

Club Standing On July 4 Will Point To Season's Victors

IS TRADITION OF BIG LEAGUE

Most Teams Now Have Proper Ratings

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) NEW YORK, June 12.—As the teams stand on July 4, it is a legend of major league baseball, they will stand when the checkered flag falls in October.

With the mid season approaching, the clubs in the National league are settling into the stride that was predicted when the season started. There has been a lot of shuffling and tampering around, but the first division is being occupied by regular tenants.

New York, Brooklyn, Cincinnati and Pittsburgh, running in that order, are where they were expected to be for the last half of the season, but the Cards in sixth place and the Cubs in the hole are out of place. The Cards are playing such good ball that they may finish in the first division, and the Cubs are a stronger team than the Phillies and the Braves.

The American league is still in a tangle. The strong Tigers and Yankees do not belong in sixth and seventh places, and the White Sox hardly rate a hold on third place. The Tigers may not snap out of their trance enough to get up in a commanding position, but the Yankees have prospects.

Helped by the fine pitching of Walter Johnson, who has lost only three games this season, the Senators are playing in good form and the Philadelphia Athletics have shown no dangerous signs of cracking. Unless the Yankees get going, the pennant looks like a battle between Philadelphia and Washington.

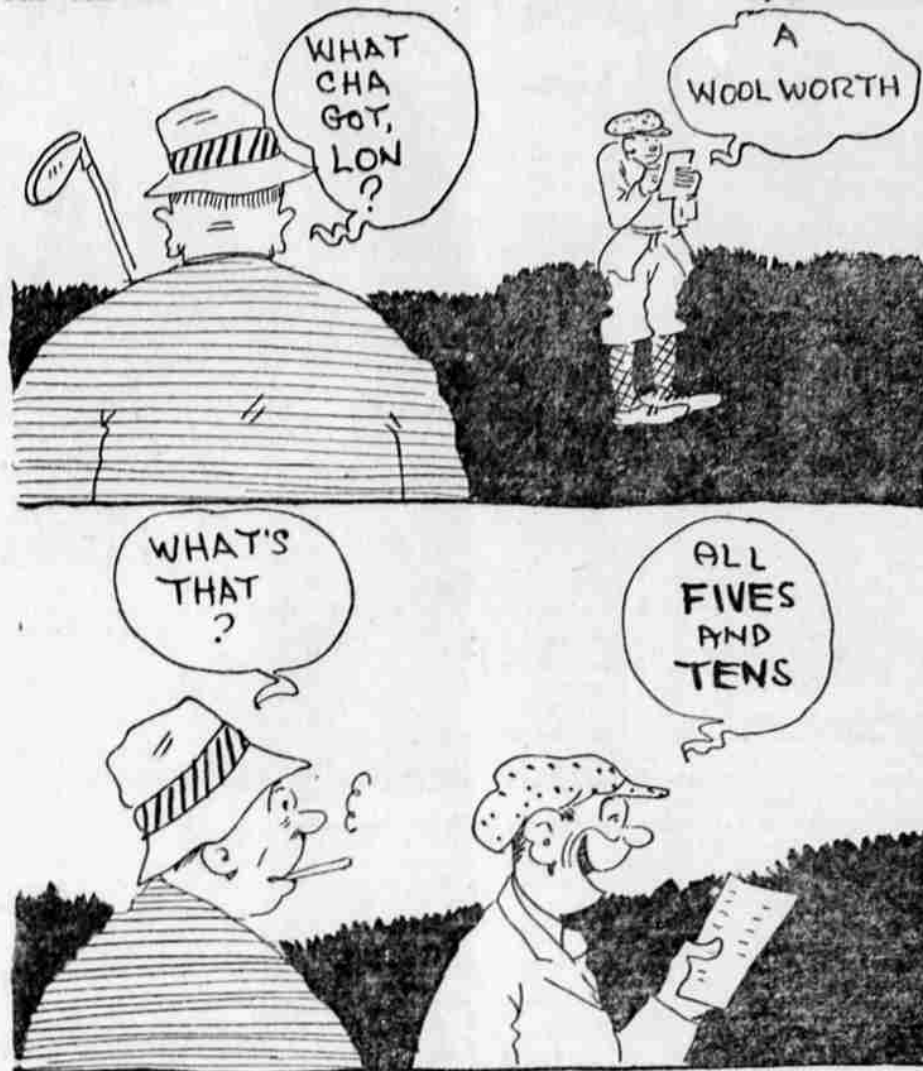

CAST SELECTED FOR ELKS PLAY

Real Talent Discovered By Director

New Ideas In Entertainment To Be Presented In Mystery Comedy

The cast has been assembled and are rehearsing every night for the Elks' show, "The Hoodoo," which will be presented at the Capitol theater on Tuesday and Wednesday, June 23 and 24.

It opens with Mrs. Fern Deskins in the part of Miss Ruth Carson, an attractive girl, who when a baby was lost, and not discovered again until 20 years later. She is the daughter of Luke Carson, a New York financial genius, the part played by C. J. McNaughtan, professional show producer, in charge of the production.

R. C. Burgess will play the part of John Blake, a young engineer who is interested in Ruth Carson, and Claude Smith will appear as Kirk Allen, the crooked district attorney of Senora County.

Stuart Rae and Vernon Clark will appear as Oliver Hanks and Luther Barnes, the two conductors of the Continental Limited, running from Los Angeles to New York, on which all of the scenes of the show are laid.

Ralph Curtis will offer a laughable characterization of the modern fiction sleuth, in the role of Sheridan Scott, who instead of classing himself as a detective, has originated the "Sheridan Deflectors," who deflect crime instead of detecting it.

Comedy Characters Strong
Mrs. A. D. Abbot has a winning part in that of Miss Nora O'Neil, a typical witty Irish girl, whose great delight is teasing the great detective. Miss Delpha Weisbeck furnished a great deal of the mystery in the part

of Miss Roxie Brown, a clever crook part.

Jay Noble will appear as Mr. Alden Murray, the legal advisor to Luke Carson, who comes to Los Angeles to take Ruth Carson back to her father. It is a strong character role. And in comedy character there will be P. E. Mayette as Titus, the colored Pullman car porter, who will be one of the real funmakers. The cast closes with a character called "The Unknown." This part is never explained, because it is the mysterious person who will puzzle the audience until the final curtain.

"The Hoodoo" while filled with plenty of comedy, will be an innovation in local talent theatricals, for it carries a current of suspense and mystery.

There will be a beautiful musical prologue to the show, with a cast of 35 of the prettiest girls of the city. The rehearsals for the musical revues open at the Elks club tonight at 7 o'clock.

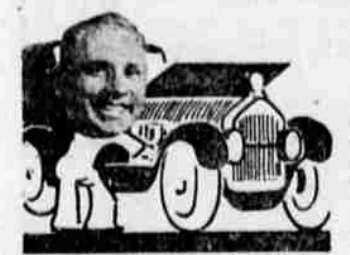
