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FORMAL CHARGE NAMES DENTIST WIFE MURDERER

Victim's Son On Stand As Witness

MILLION WAS GOAL

Immediate Trial of Los Angeles Man to Be Asked By Prosecutor

LOS ANGELES, June 16.—Dr. Thomas W. Young, the "scientific slayer," was formally indicted here this afternoon on a charge of first degree murder.
Dr. Young is the confessed slayer of his wife, Grace Grogan Young.
Indictment followed a sensational session of the county grand jury, captured by the testimony of Charles "Patrick" Grogan, 18, the slain woman's son and heir, and Dorothy Leonard, the accused dentist's former office assistant.
District Attorney Asa Keyes announced he would have the slayer arraigned in superior court next Friday.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., June 16.—Charles "Pat" Grogan, 18, the "millionaire kid," was the principal witness today before the grand jury investigating the "scientific slaying" of his mother, Grace Young, by Dr. Thomas W. Young.

Boy Escaped Death

Young Grogan is the curly haired Irish lad whose million dollar fortune, according to state's attorneys, prompted his step father, to murder his mother with a liquid gas. The state claims the boy was marked for the same "scientific death" meted out to his mother.

Grogan told the investigators of his friendship for Dr. Young prior to the discovery of the slain woman's body in its unhalloved cement crypt in Beverly Glen.

"Until he confessed he did it, I believed his story that mother had just disappeared and would return," the boy said.

The young witness told how the dentist had been his constant pal since Mrs. Young's disappearance February 21. "He gave parties for me at our home on Kingsley drive and at the cabin in Beverly Glen. We had a wonderful time."

He showed me letters from mother which I felt sure were genuine. "Then about two weeks ago he came to me with a will, leaving the bulk of my property to him in case something should happen to me. I signed it."

"I can't believe it is true, but now I know he double crossed both mother and me and I don't care what happens to him."

Will Introduced

District Attorney Asa Keyes introduced a copy of the will which the boy signed, bequeathing his estate to the slayer.

The prosecutor claims the million dollar fortune of the late "ripe olive" Grogan was the sole motive in the unattractive murder of Mrs. Young.

He demanded a speedy indictment and trial and reiterated there would be no compromise with the dentist's attorneys, who are reported willing to have Dr. Young plead guilty and accept a life term in prison.

Other witnesses included Dorothy Leopold, pretty office assistant to Dr. Young, and Earl W. Hunt, brother of the slain woman.

Mrs. Leopold declared her relations with the dentist had been of a purely business nature. She admitted a platonic friendship for Grogan, the young heir.

But told the grand jury how Grogan had been seriously poisoned by Dr. Young when he was treated for a minor tooth ailment. He said the boy was saved from death only through the tireless ministrations of Mrs. Young.

Dr. Young said the illness which followed extraction of a tooth was not serious, the witness stated. "But Pat didn't recover until he was given an antidote," he said.

Court Will Free Woman Held On Murder Charge

KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 16.—The charge of murder pending against Mrs. Mildred Arnold will be dismissed following the acquittal of her husband, William H. Arnold, last night of a charge of slaying Lawrence Hatfield, detective, prosecutors said today. Arnold shot and killed Hatfield because of the latter's attentions to Mrs. Arnold.

J. O. Gibson, Re-elected Director of Bend District, Misses Tie With Dark Horse Opponent by 1 Vote

R. D. Miles' Name Frequently Written In On Ballots In Annual School Election—Twenty-four Electors Visit Polls At Monday Meeting

Unopposed on the printed ballot, J. O. Gibson was elected director of the Bend school district for the ensuing three years by the slight margin of two votes in the annual election held yesterday afternoon and evening in the school gymnasium. Only 24 votes were cast.

SPEEDY TIME MADE IN CROSSING PASS

Cars Come From Eugene Under Own Power

Two automobiles, under their own power, crossed the McKenzie pass from the Willamette valley to Central Oregon this morning, making the trip from Eugene to Bend in six hours and 19 minutes, including time out for a battle with a porcupine.

One of the machines, a Buick, was driven by Edward V. Knox, who has already won the distinction of driving one of the first two machines that crossed the Santiam pass this year. The other car, also a Buick, was driven by Gordon Goodpasture, accompanied by William Powell.

