"DOPE" IS UPSET, STOCKS STRONG

Hidden Strength of U.S. Steel Manifested

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review) NEW YORK, June 13.—Stocks closed the week in a burst of strength entirely at variance with the expectation of lower prices entertained in professional circles a few days ago. Quiet accumulation which has been in progress for some time in United States Steel common finally made itself known as the stock experienced a sharp advance into new high ground by the present recovery, stimulating buying of industrial shares of all classes. General Railway Signal had another sensational upsurge, followed by Westinghouse Air Brake, whose ownership of Union Switch & Signal assured the participation of the installation of automatic railway control, a business which bids fair to run close to \$1,000,000. Ward Bakling "B" reached no high ground on the movement, and Standard Milling enjoyed a further substantial gain, while brisk operations for the rice went ahead among the oil and metal shares. Salmon Five Feet Long Breaks Years' Records

ASTORIA, Ore., June 13.—Breaking a record which has stood since 1893, a royal chinook salmon weighing 35 pounds was caught in the Columbia river yesterday. This fish smashes the records which have been piling up this year and establishes a mark for size which fishermen here do not expect ever to be exceeded. The fisherman who caught the record fish is unknown, a buyer for the Paulsen fish market purchasing the salmon with a parcel of others. The fish is approximately five feet in length. When it was hung up to be photographed the weight of the salmon tore the head from the body. It is very fat and in fine condition. Old fishermen declare that in 1893 an 85 pound salmon was caught, but that there has not since been an authentic record of so large a fish.
