### PRICES LOWER ON EXCHANGE

#### Professional Operations Influence

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)  
NEW YORK, June 18.—Prices worked generally lower today, weighed down by professional operations for the decline.

Most of the selling appeared based on the tired action of the market, principally because recent attempts to lure the public in the market had been futile.

General Railway Signal was forced down 10 points to 167, but the next sale was at 172 and the stock then appeared on the tape at 172, 174, 175, 176 1/4 and all in 100 share lots.

### Grain Futures Lower In Chicago Trading

CHICAGO, June 18.—Grain futures finished lower on the board of trade today.

Final effort to regain the day's losses was abruptly ended by the closing gong.

General rush of shorts and a good deal of eastern buying sent wheat upward, following sharp recessions at midday. Pressure followed the opening advance on favorable spring crop news.

Corn was the greatest sufferer. Early buyers were best sellers on favorable crop advices.

Oats attracted little attention. There was additional liquidation, mostly for profits.

The advance in provisions reflected higher hogs and export inquiry.

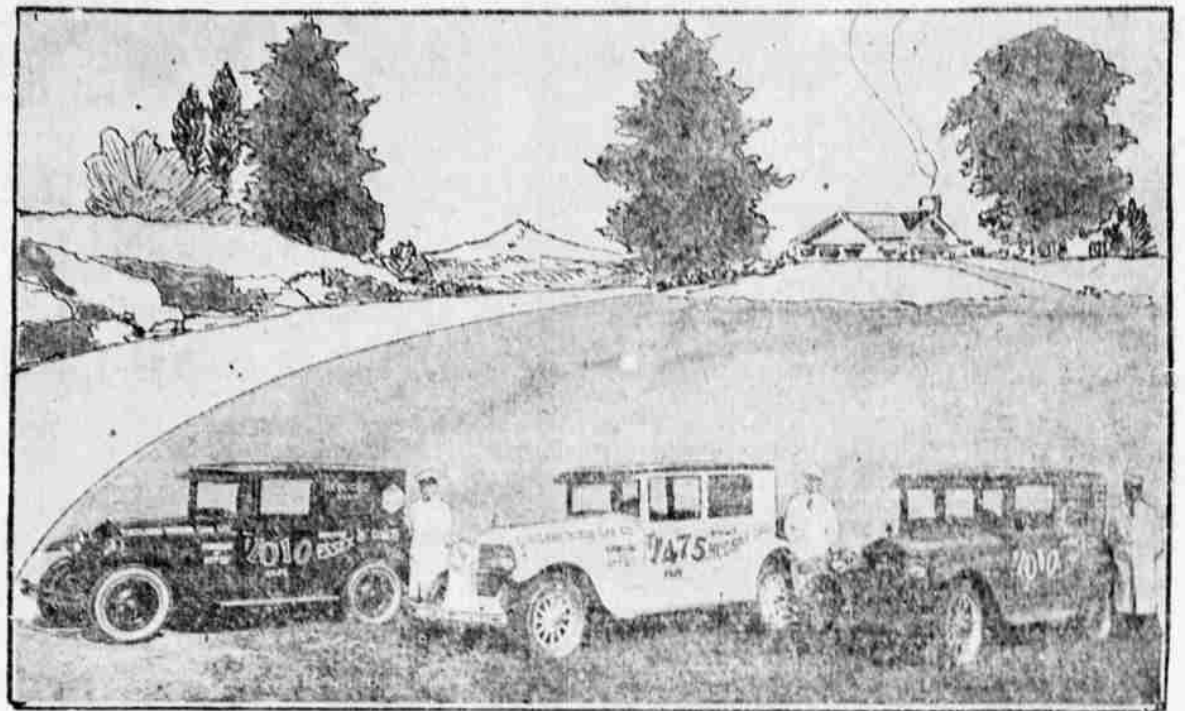
