STOCKS AGAIN START UPWARD

Bears Discouraged After Liquidation Trial

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)

NEW YORK, June 11.—Stocks broke away from their recent irregularity today, displaying a reasonable uniformity on the side of advancing prices. Bear operators were apparently discouraged by their failure to start liquidation and gave up their attempts on the short side which had exercised a disturbing influence the first half of the week.

As a result the main body of stocks were steady and nothing happened to interfere with constructive activities in shares benefiting from improving trade conditions. Oils easily maintained their supremacy in this respect. Further new highs for the year were established by Texas Company, General Petroleum and Independent Oil & Gas, while good demand was in evidence for Standard Oil of New Jersey, Marland, Skelly and Phillips Petroleum. The market closed higher.

Wheat Crop Condition Through Oregon Good

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)

PORTLAND, June 11.—Conditions of wheat in Oregon are very favorable, although due to the fact that most of the acreage this season is in spring instead of winter wheat a bumper crop cannot be expected, according to the United States department of agriculture bureau here.

An estimate of the crop as of June 1 anticipates 5,632,000 bushels of winter wheat and 14,025,000 bushels of spring wheat, or a total of 19,657,000 bushels. The 1924 crops were estimated at 15,450,000 bushels and the 1923 crop at about 28,000,000 bushels.

The condition of spring wheat was reported fully 100 per cent of normal.

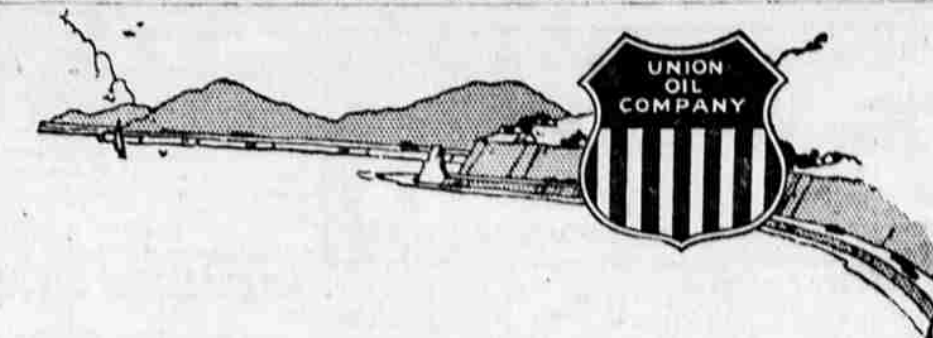
