

THOUSANDS ARE PLANNING TRIP

Many to Come by Way of McKenzie Pass

American Legion Convention to be Biggest Ever for Central Oregon

That more than 8,000 people will visit Prineville in the three days of the state convention of the American Legion, starting Thursday of next week, is indicated by reservations now being made, according to H. G. Matson, convention chairman, who was in Bend last night to attend the meeting of the Bend legionnaires.

With Central Oregon's greatest convention only a few days in the offing, people of Prineville and members of the Crook county post of the legion are "all set and rarin' to go," reports Matson, who was in Bend to get the cooperation of the local legion men in entertaining the hundreds of delegates and visitors who will come over the McKenzie pass.

The Willamette valley legionnaires, from Medford, Eugene, Roseburg, Sheridan, Springfield and other cities, have been routed through Bend. The visit of these men to this city Wednesday afternoon will be heralded by some of the best bugle and drum corps in the state "going into action" here. The visitors, on their way to Prineville, will parade the local streets in military formation.

Bend to Entertain
With Bend as their first stop in Central Oregon, the visiting legionnaires who will come over the pass will be greeted by the Percy A. Stevens post of the legion. A committee of two was named last night by Commander John A. Range to meet the visitors. Members of this committee are Don McBain and Phil Brogan. J. H. McLelland headed a committee which collected \$50 for the entertainment of the visitors during their brief stay in Bend.

The convention will be primarily a frontier celebration, with a rodeo a feature of the entertainment each afternoon, according to information from Prineville. Some of the premier riders, fancy ropers, stage coach drivers and buckaroos in the northwest will take part in the rodeo. Several holders of rodeo records will

be on hand to entertain. The state convention of the American Legion last year was held in Portland.

SEE REALIGNMENT AS DEATH RESULT

Third Party May Weaken Without La Follette

WASHINGTON, June 19.—An important realignment in politics was foreseen today as a result of the passing of Senator Robert M. La Follette.

While his subordinates in the independent party movement proclaimed their intention of perpetuating the third party he founded, none would hazard a guess as to who might be the new leader.

On the other hand, republicans saw a breakup of the "La Follette bloc" in the farming northwest—particularly in La Follette's home state of Wisconsin, which he had held by sheer dominance of individual popularity. The death of La Follette, they believe, may open the state to regular republican rule.

La Follette wished that the party he organized in the last campaign should continue. He had privately expressed to his associates the desire that they carry forward the banner he carried in an effort to bring about eventually the changes he sought—election of judges, curbing of the power of the supreme court and complete readjustment of present railroad operations.

La Follette had many able lieutenants. William H. Johnston, machinists' union president, is expected to continue as chairman of the executive council of the new party. Robert M. La Follette, Jr., may receive appointment to his father's post in the senate by Governor James G. Blaine, state leader in Wisconsin.

Want Mrs. La Follette To Occupy Senate Seat

MADISON, Wis., June 19.—A campaign to place Mrs. Robert M. La Follette, wife of the dead progressive chief, in the seat in the United States senate made vacant by the death of her husband, got under way in the legislature here today.

Petitions were circulated by friends of the La Follette family to obtain the 3,117 signatures necessary to place Mrs. La Follette's name on the ballot.

EINSTEIN IDEA HELD NOT TRUE

Scientists, In Meeting, Discuss Theory

Drift of Ether Supposed to Account for Displacement of Light

PORTLAND, June 19.—Some other explanation for the bending of light beams in passing an object in space must be found than that which is provided in the Einstein theory of relativity.

Dr. P. A. Ross, physicist of Stanford university, and Dr. Arthur L. Day, director of the geophysical laboratory, today discussed the Einstein theory before the American Association for the Advancement of Science in summer session here.

"The Einstein theory of relativity is virtually discarded in the light of recently announced discoveries," Dr. Ross declared. "The changing opinion has developed through the demonstration beyond all reasonable doubt that the medium ether exists in inter stellar space."

Dr. Ross said the proof has been furnished by Dayton C. Miller, president of the American Physical Society, and a research worker for the Case School of Applied Sciences at Cleveland, Ohio.

Backs New Theory
"Experiments made by Miller controverted former experiments. On the other theory the Einstein theory was built. Now an apparent drift of ether in the solar system is noted. This drift checks with the displacement of light passing a body."

"Formerly scientists were forced to make their experiments with regard to light, using either the earth or some other known body as the basis from which to figure, but now we go ahead and use ether as our basis of relativity."

"But all former ideas that motion must be relative to the earth or sun are knocked completely out and we have a universal substance, ether to work with. We have gone back to the old wave theory."

GOVERNMENT TO APPEAL
CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 19.—The government will act as quickly as possible to appeal the decision of Federal Judge Blake T. Kennedy at Cheyenne, Wyo., rendering the Teapot Dome oil lease legal, Atlee Pomerene, former United States senator from Ohio and chief government counsel in the case, declared today.

"The lease was undoubtedly consummated through fraud and conspiracy," Pomerene said, "and we will appeal as soon as we can study the decision and prepare our case."

APPEAL IS INDICATED
WASHINGTON, June 19.—President Coolidge does not regard the decision handed down by the federal court in Cheyenne today as a final adjudication of the Teapot Dome naval oil reserve litigation.

The spokesman for the president today said Coolidge assumed the government would appeal to the United States supreme court.

It was pointed out that the federal court in California in the Elk Hills reserve suit found in favor of the government.

Both cases, the president understands, will probably reach final settlement in the supreme court.

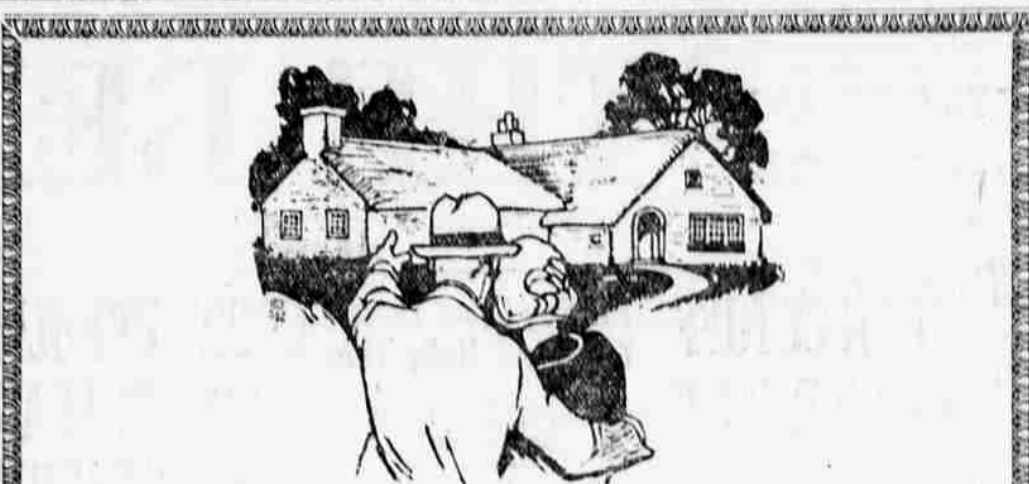
