THE DALLES-CALIFORNIA PROGRESS

The general hope and expectation that The Dalles-California highway will be finished from the Columbia river to Klamath Falls by the end of the year, 1926, seems now not likely of realization. The road will be nearly completed at that time but there will remain one little section unfinished unless a change is made in the present program.

Let us summarize again noting particularly the new work about to be undertaken.

From The Dalles to White river the road is finished.

From White river to the head of Cow canyon by the way of Maupin surfacing is now under way. It will be finished this summer. From the head of Cow canyon to the approach to the Crooked river the road is finished.

Next week Thursday the highway commission will open bids for the construction of the high bridge over the Crooked river. This job will take nearly a year to finish. While it is under way the grading of the approaches on each side will be undertaken and as soon as the bridge is done the new grades will be surfaced. South of the river canyon the grading is to be done under a contract to be let by the Deschutes county court this fall. The grading north of the canyon will probably be under way at the same time.

From this section the road is finished to Bend although it becomes daily more apparent that something in the nature of resurfacing will be necessary in the near future.

From Bend to Lava butte a new grade is to be built as soon as existing conflicts between the recently surveyed line and the Oregon Trunk right of way are cared for. Bids on this section were to have been called next week; undoubtedly they will be called in July. As soon as the grading is finished a surfacing contract will be let.

From Lava butte to La Pine the grade is finished and surfacing is now proceeding. The contractor says his job will be done by September 10.

From La Pine to the Klamath county line the grade is finished.

From the county line to Crescent clearing is finished and next week bids for grading will be opened. As soon as this grading is done a contract will be let for surfacing from La Pine to Crescent.

Now let us jump to Klamath Falls and work back. From Klamath Falls the highway is finished north to the end of the Sand creek section.

From the Sand creek section to Beaver marsh the grading is done and surfacing is now under way.

From Beaver marsh to Crescent the clearing and grubbing of the right of way is completed. On Saturday bids were opened to grade and surface from Beaver marsh to the vicinity of Corral springs. The grading will be done this year and the surfacing is to be finished by August, 1926.

If you have followed us this far you will now realize that there remains unprovided for at present about 11 miles between Corral springs and Crescent. Unless this is graded this year it will not be surfaced in 1926. If graded in 1926 the surfacing will not be done until 1927. As we understand it this is a bureau of public roads job and the bureau will exhaust its funds for the current year with the jobs it is now letting. That means this last 11 miles will not be done until 1928-27.

To those who have looked to 1926 as the year when the highway would be finished this will come as a disappointment. However, remarkable progress is being made on the whole line, no complaint can fairly be made of the general situation and the end is definitely in sight.

Joyride In Wrong Car Ends In Crash, Arrest

Apparently so thoroughly intoxicated that he could not tell one automobile from another, W. D. Names, unable to find his own car, commandeered a machine belonging to J. C. Wright this morning and started out for a joy ride, ending after he had gotten on the wrong side of Greenwood avenue and rammed a car driven by Carl Dick, damaging both autos, according to the story told in Recorder Louis Bennett's court after Names had been arrested.
