For the purpose of cementing the spirit of cooperation between all departments of law enforcement and mapping out an aggressive prohibition enforcement campaign in Deschutes county, a conference has been called for Friday afternoon of next week, June 26, in the Baptist church auditorium here.

In addition to District Attorney A. J. Moore, Sheriff S. E. Roberts and other Deschutes county officials, speakers will include W. S. Levens, state prohibition commissioner, and W. J. Herwig, superintendent of the Anti-Saloon league of Oregon.

Everyone interested in prohibition and its better enforcement is invited to attend this meeting, according to an announcement sent out by Herwig from his Portland office.

The meeting will open at 2 o'clock and will close not later than 5 o'clock, it is announced.

COUNTY COURT PROCEEDINGS

Bend, Oregon, June 13, 1925. The county court of Deschutes county met this day pursuant to adjournment, all members being present, whereupon the following proceedings were had, to-wit:

In the matter of contractors' security. Upon its appearing to the court that May & Wright had satisfactorily completed their contract on the Altafa market road, it was

Ordered that certified check deposited by Walt May as security for the faithful performance of said contract be returned to said Walt May. In the matter of road funds. It then appeared to the court that with funds now on hand in the motor vehicle license fund and the road bond and interest fund, plus receipts to be expected from tax levies and from the county's portion of the motor vehicle license fund, there would be more than sufficient to meet the county's obligations for the retirement of bonds and payment of interest thereon on November 1, 1925, it was

Ordered that there be transferred from the motor vehicle license fund to the road fund the sum of \$4,750, said amount to be used by the county treasurer in calling outstanding road warrants; and it was further

Ordered that all sums now standing to the credit of the county in the road district funds of the county be transferred to the general road fund and used for retirement of outstanding warrants.

In the matter of claims against the county. There was then presented the claim of Grace McDowell against the county in the sum of \$166.38, whereupon it was

Ordered that the county clerk issue his warrant on the general fund payable to Grace McDowell for the sum of \$166.88, charged to the budget for the county nurse.

In the matter of moving boilers. There was then presented the request of the Redmond pine mill for permission to move over the county roads two boilers in excess of the legal weight limit, whereupon it was

Ordered that said permission be granted on condition that the petitioner restore all damage to roads, culverts and bridges on said roads caused by said moving.

In the matter of repairs to roads and bridges. There was reported to the court the need for repairs to bridges and road maintenance in the Sisters section, in the east end of the county and on the so called Century drive; whereupon it was

Ordered that the county road master be directed to make repairs as needed.

In the matter of irrigation water on county roads. The county road master being present, he was instructed to observe all cases where irrigation water was allowed to waste onto the county roads, and wherever such conditions were found to exist to notify those responsible, and upon failure of the responsible persons to stop such waste to proceed through the district attorney's office with the necessary steps to end the nuisance and to force the parties responsible to pay damages therefor.

There being no further business to come before the court, adjournment was then had to Thursday, June 18, 1925, at 10 a. m.
