

DEATH OUTCOME IN COAL STRIKE

Mine Workers Marching to Attack

Force of 45 Mounted Police
Tries In Vain to Stem
Advance of 2000

HALIFAX, N. S., June 11.—One man is reported dead and several injured in fighting at the Besco collieries of Cape Breton, where a strike has been in progress for several months. Mine workers were reported marching in a body against the station at Cape Breton.

A force of company police this morning surprised strike pickets and after a fight succeeded in getting possession of the station building for the purpose of keeping maintenance of way operators going.

Wires at New Waterford, between here and Cape Breton, are down and details are meager.

According to reports from Sydney, 2,000 men attacked the power house at New Waterford this afternoon. The place is defended by 45 mounted police, who charged the mob, but the charge was futile. The police, hard pressed, opened fire, killing one man and wounding another, and were themselves badly beaten.

The power house not only provides energy to pump the mines but to supply light, water and fire protection for the neighboring city. The government has been asked for police protection but as yet has not responded.

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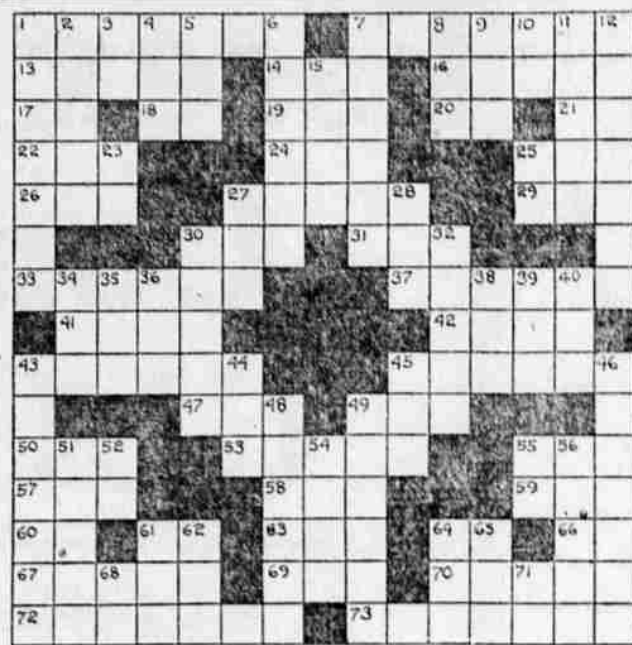
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HOW TO SOLVE A CROSS-WORD PUZZLE

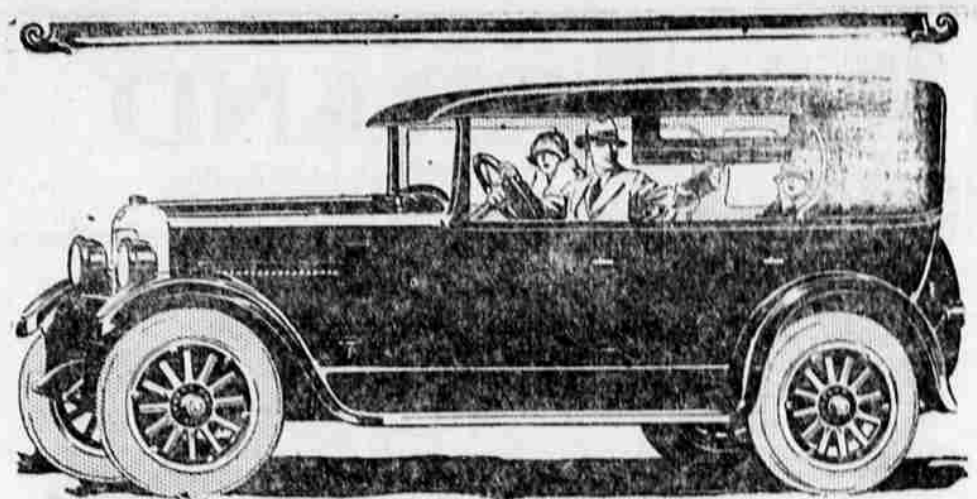
