

YOUNG TO DENY MURDER STORY, BLAME 'DOUBLE'

Insanity Defense Seen In Dentist's Acts

NEW SEARCH MADE

Seek Mysterious Package— Mrs. Young Feared Hus- band, Diary Reveals

LOS ANGELES, June 17.—Dr. Thomas W. Young will repudiate the confession he murdered his wife, Mrs. Grace Young, and blame the strange crime on a "mysterious accomplice," it was learned today.

Although he confessed to strangling his wife with poison gas and burying her body in a cemented casket, the dentist will plead not guilty and call on "psychic science" to save him from the gallows.

Dr. Young claimed today he had been shadowed for many months by a "double" who resembled him in every detail and that this man was probably the slayer.

John F. Cooper, the dentist's counsel, admitted this would very likely be Young's defense.

"I am certain at least that the confession will be repudiated and Dr. Young will plead not guilty," the lawyer said.

"If his confession is true, then he is crazy."

"I didn't kill my wife—what made me confess?" Dr. Young said today in his cell. "Where's that other fellow?"

Young is to be arraigned before Superior Judge Edwin F. Hahn Friday.

After the plea of not guilty, District Attorney Asa Keyes will order an immediate trial, relying on the confession and a mass of other evidence to prove the dentist plotted his wife's death months in advance to gain control of her fortune.

Dr. Young paced up and down his cell in his stocking feet. Prisoners in adjoining cells complained his mutterings annoyed them.

Actions Peculiar
His remarks were incoherent and scarcely audible.

"Why did I confess—I must have been crazy," he repeated several times.

State's attorneys claim the dentist is feigning insanity. He is kept under constant surveillance by state officials. The testimony of mental experts will undoubtedly play an important part in the trial.

A detail of investigators from the district attorney's office went to the Beverly Glen cabin of Dr. Young this afternoon to search for alleged evidence of other crimes.

They carried picks and shovels and were under orders to "find a package" said to have been buried in the cabin yard several weeks ago.

According to a theory of the district attorney's office, the package probably contained the remains of a new born infant.

The prosecutors also revealed today that a woman companion of Dr. Young had disappeared 25 years ago in Washington, Penn., and was never seen again. The woman's name was withheld by authorities.

Wife Feared Dentist

Mrs. Young's diary, found in her safety deposit box, revealed she had feared death at the hands of her husband for several months prior to the murder.

"He told me I was crazy and he threatened to kill me," the slain woman had written. "He took pictures of me in my bedroom with a hidden camera, snapping the lens when I was unclothed and dressing. He dared me to divorce him, threatening to make public those horrible pictures or kill me outright if I filed suit against him."

In her will, Mrs. Young bequeathed a fourth of her estate to Dr. Young, the remainder to her brothers and father.

When investigators opened the vault it was disclosed also that several valuable articles of jewelry were missing. District attorneys claim Dr. Young secured the jewels from his wife before he killed her, pawned them and bought himself an expensive automobile.

Large Number of Sheep To Be Moved to Range

First In Annual Drive Here From Maupin

Forest Allotments Open For Grazing
On July 1—Report Grass Is
Unusually Good

Vanguard of the thousands of sheep which are to be pastured in the mid state Cascades this summer, three bands of sheep, owned by Tom Connolly of Maupin, were unloaded in Bend yesterday. Two more bands will be shipped here today from the lower Deschutes country.

The Connolly sheep arriving here now will be kept for a time on privately owned land near Bend. Later in the season, they will be trailed to the Horsepasture mountain country, in the Cascade national forest. Approximately 6,000 sheep are being shipped here by Connolly at present.

The forest allotments will not be open to grazing until July 1, but it is expected that before that time many sheep from various parts of Central Oregon will be on the trail, or near the forest boundary. It is expected that the mountain pasturage will be good this summer.

Grass on the home ranges is reported to be unusually good this spring, and for this reason the majority of the sheepmen are in no great hurry to move their flocks to the mountains. This is markedly different from conditions of last year, when sheepmen were asking for permission to use their allotments a week or two before the opening date.

