SELLERS LOSE ON EXCHANGE

Shorts Forced to Cancel Contracts

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) NEW YORK, June 12.—Indications that the market had been sold to a standstill on the professional drive earlier in the week were seen in today's session on the stock exchange.

Traders in short positions in the active industrials were forced to cancel their contracts at rising prices in the absence of the liquidation they had hoped to dislodge.

Bulls scored good recoveries from their recent lows and speculation was diverted into the copper group on an active scale for the first time in several weeks, with American Smelting, Anaconda and Kennecott in greatest favor.

Wheat Drops Rapidly Due to Crop Reports

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) CHICAGO, June 12.—Wheat dropped sharply in today's session on the Chicago board of trade. Corn was off fractionally; oats irregular. Wheat holders, bearishly impressed by general rains over the spring belt and drought stricken sections of the southwest, hammered wheat prices down sharply by persistent liquidation.

Late corn buying was influenced by reports of lighter domestic shipping and lighter receipts.

Oats were bought by commission houses and leading bulls impressed by the poor crop news.

Provisions advanced with hogs.

"Proper Food and Exercise," by ARTHUR A. MCGOVERN

Pick your hobby and ride to health

"ALL work and no play makes Jack a dull boy." If you are not as buoyant as you were a few years ago, take this proverbial warning in time. Get some play into your life which will keep your body young just as a good show keeps your mind young.

If you are continually feeling despondent and grouchy, it is due to a mental condition that nine times out of ten can be overcome by physical recreation. In my New York institution we arrange a "play program" for each of our patrons. Among our patrons are business executives, Supreme Court judges, and other men who carry tremendous responsibilities and are, as a result, a very serious minded class. For this type we arrange competitive exercises such as handball, fencing, boxing, and golf that they may run, laugh, and shout like youngsters. The result is a rejuvenation and stimulation of their minds.

A good preventative for old age is to prevent yourself from becoming a "grown-up."

One way of doing this is to select a hobby which offers some competition and allows you to frolic, forgetting yourself entirely.

Diagnose your own particular case and see if you can conscientiously say that you have a hobby.

By a hobby I mean something that means more to you than anything else—something that you would sooner do than eat.

Golf, I think I can safely say, is the predominant game of the day, and one of the finest that this country has ever taken up. The man with golf as a hobby is an enthusiast beyond words. I have known prominent men in all stages of business to chafe a large deal in order that they might keep their golf engagement.

Another excellent hobby is being a baseball fan. How many times have you been out at a game and observed serious minded executives, government heads, and clergymen forget themselves entirely when Babe Ruth drives one of his homers over the fence?

The main feature of having such a hobby is that it affords us the necessary "play." It should be carried out systematically—not alone when opportunity presents itself. Whatever form of recreation you take up as your hobby, be persistent about it. If it should be dancing, for example, do not dance six hours one night and then not again for a period of weeks. Make a habit of indulging in this pleasure two or three times a week and you will soon find yourself looking forward with keen pleasure to these evenings.

BREAKFAST: Fruit, bran or graham muffins, cocoa or a coffee substitute. Two glasses of water between breakfast and lunch.

LUNCHEON: Some soup, vegetable salad, dark bread, glass of milk, alternating with boiled or poached eggs. Two glasses of water between lunch and dinner.

DINNER: Lean meat, fish or chicken, a green vegetable, a baked potato, be sure to eat the skin, and for dessert fresh fruit in season, nuts or crackers and cheese. Coffee substitute, cocoa or chocolate.