Chains were needed west of the summit for a distance of about seven miles, it is reported by Knox. Three or four had mud holes make the summit driving difficult.

The party of motorists, the first to cross the pass this season without assistance, arrived in Bend at 6:10 o'clock this morning.

First Degree Murder Charged Against Way

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 16.—A charge of first degree murder was placed against Frank Way by the grand jury Monday night. The charge is in connection with the death of Tim Murphy, wealthy Klamath and Lake county sheepman, whom it is alleged, Way killed either with his fists or with the butt end of a revolver, after they had disagreed over ownership of a black sheep last month.

Way's interests are chiefly in the Prineville country, where he has resided for a number of years. It is expected that he will be represented in the trial by Jay H. Upton of Bend, formerly of Prineville.

Government Loses Suit To Get Back Millions

KANSAS CITY, Kan., June 16.—The government's suit to recover part of an alleged \$4,000,000 loss from the George Fuller Company, builders of Camp Funston, war time cantonment, was thrown out of court today by Federal Judge John C. Pollock.

The court sustained the demurrer of the defendant and threw out the third amended petition of the government in the case.

Pleadings were insufficient to constitute a suit, the court held.

The suit was one of several the government has instituted against war time contractors, charged with waste of federal funds.

Judge T. E. J. Duffy Upheld In Ruling On Booze Case

SALEM, June 16.—One's residence is no more sacred than one's person, in the eyes of the Oregon law, and the same information that is required to secure the arrest and search of a person is sufficient to justify the issuance of a warrant covering the search of a residence, the state supreme court ruled in an opinion today. Judge Bean handed down the decision affirming Judge T. E. J. Duffy, sitting in Multnomah county in the case of Albert Quarter, who appealed from conviction for possessing a distillery on the grounds that the magistrate who issued the search warrant had failed to take a deposition from the complaining witness.

Ochoco Farmer Files Suit To Get Land Sold For Tax

PRINEVILLE, June 16.—Frank S. Towner has filed suit against W. B. Morse and the Ochoco Irrigation district to recover possession of land and damages in the amount of \$7,000. Jay H. Upton of Bend will represent Towner. L. M. Bechtell and N. G. Wallace will represent the defendants.

The land was sold for taxes to the district for \$9,909.49, and the district leased it to Morse on a crop rental basis, and he has been farming it this season.

The "dark horse" that bobbed up when the ballots were counted after the polls closed at 7 o'clock Monday evening was R. D. Miles, office manager of The Shevlin-Hixon Company. Miles' name was written in on 11 ballots.

Since only 24 votes were cast, the switching of one vote from Gibson to Miles would have tied the count, as 12 of the ballots were marked for Gibson and 11 for Miles. If the candidates had received an equal number of votes, the director would have been chosen by the drawing of lots.

Gibson succeeds himself as director. His name was placed on the ballot by a petition circulated by his friends after it appeared that there would be no candidates for the vacancy on the school board.

Members of the board of directors of the Bend district for the coming year will be Gibson, H. E. Allen, Clyde M. McKay and Mrs. Horace Richards. J. C. Rhodes is clerk of the district and G. W. Ager is school superintendent.

ANSWER IS GIVEN GERMAN PROPOSAL

European Safety Pact May Be Realized

BERLIN, June 16.—Germany today received the allied answer to her proposals for a European safety pact. The reply was handed to Foreign Minister Stresemann by the French ambassador, De Margerie.

This answer, it is felt here, now brings the pact within "arms' reach" of consummation.

The United Press learns that the German government now interprets the message would open the way to unrestricted crossing of Germany with troops by France for possible aid of her eastern allies.

This question remains to be cleared up, but the spirit toward the pact is now friendly since the British have given Germany the "tip" that Germany can rely on England for support in given circumstances.

The cabinet proposed to meet this afternoon to consider the allied reply.

Meantime, Moscow has grave misgivings about the pact, fearing the right for passage of troops through Germany might develop into an anti-soviet alliance.

Streetcar, Auto Crash, Three Deaths Result

PORTLAND, June 16.—Three persons were killed and another seriously injured in a crash between a street car and an automobile on the east side early this morning.

