip to Hood River, Portland and Seaside. They will make their home in Bend.

The bride is a graduate of the Hood River high school and of the Bellingham normal school. Kostol is a world war veteran.

First Forest Lookout Now Is Taking Station

Fire Protection Work Late In Central Oregon

Even Now Need Is Slight, Due to Unusually Wet Season, Say Forest Men

Later by more than one month than last year, the first forest lookout to be placed on duty this year will go to the Walker mountain station today or tomorrow, according to information from the headquarters of the Deschutes national forest. This lookout is to be Paul Berg.

In 1924, the first lookout was placed on duty April 26. As a result of the unusually dry season, the lookouts remained at their posts until late in the fall. Because of the heavy snows of the past winter and the abnormal precipitation this spring, lookouts would not be needed in the forest now only for danger from fire in railroad and highway construction work, it is explained.

THIRTY-SIX TAKEN IN ANTI-KLAN RIOT

Street Is Midnight Battle Scene In Eastern Town

CLINTON, Mass., June 10.—Following another outbreak of Worcester county's anti klan war, resulting in injury to more than 20 persons, 36 men were arraigned in district court here today charged with disturbing the peace.

All cases were continued until June 20.

The arrests were made after members of the Ku Klux Klan, returning from a mass meeting at Berlin, had been attacked by 500 anti klan men, who used fists and clubs in efforts to batter the sheeted gentry into submission.

In addition to the 36 men already held, summonses for 50 more are being prepared, police announced today.

Congressman Defendant To Drunkenness Charge

PIKEVILLE, Ky., June 10.—The trial of Congressman John Langley, Kentucky, republican, charged with drunkenness, was continued indefinitely when called in the city court this afternoon.

The complaint against Langley was signed by a woman.

Langley came to court with his attorney a few hours after being released from jail, where he served a 10 hour sentence for contempt of court.

The contempt sentence was passed by Judge J. P. Harris when Langley employed a few vigorous cuss words to denounce the warrant as a lie.

Battle With Moonshiner May Cost Officer's Eye

SEATTLE, June 10.—John Lusk, a Russian, alleged moonshiner, was shot and killed by Prohibition Agent A. S. Sadler during a bloody fight on the Martin Cohn ranch near Richmond Beach early this morning.

Sadler is in the hospital, suffering from numerous wounds and cuts sustained during a terrific struggle with Lusk. He may lose one eye.

Missing Head of School Found In Canada, Report

PORTLAND, June 10.—Authorities here have been advised that Harry Johnson, superintendent of the Oregon military academy at Oregeno, near Hillsboro, has been located in Victoria, B. C.

He is alleged to have left the 40 boys in the school with only one day's provisions and disappeared, leaving a trail of \$13,000 in bad checks and unpaid bills behind him.

CHINESE SHELL HOSPITAL KEPT BY FOREIGNERS

Canton-American Building Struck

CASUALTIES MANY

Intervention Asked by One of Warring Factions In Civil Strife

WASHINGTON, June 10.—The Canton-American hospital at Canton has been struck by shells in the fighting between Yunnanese and Cantonese troops, Consul General Douglas Jenkins reported to the state department today. Jenkins has protested against the firing on foreigners, although no one was hurt.

American women and children have moved from the danger zone on Jenkins' advice, who has warned all foreigners to avoid the fighting area.

LONDON, June 10.—Fighting between the Cantonese and Yunnanese forces for domination of Canton is now in earnest, said Hong Kong advices today. There have been 200 casualties thus far, the dispatches said.

The Yunnanese, hitherto confident of victory, were reported to have appealed to foreign consuls to send a fleet to intervene in the fighting and end it.

In Honan, opposite Canton, the spirit amongst the foreign colony is somewhat quieted, according to the messages, since American marines have been landed for protection of the foreigners and of the Christian college on the island.

Shanghai was reported quiet.

TRAFFIC STOPPED

SHANGHAI, June 10.—Coastal and river traffic has ceased here as far as the British and Japanese are concerned.

Their boats are tied up, unable to turn a wheel because of the seamen's union order to seamen not to work on the British and Japanese lines.

As a result of the tie up—only a few Chinese craft are operating—a warning has been radioed to sea to their boats to shun Shanghai.

