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MORE RESPECT DUE AMERICANS

Reason Behind Kellogg Action Told

Complaints of Discourtesy From Mexican Officials Declared Frequent

 WASHINGTON, June 17.—The administration's purpose in stirring the smoldering coals of the Mexican-American situation into flame was today revealed in authoritative quarters to have been to compel the southern republic to accord more respect to American representations and the usual amenities of diplomatic intercourse.

According to an account of the discussions which led up to the issuance of Secretary of State Kellogg's warning statement last Friday, given the United Press by an unquestioned authority, it was not, as at first believed, any sudden realization by the United States government that certain conditions in Mexico menaced American lives and property that provoked it.

These conditions the government had been fully aware of for a long time. What precipitated the situation was the return here of United States Ambassador Sheffield with complaints of discourteous treatment by the Mexican government officials and his conviction that only a sharp jolt to the public opinion of both countries could remedy the situation. That having been done, the incident may be considered closed.

President Coolidge gave his consent to the issuance of the Kellogg statement only after he had been informed that there was no other way to bring the Mexican government to a realization that this country would no longer tolerate disrespect to its representatives and to American diplomatic attaches.

MacMILLAN PARTY LEAVES FOR NORTH

Locating Amundsen Is First Objective

 BOSTON, June 17.—The steamship Peary, plane ship of the MacMillan arctic expedition, sailed from the Charleston navy yard at 12:15 p. m. today in the first leg of the northern voyage.

The sailing of the steamer for Wisconsin, Maine, where it will join the flagship Bowdoin prior to leaving for Etah, Greenland, on Saturday, followed impressive ceremonies on the deck of the continental frigate Constitution.

Assistant Secretary of the Navy Robinson brought the official Godspeed of President Coolidge and Secretary of the Navy Wilbur. Senator Simeon Fess of Ohio also wished the party farewell.

Lieutenant Commander MacMillan reiterated to his friends his determination to subordinate every other plan for the relief of Roald Amundsen and his fellow arctic aviators.

Of his own purpose in going north, MacMillan said he hoped to find the continent Peary, discoverer of the north pole, believed existed.

La Follette's Recovery Is Hope of Physicians

WASHINGTON, June 17.—Senator La Follette's condition has taken a turn for the worse, his doctors announced today. They said, however, that he was holding his own and they had every hope of his ultimate recovery.

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French, Spanish Forces Cooperate Against Riffs
