Season Low Mark Set In Relative Humidity

Setting a new low mark for the 1925 season and dipping to a point only reached a few times in recent years, the atmospheric humidity, as recorded by the hygrograph in the forest service office in Bend, went down to 15 Thursday noon.
The low humidity, which resulted in an extremely dangerous fire situation, came as a surprise to forest service officials, for during most of the day the sky was blanketed with clouds. The humidity remained below the danger point for most of the afternoon, the hygrograph registering 20 at 4 o'clock.
Following its low dip in the hours of daylight, the humidity last night ranged unusually high, going up to 59 degrees. Early this morning the recording needle again started on its downward course. The humidity at 9:30 this morning was 40.
When the humidity is low, forest litter, as well as buildings, is very inflammable, it is explained. Any reading below 30 is considered dangerous.