The dead:

Ray Stockdale, 26, driver, Vancouver soldier.

Mrs. Evelyn Stevens, 26, Vancouver.

Arthur Moore, 31, soldier and member of the Vancouver barracks band.

The injured person was Mrs. H. Bosdin, 23, of Vancouver, who suffered bruises and cuts and a possible fractured skull. Physicians say she may die. Her escape from immediate death was considered remarkable from the condition of the automobile, which was telescoped.

The automobile, traveling at a terrific rate, swerved to the wrong side of the street and crashed into the street car head on, witnesses said.

Steamer Heading North To Seek For Amundsen

SPITZBERGEN, June 16.—The Norwegian steamer Farn left Green Harbor at 2 a. m. today for Norway to bring Professor Adolf Hoel's arctic expedition to Spitzbergen. Hoel arranged for the Farn to take his expedition northward, believing that it would be possible to get another ship for the expedition in search of the Amundsen-Ellsworth polar fliers. Hoel himself is optimistic about Amundsen's safety, pointing out that the Amundsen venture would probably be lengthy.

Messages yesterday said the Farn, hitherto designated as an Amundsen search ship, had been replaced by the Heimdal in the relief work.

FLOODS, STORMS KILL, LAY WASTE OVER MID WEST

Six Meet Deaths In Disaster, Estimate

DAMAGE IS \$2,500,000

New York Electrical Storm Knocks Stones From Sky Scraper Tops

CHICAGO, June 16.—Six persons were killed and property damage estimated at \$2,500,000 was done by floods and storms in Iowa and Indiana late Monday, according to estimates today.

At Manchester, Ia., Alfred Wells, Civil war veteran, succumbed to injuries received escaping flood waters. Mrs. Frank Cole was drowned after saving her two sons from river waters that inundated their home.

Edward Bell, 50, and Mrs. John Cowan and her mother, Mrs. Anna Russell, perished in the swirling currents of the swollen Maquoketa river at Cascade, Iowa.

One woman was killed by lightning in Indiana. A violent thunderstorm, caused considerable property damage.

NILES, O., June 16.—A terrific wind and rain storm tore through the Mahoning valley during the night, killing William McCracken and damaging property to the extent of several thousand dollars.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., June 16.—The mercury ran up to 97 here yesterday, a new high for the year. Reports from over the state indicated the heat was general. Enid reported a temperature of 105.

WRECK RESULT

NEW YORK, June 16.—A terrific electrical storm, accompanied by heavy wind and driving rain, swept New York and vicinity during the night, causing a train wreck, reported to have cost seven lives, leveling wires and doing considerable damage.

Lightning struck the giant Equitable building here with a crash that reverberated through the canyons of Lower Manhattan and showered the street with stones from the coping.

Today dawned cooler after the heat of yesterday had claimed three dead and nine prostrated in New York City.

Klamath Falls Forfees Brooks-Scanlon Activity

Local Officials of Company, However, Have No Information Regarding Plans to South

That the Brooks-Scanlon Co. of Bend is negotiating with Robert A. Booth for the purchase of Booth-Kelly timber holdings near Klamath Falls is claimed as reliably reported, in the Klamath Falls Evening Herald. It is indicated, according to the newspaper story, that the company will start gigantic operations at Klamath Falls in case the Hill lines are given authority to build from Bend to that city.

Aged American Beaten By Filipino Ruffians

MANILA, P. I., June 15.—Martin Hunt, aged American, long a resident of Manila, today was attacked and severely injured by a band of ruffians led by Miguel Cornejo.

Cornejo is a member of the lower house of the Philippine legislature, appointed by Governor General Wood. Motive for the attack is unknown and Wood has ordered an investigation.

Hunt holds the congressional medal of honor, won during the Boxer rebellion while he was serving in the marines.

Drive On Alcohol Trade Is Planned In Chicago

Fox, 130 East Revere avenue, heard of the loss of a big trout from the rear porch of the home of Mr. and Mrs. George Curtis, 175 East Revere avenue, and hurried to the Dunn home to tell them where their fish came from.

