Real Talent and Much Pep
Revealed At Workout
of the Cast

A Bulletin reporter was invited to give the Elks' rehearsal the once over last evening, and as the reporter is a movie fan, this is the way it looked to him.

"The Hoodoo" mystery comedy was out on location last night in the local Elks' lodge room. There was not a camera in sight, yet everyone from C. J. McNaughton to Chief High Mogul L. M. Foss, who slipped into the room to listen to the chorus registering "pep." The stars, leading men and women, character people, and even the extras succeeded in putting over their roles in a manner that spoke volumes for the show. Here's the way it really looked:

Scene 1—Interior Elks' lodge room. Chorus of pretty pointers and nifty ballets and beautiful fashion models warbling a song around the high G and low A.

Scene 2—South side Elks' lodge room. Director in Chief C. J. McNaughton, in close conversation with a pretty girl concerning clothes. Billows of feminine finery marked along the entire side. Scene 8—Center lodge room. Enter Mrs. A. D. Abbott, irascible actress, Mrs. Fern Deskins, the girl with the unforgettable eyes and pretty Miss Delpha Welsbeck. They are attended by a bunch of "Brother

GIBSON REELECTED DISTRICT CHAIRMAN

School Board Starts New Fiscal Year At Meeting

Members of the school board of the Bend district meeting last night in the office of J. C. Rhodes, clerk, started a new fiscal year by swearing in J. O. Gibson, reelected director for a three year term Monday, and appointing a chairman. Gibson was reelected chairman, being the oldest member of the board in point of service.

Bids for fuel for the schools of Bend were also opened at last night's meeting, but no action was taken in the matter of naming the successful bidder or bidders. This will be decided by the fuel committee of the school board at a later date. The number of bids submitted this year were comparatively few. Bids for 200 cords of wood were opened.

A considerable part of last night's meeting was given over to a discussion of the purchase of equipment for the new high school building,

which is to be ready for occupancy when the school term opens next fall. Hugh Thompson, architect, consulted with the board members.

The annual budget meeting of the Bend district will be held early in July, immediately when the annual audit is completed. The audit will be started probably on July 1.

New Machinery Added At Symons Bros. Store

Installation of new machinery and renovation of development rooms is being completed at the Kodak finishing plant of the Symons Bros. establishment this week. The new machinery includes a projection printer, one of the most modern of its kind on the market.

With this printer it will be possible to turn out any size enlargements up to 40 inches square. The installation also makes it possible to give a 24 hour service on enlargements.

Other equipment being installed includes new developing tanks, with a capacity of 40 rolls of film every 20 minutes. These tanks will set in a copper lined tray. They will be double the capacity of the old tanks. An automatic washing machine, recently installed, is now in operation. With the installation of the new equipment virtually all the finishing work is being done by machinery.

Station Bend Marine Aboard the Tennessee

WASHINGTON, June 18.—How it feels to tread the deck of a battleship afloat on the Pacific is rapidly becoming a familiar sensation to Ural

Donnelly of Bend, Oregon, who is a member of the United States marine detachment on the U. S. S. Tennessee.

For weeks the Tennessee has been cruising about in the vicinity of the Hawaiian Islands, where the huge Pacific fleet has been engaged in maneuvers. According to recent dispatches the vessel will anchor at Hilo late this month, affording the marines an opportunity to visit the volcano Kilauea, one of the chief points of interest in the Hawaiian group. (U. P. Licensed Wire to The Bend Bulletin) WASHINGTON, June 18.—Italy will begin debt negotiations with the American debt funding commission here on June 25, the state department announced today.

Premier Mussolini has communicated to the department that his government through Baron Giacomo di Martino, Italian ambassador here, is ready to begin official negotiations for settlement, the announcement said.

The Italian government's decision follows informal conversations between Di Martino and Secretary of State Kellogg and Secretary of the

Treasury Mellon. The Italian debt represents \$2,135,543,852.77.

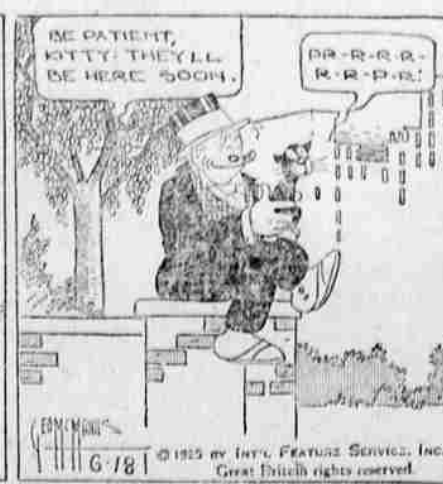
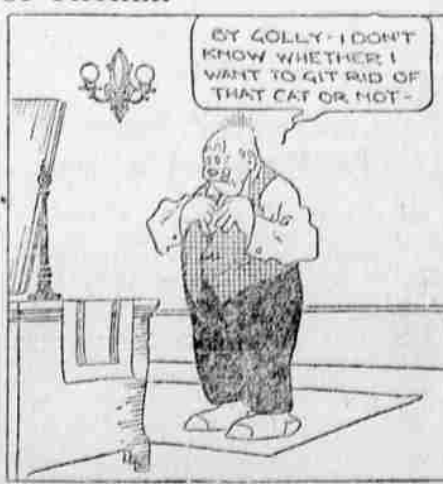
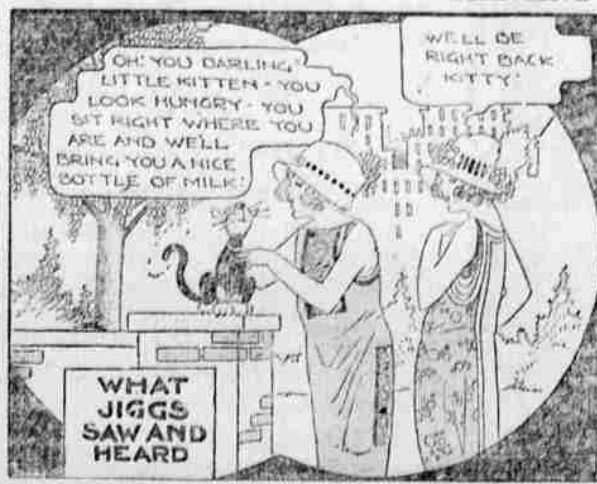