NORDIC FESTIVAL TO BE ON SUNDAY

Swedish Folk Dancers Are Coming From Portland

Announcement of a Nordic mid summer festival, to be held Sunday, June 21, on Tumalo island, was made today by members of the Order of Vasa, under whose auspices the festival will be held.

A feature of the festival, which is to start at 10 o'clock Sunday morning, will be entertainment by Swedish folk dancers, who will come here from Portland, where they are now taking part in the annual rose festival.

Dancing, singing and concerts will be included in the entertainment of the folk dancers, it is announced. A program of sports, with prizes for the various events, will also be held.

An invitation to the general public to attend the island festival is being extended by the Order of Vasa. A small charge is to be made to cover the expense of bringing the folk dancers to Bend.

Income Tax Increases For Deschutes County

Figures on income tax returns filed with the federal government by residents of Oregon, published in The Oregonian, show that Bend returns made in 1924 were 951 as against 874 filed in 1923. The increase of income tax payers here was proportionate with that shown for other Oregon cities. Of 1,093 returns filed in Deschutes county, 1,046 were for incomes under \$5,000, 35 for incomes between \$5,000 and \$10,000, and 12 for incomes in excess of \$10,000.

TROUBLE INCREASES

Anti-foreign Spirit, Grow- ing, Prompts New Warn- ing By Diplomatic Corps

SHANGHAI, June 17.—Armed with hatchets, a Chinese mob to-night assaulted and perhaps fatally wounded a British police sergeant within the foreign settlement.

PEKIN, June 17.—China was today warned in a note of the diplomatic corps that she must realize the gravity of the existing situation and further must realize that it is imperatively necessary to cope with it.

The note declared the diplomatic corps was informed that anti foreign spirit and subversive propaganda were growing, causing grave apprehension.

DEMANDS ALLOWED

SAN FRANCISCO, June 17.—Five of the 13 Chinese demands, made following the Shanghai strike, have been accepted by a committee from the foreign settlement, the Chinese world told the United Press it had learned today.

The Chinese paper said that a committee representing the Chinese interests joining in the strike had just been given notice of rejection of eight of the demands, but no detail as to their nature has been received here. Neither did the advice say what the next move was likely to be, although it was considered probable the strike would continue unless further concessions are made by the foreigners at Shanghai.

Yunnanese Reform
The Chung Sal Yat Po, another Chinese language newspaper here, told the United Press a Hong Kong cable described reforming of Yunnanese forces following their latest repulse at Canton.

The Yunnanese, according to these advices, have seized and occupied the city of Shui Chow, 100 miles north-west of Canton, and there are gathering the troops scattered after the Canton failure, with the evident intention of resuming the attack on Cantonese forces.

Dry Wins Nomination In New Jersey Voting

Cleveland Man Is Chosen New Head for Engineers

26 Pardons Issued Today By Texas Woman Governor

BEND'S GROWTH AND PROSPECTS TOLD AT FORUM

Club Members Quizzed On City's History

EXPECT 15,000 SOON

Question As to Number of Churches In Town Proves Puzzler At Luncheon

Bend's phenomenal growth and development in a period of less than a quarter of a century were reviewed in questionnaire form at today's forum luncheon of the local commercial club in the Pilot Hotel Inn, with H. H. De Armond presiding as "professor" and members of the club "doing their stuff" as pupils.

"That the knowledge of Bend business and professional men relative to the early day history of their city is rather nebulous, was made manifest when De Armond called on various members of the 'class' for information. Some of the questions asked were: When was Bend founded? When was Bend incorporated? It was finally decided that the city was founded in 1903, and was incorporated in 1904.

A number of the club members agreed on the estimate of the present population of Bend, and it was predicted that in 1930 the population would be 15,000. Few recalled when the first trains arrived in Bend, although that date is only 14 years in the past. Only one person knew that in 1910 the population of Bend was 536. It was estimated that the present population is about 9,000.