Former Bend Attorney Filing Action For Libel

KLAMATH FALLS, June 16.—A libel suit for \$10,000 damages, charging defamation of character, has been filed by W. P. Myers, until last week acting district attorney of Klamath county, against E. H. Murray and W. H. Perkins, publisher and editor, respectively, of the Evening Herald here.

The suit is said to be the first of a series to be filed by Myers, who resigned that he might not embarrass, through the suit the elected district attorney, William Ganong, who is in the veterans' hospital at Walla Walla with tuberculosis.

Myers was for a number of years in active practice in Jefferson, and later in Deschutes county. In the latter part of his residence in Bend he was associated with R. B. Parsons.

Turner, Witchel, Confer With Council Here

OTHERS DUE SOON

Budd and Donnelly, Heads of Northern Lines, Coming On Sunday

Extension of the railroad line south from Bend to Klamath Falls will be started just as soon as permission is granted by the interstate commerce commission, members of the city council of Bend were told late Monday evening by W. F. Turner, president of the S. P. & S., who arrived here in the afternoon from Klamath Falls.

In their conference with Turner and A. J. Witchel, chief engineer of the Oregon Trunk, members of the city council were informed that bids had already been received from contractors for the construction of the viaduct, or overhead crossing, on Greenwood avenue. With these bids already received, the council members were informed that construction of the viaduct will be started in the immediate future.

Klamath Conference Goal
That Bend is not considered by engineers to be a feasible location for a division point, was made known to the council members in their conference with the railroad officials. This conference lasted for three-fourths of an hour, in Turner's private car. It was mentioned by Turner that when the Deschutes line was built, John F. Stevens, president of the S. P. & S. at that time, had selected Metolius as a division point.

Ralph Budd, president of the Great Northern, and Charles Donnelly, president of the Northern Pacific, will arrive in Bend Sunday night from Klamath Falls. Aside from the presidents of the Northern lines, other high officials will compose this party, including the New York directors and eastern financiers. There will be 25 in the party.

Ten rail officials will come to Bend from Klamath Falls, where they will arrive from Ashland Saturday. After devoting most of the day to an investigation of the projected rail routes and timber holdings in the Klamath country, they will be guests at a public reception at the White Pelican hotel that night.

To Come by Auto
Early Sunday morning, the rail officials will leave by motor for Bend. A special train will be on the track awaiting them here. They will entrain immediately on their arrival here.

Their special car, on their way to Klamath Falls, where they will meet representatives of people of that community, it was made known by the rail officials who were in Bend Monday evening. Immediately following the Klamath Falls conference, Budd and Donnelly will return to their special car in Bend.

Turner's special car arrived in Bend Monday morning from the main line, with Mrs. Turner aboard. This car, with Turner and Witchel aboard, returned to the main line last night.

Fireman Gives Up Life In Aiding Gassed Men

CHICAGO, June 16.—Three men were overcome by gas and killed in a caisson being driven for a new building today.

Five men were working in the caisson when the drills struck a gas pocket. Three men clambered to safety. Two dropped to the floor of the pit, overcome by the gas.

William Sikora, fire department captain, was gassed while trying to rescue the two workmen. Arriving with an emergency pulmonary squad of the fire department, he climbed into the pit at once. Before he could reach the bodies of the workmen, he felt to the floor unconscious and died.

Booze Plant Remnants Are Found By Officers

PRINEVILLE, June 16.—Remnants of some moonshiner's plant, including two 250 gallon barrels full of mash ready to run, have been found by Sheriff S. W. Yancey and Deputies Ray Putnam and John Zeek in the Grizzly country, two miles north of the Circle ranch. The owner had disappeared with the coils.

A small still was found on the upper McKay Friday morning at 3:30 o'clock by the officers.

Traffic Police Officer Leaves Shoes In Paving

Girl's Dying Statement Yielded to Klan Leader

NOBLESVILLE, Ind., June 16.—The defense won a sweeping victory at the opening of the hearing on the ball petition of D. C. Stephenson, former Ku Klux Klan leader, and Earl Klenck and Earl Gentry, Judge Hine ruled that Prosecutor Remy must turn over to the defense the dying statement of Miss Maude Oberholzer, for whose death the men are awaiting trial on a murder charge.
