

Kearns Tells Commission Dempsey's Done With Ring

MANAGER SEEKS TO COME BACK

Asks Not to Be Held for Jack's Acts

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)
 NEW YORK, June 13.—In an effort to get back in good standing, Jack Kearns has told the New York boxing commission that Jack Dempsey would never fight again, it was learned today from a reliable source. Kearns and Dempsey are on the inactive list because of their failure to give the commission a definite answer about their intention to accept or reject the challenge filed by Harry Wills.

When the commission gave the champion 24 hours to answer the challenge, Kearns sent a rather flippancy letter in which he said that Dempsey had accepted the challenge several years ago and that it was up to the commission to put up the money and promote the match.

At that time it was quite obvious that Kearns did not know that he was going to lose Dempsey or that the champion was going to retire. Since Dempsey has shown a disposition to get away from the ring, Kearns has picked up Mickle Walker, the waterweight champion, and it was for the purpose of getting renewal of his manager's license that he visited the commission and found that he was in the hole.

Kearns told the commission, it is known, that he could not do business for Dempsey and he pleaded that he should not be held accountable for any actions of the champion in the future. The commission pointed out to him that when Dempsey was before them, just prior to his sailing for Europe, he said Kearns was his manager.

Kearns then is said to have told the commission "What good is a manager to a fellow who is not going to fight again?"

"I don't know what to do with 'er fellow," Kearns said today. "He's jumping all over the country and I cannot get hold of him. He has kicked a good million dollars right out of our lap. He could have had two big fights this summer, but the chance is gone now."

"I don't even know when he's coming back. If he's not here before July 2, I can't work back of Walker in the grab fight, and that means a lot to me if it doesn't mean anything to him."

BREAKS RECORD IN BROAD JUMP

Hubbard, of Michigan, Ends Brilliant Career

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)
 STAGG FIELD, Chicago, June 13.—De Hart Hubbard, Michigan's brilliant negro athlete, finished his college career with a blaze of glory here this afternoon, breaking the world's record in the running broad jump with a leap of 25 feet 10 1/2 inches, in the National Collegiate A. A. Meet.

Hubbard two years ago broke the world's record in this event but Bob Legendre of Georgetown University reached his mark at the Olympic games in Paris last year with a jump of 25 feet 8 3/4 inches.

The sensational negro today stretched his black legs more than four inches farther than the greatest leaper ever recorded in track and field history.

Hubbard also won first place in the 100 yard dash, sprinting over the century course in 9 4/5 seconds. Hubbard's performance was by far the outstanding event of the national collegiate track and field meet. It placed his school high in the unofficial point column.

Legendre of Stanford won the first event, the 120 yard high hurdles, while Ohio placed second and third. Ideal weather conditions prevailed as athletes from 52 colleges and universities competed for the national championships in the biggest collegiate meet ever held.

Team records were not officially compiled, however, the meeting being held simply to determine the individual collegiate champions.

AMERICAN FLAG IS 3 YEAR OLD KING

Is Winner of \$50,000 Belmont Stakes

 BELMONT RACE TRACK, June 13.—The Glen Riddle farm's American Flag, a son of Man o' War by Lady Comfrey, established himself as the best three year old of the season here this afternoon by winning the \$50,000 Belmont stakes, feature of the closing day of the meeting.

Gifford A. Cochrane's Danterous finished second, and "Bud" Fisher's Sweep got third money. American Flag, ridden by Albert Johnson, was a one to two favorite and his victory was extremely popular with the enormous crowd which jammed the course. Off poorly, American Flag was sent up to race behind Prince o' Bourbon, the pacemaker, for a mile. Coming into the stretch, Johnson let his mount go to the lead and he soon opened up a gap of two lengths, winning easily.

Prince o' Bourbon retired after making all the pace for a mile and finished out of the money. By himself, another Man o' War colt, expected to figure in the running of the big race, never was prominent.

American Flag's time for the 1 1/2 miles was 2:16 4/5, which equals the track record for the distance.
