PRICES STRONG UNDER ATTACK

Oils Among Best At Today's Close

NEW YORK, June 10.—Constructive interests again yielded the balance of power in today's session. Encouraged by their successes earlier in the week, professionals continued their efforts on the short side, but liquidation showed even greater reluctance than on Monday and Tuesday to follow prices down.

After the adverse news contained in the United States Steel Corporation unfilled tonnage statement for May was published at noon, the bear element became increasingly active. But their efforts only served to demonstrate that no important quantities of stock were for sale. This situation encouraged resumption of operations for the rise in the afternoon, which attained special vigor among the representative oils, including Texas Company, Marland, Skelly, Phillips and Standard Oil of New Jersey. The market closed irregular.

Wheat Prices Tumble Before Heavy Selling

CHICAGO, June 10.—Grain futures finished sharply lower on the Chicago board of trade today. Wheat led. Realizing sales erased entirely wheat's sharp opening advance and sent prices tumbling. July led with a slump of four cents.

The spread in the nearby option was 7 cents for the day. September's and December's spreads were 6 1/2 and 6 1/4, respectively. As expected, the market responded to the unfavorable government report at the opening. Almost immediately commission houses led profit takers into the pit. Good rains over sections of the west and southwest caused uneasiness among the longs.

Corn possessed more resisting power on the continued dry weather and consequent fears of feed shortage. At midday leading professionals took charge of the market and held it firm after a forenoon dip. Provisions were lower. Influence was divided between lower hogs and grains.