Meantime, the trial of rioting students continues. Two American missionaries, differing from previous witnesses, declared that in their opinion the police shooting between the students and strikers had not been justified.

The secretaries of the Pekin legations have arrived to start investigations of the recent rioting.

TO AID STRICKEN

PEKIN, June 10.—Forty thousand demonstrators, participating in a meeting before the central entrance to the forbidden city, voted to send \$1,000,000 (Mexican) for the relief of the Shanghai strikers.

Resolutions were adopted favoring China taking back foreign concessions, compensation for victims of the Shanghai shooting and withdrawal of British and Japanese consuls.

The demonstrators paraded the city, despite a thunderstorm, but were not permitted to enter the legation quarter.

INSTRUCTORS, RESCUED

HONG KONG, June 10.—The American staff of the Christian college at Canton was taken today to places of safety by an American gunboat while Chinese students massed about the college, demanding that the troops depart.

Typhoid Germ Murder Jury Picked At Last

Four Weeks Taken In Selecting Twelve Men

Would Exclude Testimony Having to Do With Death of Millionaire Orphan's Mother

CHICAGO, June 10.—The jury which is to decide whether William D. Shepherd murdered his millionaire ward, Billy McClinton, was completed this afternoon.

The last panel of four was sworn in, thus filling the jury box with 12 men who have formed an opinion on the merits of the case. Nearly four weeks were consumed in finding 12 who could qualify.

Taking of testimony is expected to get under way tomorrow after attorneys for both sides have delivered their opening statements.

Immediately after the jury was completed court adjourned until tomorrow at 10 a. m.

At that hour it was announced, William Scott Stewart, attorney for Shepherd, will file a motion with the court seeking to keep from the jury all testimony concerning the death of Mrs. Emma McClinton, Billy's mother. Stewart maintains that such testimony is not competent when the jury is concerned only with the alleged murder of Billy.

As soon as this matter is disposed of, State's Attorney Robert E. Crowe will start his opening statement to the jury.

BRYAN BRAINLESS, SHAW'S CRITICISM

Improvement Through Ages Offered By Evolution

LONDON, June 10.—William Jennings Bryan was described by George Bernard Shaw, author, as a man "with an extraordinary uplift, but with no discoverable brains of any kind," and his fundamentalism as "infantism in its pathological sense."

Shaw's comment came last night in the course of a debate with his literary colleague, Hilaire Belloc, on evolution.

Of the churches and their aims, Shaw remarked:

"The churches have got themselves connected with an extremely tiresome lot of people."

Shaw admitted he is an evolutionist.

"When you introduce the conception of evolution," he said, "there is a promised land before you and when you reach that promised land there will be still another promised land on the horizon. You will never have to dread ultimate and achieved perfection. The moment you get evolution introduced you've got something to live for."

Ban Johnson Protests Postponement of Game

PHILADELPHIA, June 10.—"Philadelphia will have to give some extraordinary reason for their failure to play," Ban Johnson, president of the American league said here today, commenting on Washington's refusal to play off a postponement with the Chicago White Sox yesterday.

"If they don't submit some good reason, the game will be declared forfeited," he said. "I shall lay the matter before the league directors in a day or two and my decision will be rendered within a week."

Injuries to the Senators' line up caused the decision not to play, it is believed.

Escape Now Interests Youth Shot By Police

Boyd Cantrell, who was shot by Officer A. H. Selde while running away after being arrested Saturday night, is more interested in making his escape than in recovering from the bullet wound, according to a report from the attending physician to the police. Cantrell got out of bed at the hospital, violating the doctor's orders, and was found inspecting the window of the ward. It was believed that he was planning an escape. Cantrell is charged with stealing accessories from an automobile.

New Location Is Surveyed For Modoc Northern Line

PREMIER FLIES TO MAKE PEACE WITH RIFFIANS

Painleve Plane In Air For Three Hours

BLOCKADE POSSIBLE

Will Force End of Hostilities If Necessary—Territory Not Desired

RABAT, French Morocco, June 10.—Premier Paul Painleve, who flew from Toulouse to inspect the situation in Morocco and confer with the commanding French generals in charge of operations against the Riffians, arrived here today at 6 p. m.

The airplane bringing the French premier crossed over Malaga at 2:05 p. m. and landed at Rabat three hours later.

