NOTE STRENGTH OF CALL MONEY

Wall Street Swelters, But Stocks Firm

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)

NEW YORK, June 15.—Wall street sweltered in the recurrence of extreme heat at the start of the week. Although the high altitude to which the temperature soared perceptibly reduced speculative participation in the stock market, it did not diminish the force of indications recently noticeable of an oversold condition in the general list and of a scarcity in the floating supply of many representative issues.

Montana Power, Electric Power & Light, Ward Baking "B," General Baking, Standard Milling and Loos-Wiles Biscuits experienced vigorous operations for the rise.

The oil shares, however, were reactionary on profit taking; and rails were conspicuous only for the entire absence of interest which traders displayed regarding them.

Perhaps the most noteworthy feature of the day was the steadiness of call money at 3 1/2 per cent despite the fact that treasury transactions amounting to nearly \$1,000,000 were put through. This steadiness was largely due to the funds paid out by the government, which virtually offset June 15 tax settlements.

Grain Crop Prospects Better, Market Drops

CHICAGO, June 15.—Grains reacted sharply on the Chicago board of trade today, losses ranging from 2 1/2 to 6 1/2 cents.

Rain in most of the grain belt gave promise of a better crop than anticipated. Excellent promise of European crops, with consequent slackening of export demand, contributed to the downward movement.

July wheat closed at \$1.53, a loss of 6 1/2 cents. September and December wheat lost 4 1/2 and 4 1/2 cents, respectively. Corn lost from 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 cents, and oats lost up to 5 cents.

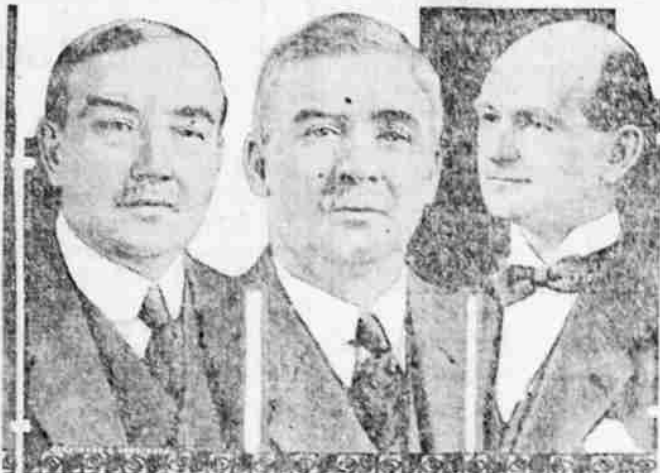

greed for wealth which caused Dr. Young at the final moment as he hid his wife's body, to remove from her finger a diamond ring she had always worn.

"This ring, which he gave to Dorothy Leopold, his office assistant, gave our investigators the first real clue to the crime. If Mrs. Young were alive, as the slayer claimed, she would have been wearing her diamond solitaire."

Although he was amazingly cool Sunday when he related details of his crime, the dentist was in a state of near collapse today. Jailers kept constant watch over him in his private cell, fearing he might attempt suicide.

volcanic material and deteriorated rock. Removal of this material was comparatively easy, but it was found that a tube of timber had to be constructed behind the workers. Timber for the tunnel was furnished by the Votta Lumber Co. It is estimated by engineers at Odell lake that this green timber will last for about 15 years in the damp tunnel. Considerable water runs into the tunnel from the divide.

Work on the Natron cutoff railroad involves the construction of 108 miles of main line and 29 miles of sidings over the Cascade mountains between Kirk and Oakridge, including 19 tunnels having an aggregate length of 16,445 feet. The Odell tunnel is the longest of the 19.