Deposits Gaining
Some of the information brought out as a result of the oral quiz is as follows: A. M. Drake was the founder of Bend; the local lumber companies started operations in 1916; the population of Bend in 1920 was 5,415; there are more than seven miles of pavement in Bend; telephone connections have increased 43 per cent in the past five years; the enrollment of the local schools at the end of the 1924-25 school year was 2,220.

One of the questions which stilled a number of the commercial club members pertained to the number of churches in Bend. One guess was 25. After comparing various answers, it was finally decided that there are 11 churches here. In the past five years the increase in bank deposits has been 56 per cent, it was estimated.

A printed questionnaire was furnished each member of the club and visitors.

Preceding the "cross examination," W. Bernard Morse, scout executive, explained that there are a number of boy scouts and boy rangers in Bend who would like to earn money to pay their expenses at the summer camp, to be held at Scout lake next month. Jobs are being provided for the boys by various business men.

Big Pow-wow Is Planned On Klamath Reservation

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 17.—An influx of Indians into the Klamath country is expected to start on Saturday, in anticipation of the 10 day Indian pow-wow at Wukuse, on the Klamath reservation.

The gathering is primarily for the Klamaths, but delegations from Idaho, Washington and other Oregon tribes will be present. The biggest delegation is expected from the Umatillas of the Pendleton country. The Dalles, Warm Springs, Coos county and Yakima Indians will also attend, which will swell the numbers at the pow-wow to more than 3,000.

Indian dances and a rodeo will feature the gathering.

Star Wears Trousers, Father Badly Peeved

East and West Natron Pro- jects Being Connected

Contractors to Give Dinner Party
Sunday Marking Success of
Long Undertaking

Workers boring the Natron cutoff tunnel under the divide of the Cascade range from both sides of the mountain will meet under the summit either today or tomorrow, according to information from Odell lake today.

The piercing of the rocky barrier which now separates the east and west tunnels will not mean the completion of the tunnel. Several "rough spots" must be rounded off. The 3,650 foot tunnel curves under the mountain.

The meeting of the workers under the mountain will be the occasion for an exclusive "tunnel" party at Odell lake Sunday afternoon. This party will be given by Carlton & Fetter, contractors. It will be only for the tunnel workers.

CHEMICAL WARFARE BANNED BY POWERS

Twenty-seven Nations Sign Burton Protocol

GENEVA, June 17.—The protocol outlawing gas and chemical warfare, as proposed by Chairman Burton in the name of the American government, was today signed by 27 nations.

The signing countries were the United States, Great Britain, Canada, Germany, Japan, Italy, Brazil, India, Chile, Denmark, Spain, Estonia, Ethiopia, Finland, Greece, Lithuania, Luxembourg, Nicaragua, Holland, Poland, Portugal, Rumania, Salvador, Switzerland, Serbia, Turkey and Uruguay.

France was not on today's list. Burton was credited here with a great success in getting his program through the convention. He had suggested—threatened, someone said—that President Coolidge would call an international conference on chemical warfare if the matter was not settled here at the seat of the league of nations.

The convention on international trade in arms, also largely a work of Burton, was signed by 18 nations to day, including Great Britain, France, the United States, Italy and Japan.

Bucket of Dishwater Costs Railroad \$500

KANSAS CITY, Kan., June 17.—When Mrs. Rosena Hoquemburg, station agent for the Missouri Pacific railway at Nearman, Kan., threw a pail of dishwater out of the window onto the road near the station, she tossed away \$500.

A jury in district court here awarded that amount to Robert M. Sebree, farmer, who was injured in a runaway caused, he alleged, by his team's fright at the wet spot on the road made by the dishwater. Sebree sued the railroad company for \$3,000.

Attorneys for the railroad contended Mrs. Hoquemburg was off duty when the dishwater was thrown out and that the company was not liable. They also sought to show that Dan, the mule that started the runaway, was a vicious, mean tempered brute.