TOULOUSE, France, June 10.—France is disposed to have peace with the Riffian warrior Abd El Krim—but not so long as the latter battles for Fez and seeks to stir Islam against France.

Thus Premier Painleve described today in the dawn before hopping off by air to Morocco, his position toward the Riffian war, which he had set forth to see with his own eyes.

Against Conquest
"The day that the Riffians renounce their proclaimed intention of taking Fez and accept an honest peace with normal economic relations with our zone and the natives," Painleve said, "France will be ready to apply the word of Marshal Lyautey that the enemies of today will be the collaborators of tomorrow."

He paused and then, with even more emphasis than before, he continued:

"But peace is impossible while Krim has the intention of causing all the Moslem world to rise up and eject us from Africa and destroy our works there."

Then he reiterated what he had already told his deputies in Paris, namely, that France's aim in Morocco is solely to establish peace without any intention of taking an inch of territory.

He explained that he had been thinking for some time of going to Morocco, and the fact that he had suddenly taken the decision to fly to the battleground did not indicate that the French military situation there was serious.

French, Spanish Join

"A necessary condition for peace in Africa," he said, "is a firm, definite accord between France and Spain."

"We are going to establish a blockade of the coast against contraband arms and food supplies for Krim, and when this program is fixed we will take all necessary military and naval measures to maintain the blockade."

A Paris dispatch to the United Press over night related that parliament members were inclined to think that Painleve was going to stop the offensive, just as he halted the Champagne drive in 1917 when he was war minister and became amazed at the losses involved without material gains. The above interview, however, would indicate that there is to be a real Franco-Spanish entente.

Three Denominations Are Merged Into One

TORONTO, Ont., June 10.—The United Church of Canada, representing the most important step toward Protestant unity in the history of religion, was born today.

Forsaking their individuality, Canadian organizations of Presbyterian, Methodist and Congregational churches joined hands under the name of "The United Church of Canada" with 2,500,000 adherents.

A total of 8,771 congregations have been united.

Car of Rock Mangles Legs, Injury Fatal to Workman

His legs crushed by a carload of rock, a man whose name is believed to be Driscoll died at Odell lake about 7 o'clock last night. The accident occurred on the Natron cutoff line near the lake. The body was brought to Bend last night by George Hoover, who took the ambulance to the lake. Funeral arrangements will probably be made when friends of the dead man arrive here this afternoon from the lake.

Modoc Cave's Mystery To be Told to Whites

Indians Will Explain Secret of Retreat

Oregon Agricultural College Professor Investigating Klamath Legend Tomorrow

KLAMATH FALLS, June 10.—For the first time in history the white man will see and learn of the mysterious Modoc Indian cave on the old emigrant road between Bloody Point and Clear lake.

In pioneer days the Modocs swooped to hide in the cavern and swoop down on the whites for a surprise attack. Then they would retreat. Troops were never able to find the secret Indian lair. In 1853 an emigrant train was attacked and the entire party with the exception of one man was massacred.

Anderson Faithful and Jeff Riddle, Modoc Indians, have agreed to take Captain Applegate, who led a company in the final Modoc Indian battle years ago, and Professor J. B. Horner of Oregon Agricultural college, to the hiding place tomorrow.

TESTIMONY GIVEN SUPPORTING PAPER

Tubercular Herds Furnished Milk, Is Claim

YUMA, Ariz., June 10.—George W. Lynn, published on trial charged with criminal libel, resumed his defense in superior court today by attempting to prove the editorial accusations made against E. F. Sanguinetti, millionaire plaintiff.

Lynn's attorneys called additional witnesses to the stand in an effort to prove the wealthy Italian merchant had distributed milk that came from tubercular dairy herds, as charged in published articles.

Miss Jane Rider, state chemist of the University of Arizona, testified she had analyzed milk from the Sanguinetti dairy and found it had been treated with formaldehyde and boric acid.

John Ehrlich, dairyman, testified that Sanguinetti had urged him to continue delivering milk treated with formaldehyde after he had warned the millionaire it was dangerous. He said he had found 16 tubercular cows in one herd of 62.

