NEW YORK, June 17.—Pool operations flourished today in the sunshine of easy money and the complete absence of important sellings.
Given a situation of this kind, groups working in special stocks have conditions ideally adapted to their activities and they lost no time in taking advantage of the opportunities created by the passing of the middle of the month, which leaves clear sailing ahead for an indefinite period as far as the credit supply is concerned.

Grain Futures Higher As Day's Trading Ends

CHICAGO, June 17.—Grain futures trading underwent a complete reversal of form in today's trading on the Chicago board of trade. Prices finished sharply higher.

The generally expected recovery from an oversold condition developed in wheat. For the first time in a week the trade ignored crop news. Commission house buying elevated corn prices. The market was under influence of wheat.

Buying in oats was due to activities in other grains. Provisions started higher early but dropped back to the previous close on late trading.