Wounded Deputy Sheriff Reported Out of Danger

KLAMATH FALLS, Ore., June 17.—Deputy Sheriff Ed Kendall, wounded Monday in a battle with alleged liquor violators, was today reported to be out of danger. It was first thought his wounds might bring on complications.

Evidence against Jim Burke, Ed Fuller and Charles Fuller, involved in the case, will be submitted this week to the grand jury. Acting District Attorney Vanderburg announced.

Nurse Found Not Guilty, Booze Smuggling Charged

WASHINGTON, June 17.—A court martial board of naval officers today acquitted Mrs. Ruth M. Anderson, naval nurse, charged with attempting to smuggle liquor into the United States.

The nurse pleaded that the package, containing a gallon demijohn of Bacardi rum, a quart of gin and a fancy bottle of Scotch, was given to her sealed by a civilian friend in Cuba and that she did not know what it contained.

TOLL OF DEATH IN RAIL WRECK GAINS RAPIDLY

Other Victims Suffering Critical Hurts

HORRORS ARE TOLD

Coroner's Jury Impanelled To Seek Cause of Dis- aster On Lackawanna

HACKETTSTOWN, N. J., June 17.—"The German excursion" wreck of the Lackawanna railway near here today had claimed a toll that marks it as one of the worst railroad disasters in years.

A recheck at the hospitals early today placed the dead at 43 men, women and children, with many more suffering terrible burns from which they may die.

The cauldron of steam which engulfed over 100 passengers when the Lackawanna excursion train plunged into a sand-logged switch near here early yesterday morning, buckling up day coaches and Pullmans, brought the fatality rate to its gruesome figures. Most of the deaths resulted from steam burns which left the victims helpless and in agony.

Investigations of the accident have been started by the public utilities board, the interstate commerce commission, coroners, county detectives and the railroad.

One fact already disclosed by the inquiries is that a coal train was wrecked recently at the same point because of sand and gravel clogging the tracks.

Joseph Snyder, who lives near the scene of the tragedy, was the first to reach the smoldering mass of wreckage. In describing the scene, Snyder said:

"It was like nothing I ever thought I'd see. There were men and women and kids all around, everywhere, screaming worse than I ever heard. There was one fat woman who wasn't hurt a bit who was caught by the leg in a window and was hanging head down. We got her out."

May Ask Safety Measures
Justice of the Peace E. J. Wildrick announced today he had impanelled a coroner's jury at the behest of Dr. W. G. Cummins, Warren county physician, and probably will conduct an inquest Friday or Saturday at the city hall here.

Joseph F. Autenrieth of Jersey City, chairman of the state public utilities commission, said today it probably would be a week before that body would make its recommendations to the railroad and the interstate commerce commission.

Autenrieth said that while his board could not take criminal action, it would make recommendations that would preclude the possibility of another such accident if it were found that a lack of proper safety devices was responsible for the wreck.

Sailors See America First Time In Years

SAN DIEGO, Cal., June 17.—Swinging American shores for the first time in three years, America's Asiatic fleet, consisting of five destroyers, steamed into San Diego harbor today.

The squadron consists of the destroyers Smith Thompson, Tracey, Borie, John D. Edwards and Whipple. They have been on patrol duty from Russia to the China coast.

Simultaneously, 18 destroyers of the Atlantic scouting fleet made port back from the naval maneuvers off Hawaii. They were led by the battleship Wyoming, flagship, and the cruiser Concord, flagship of the destroyer division.

Storm Committee Room, Deputy Floors Invader

PARIS, June 17.—Deputy Franklin Bouillon today knocked out Communist Deputy Doriot after the latter's followers had broken a glass door to the foreign committee room of the chamber when they had been barred from hearing on the Moroccan situation.

A general storm against the room followed the fistuffs between the two deputies, and finally guards were called to drive out the invaders. They had refused to keep Premier Poincaré's confidence on Morocco, hence their exclusion.