MacMILLAN PLANES START FOR NORTH

Will Be Shipped From Boston to Aid Search

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., June 10.—Three planes of the MacMillan-navy expedition took off from the navy yard here today en route to Boston. They left one minute apart at 1:24, 1:25 and 1:26 p. m., daylight time.

The planes are Loening amphibians, capable of landing at will on land or water, and will be used by MacMillan to explore the polar regions and search for the Amundsen party.

The planes will be dismantled at Boston and packed aboard MacMillan's base ships, the Peary and the Bowdoin. The ships will go to Etah, Greenland, base of the expedition. From this point the intrepid explorer will conduct his aerial explorations and hunt for Amundsen.

Booze Law Violation Proved In U. S. Court

CLEVELAND, June 10.—J. E. Russell, former Ohio prohibition director, M. B. Copeland, his assistant, and Warren E. Barnett, Columbus attorney and politician, were found guilty in federal district court here today of conspiracy to violate the federal prohibition law.

They were charged with having aided a gang of Ohio bootleggers to withdraw 22,000 gallons of whiskey from the Hayner distillery at Troy, Ohio, three years ago.

Couple In Suicide Pact When Romance Thwarted

WELLESLEY, Mass., June 10.—Fifteen year old Priscilla Amidon and her school boy sweetheart, Sterling Mills, preferred death to a "puppy love" that could not be fulfilled.

Parental objection to their marriage plans is believed to have been responsible for their suicide pact, which resulted in the death of the girl and which may have fatal consequences for Mills. The lovers were found in a wooded spot near here last yesterday.

ACTION TAKEN FOR CLEAN UP OF RESERVOIR

United States Attorney To Handle Matter

INSPECTION IS MADE

Department of Agriculture Representative Here— Dead Timber Noted

The matter of forcing the North Canal Co. to carry out stipulations of its contract with the department of agriculture when permission was given for the construction of the Crane prairie reservoir, has been turned over to the United States attorney general in Washington, D. C.

This became known following the visit to Central Oregon yesterday of W. P. Staley, assistant to the solicitor of the department of agriculture, who made a personal inspection of present conditions at Crane prairie. Staley was accompanied by Crane prairie by H. L. Plumb, supervisor of the Deschutes national forest.

Action taken by the department of agriculture culminates a series of investigations and recommendations of the past year relative to the removal of the dead timber from the reservoir site. The mass of water killed timber in the reservoir basin is recognized by forest officials as a serious fire hazard.

Fire Line Considered
What action will be taken by the attorney general in dealing with the North Canal Co. is problematical. It is generally understood that the company at present cannot finance the removal of the dead timber from the reservoir site.

The inspection of the Crane prairie country yesterday revealed that the outlet to the dam is being gradually blocked by floating timber and other debris, backing the water over the basin. The water over most of the basin at present is about four feet deep, it is reported.

Wood Will Investigate Strife With Tribesmen

MANILA, P. I., June 10.—Governor General Wood is leaving here tomorrow for the province of Lanao for a personal investigation of the troublesome situation resulting from attempts to capture Sultan Raya, Moro bandit chieftain.

Fourteen Moros were either killed or wounded in the battle yesterday between constabulary and supporters of Raya, the latest check revealed.

Another stronghold of the rebels was dynamited, but Raya and most of his followers escaped to the mountains, wrecking communication means en route.

Warfare between Moro followers of Sultan Raya and the constabulary has been frequent for weeks, starting with a rebellion in the spring during which many of the tribesmen were killed.

More Astorians Taken On Statutory Charges

ASTORIA, June 10.—Two more arrests were made last night on statutory charges, bringing to seven the number of county prisoners jailed as result of a series of 16 indictments returned by the circuit court grand jury. G. Koltman, 60, was arrested on a charge of rape against a 15 year old child. He is a watchmaker. H. Metson, fisherman, was arrested for contributing to the delinquency of a minor girl. In its report to the court last evening the grand jury returned a blistering indictment of the home influences which made possible the cases of juvenile delinquency which it had investigated.

Son of Secretary Hoover To Claim Bride June 25

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., June 10.—Secretary of Commerce Herbert Hoover and Mrs. Hoover will attend the marriage of their son, Herbert Hoover, Jr., to Miss Margaret Watson on June 25 here.

The younger Hoover and Miss Watson will wed just three days after their graduation from the university, in the Stanford memorial chapel.
