TRADING LESS ON EXCHANGE

Buying Persistent, But Somewhat Light

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
NEW YORK, June 16.—Trading continued on a reduced scale today but the market was relatively free from the irregularity which unsettled yesterday's dealings. Although the buying was not urgent, it gained an appearance of aggressiveness from its persistency, also from the fact the floating supply of representative stocks was not large, owing to the absence of important liquidation.

Power stocks maintained their upward tendencies under the leadership of Montana Power and Light. American and foreign power was also a strong spot.

In the face of obvious reluctance of present holders of stocks to part with their lines, professionals had to abandon the pretext that any real cause for alarm existed in the Mexican question.

The rails were whipped into activity on the side of the rise by Washington's intimation that an increase in northwestern freight rates was entirely possible and by further improvement in car loadings, the surest indications of the trend of freight traffic.

Grain Futures Pulled Down to Record Lows

CHICAGO, June 16.—Grain futures sank to new low marks on the present downward movement as improved weather brought widespread liquidating on the Chicago board of trade today.

The wheat market was characterized by rapid price changes.

Liquidation in corn was not persistent. Development of strength in the cash market and lighter receipts served to offset favorable crop advice.

Oats dropped with other grains. News from over the belt contradicted opinion of leading experts that overnight rains came too late to be of much benefit.

Provisions fell off with grains.
