

Real Fireworks Expected at Smoker This Evening

BURNS FIGHTER IS GIVEN EDGE

Real Action Is Likely In Semi-final, Too

Just what brand of fireworks will be opened up at the Hippodrome this evening when Fred Gilbert of Bend and Hal Hibbard of Burns step in the ring under the auspices of the tricklayers' and plasterers' local is problematical, but it is being predicted that something is going to happen.

This prediction was made as early as Monday of this week when the Burns fighter, fresh from California where he entertained on at least one occasion in the famed city of Hollywood, breezed into town from the Harney county ranges. Hibbard, who has not yet met a stumbling block on his climb up the stairs of pugilism, has demonstrated in his workouts in the K. of C. hall that he is ready to do his stuff tonight.

Hibbard is in all probability in better condition than any of the other five fighters who will put on the gloves tonight, and for this reason he is a favorite over Gilbert. Also, in recent months, the Burns youth has had the opportunity of working out with such men as Jack Britton and Mickey Walker. Hibbard, a rapidly developing fighter, has never yet lost one of his starts.

Although Gilbert and Hibbard are the headliners for tonight's card, to start at 9:30, the fans will without doubt see some real scrapping in the semi final, when Earl Stolz of Bend and Sol Dean of Wallace, Idaho, step through the ropes for a six round go. Dean, who has been in Bend for only a short time, last week won a decision over Gilbert at the Mike's smoker, regardless of a marked difference in poundage. Earl, it is believed, is going to have a tough time with the wiry Idaho man, who fights under the name of Submarine Dean.

Stolz and Dean will be preceded on the card by Cowboy Baxter of Bend and Chief Egbert, also of Bend, both fighting at 160. Stolz and Dean are to fight at 145, and the headliners will step into the ring at 160. The curtain raiser will be a ferocious fight between two hard hitting men, who will step through the ropes at 12 years of age. They have their parents' consent to entertain for a few minutes while the big sums are getting a final rub down.

The first bout of the fight card has been delayed until 9:30 in order that local business and professional men can see the fun, it is explained by Matchmaker O. B. Montgomery. This is pay night, and places of business will remain open until 9 o'clock. Jack Barron will referee the fights. Several automobile loads of Hibbard's backers will arrive in Bend this evening from Burns to give their moral support to the Harney county lad, who is to step 10 rounds with Gilbert.

MISS HELEN WILLS TO DEFEND TITLE

Champion's Playing Excels As Season Opens

BERKELEY, Cal., June 10.—After playing on the Pacific Coast tennis tournament June 29-28, Miss Helen Wills, American women's tennis champion, will go east the last of June or the first of July to defend her title in a series of appearances, she told the United Press today.

Miss Wills plans to play in three and possibly four tournaments before entering the national tournament starting August 18, she said. She will appear in the Essex Country club and Seabright Invitational tournaments and probably will play in the West Chester Biltmore tournament, the New York state meet. She is considering one other appearance.

The American girl champion has been playing much tennis this year in anticipation of defending her title against many rivals who may appear. Recently she made a brilliant appearance at a Sacramento, Cal., tournament. She has been putting in considerable time on the courts against men opponents, developing speed and endurance for the smashing game she plays.
