

Harvard Leads At Start Of Varsity Race Against Yale

BLUE IS VICTOR IN CLASS RACES

Thames Is Crowded For Annual Event

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) NEW LONDON, Conn., June 19.—The Harvard varsity crew took the lead in the big race of the annual regatta with Yale here today. They were off at 5:51. Harvard had the most course. The crimson crew jumped into the lead rowing a faster stroke, 16 to 11. Harvard's advantage was slight and the crews were on even terms practically.

NEW LONDON, Conn., June 19.—Yale swept the river with the first two races at the annual regatta with Harvard on the Thames river here today. The Yale freshmen won by two lengths and the Yale junior varsity crew finished with a lead of three lengths over the Harvard shell. Official time for the two races was: Freshmen, Yale 9:51 2-5, Harvard 10:01 Junior varsity, Yale 9:59, Harvard 10:02. All of Yale and Harvard's wealth and aristocracy were gathered here today for the ancient crew battle between the pioneers of the "big three."

The Thames river, on which the crimson and the blue were to row four miles at sundown, was choked with government patrol craft, numerous yachts and trim little boats flying flags of Yale or Harvard. The sunshine of a fair June day smiled upon the freshmen oarsmen as they prepared to take to their shells. There was a slight breeze, but the water was unrippled. The streets of little New London, a typical New England town, were thronged with motor vehicles and the sidewalks swarmed with old grads, undergrads and pebbles. Betting odds early today did not reflect the confidence in a Yale crew that two weeks ago was expected to paddle to an easy victory over Harvard. There was a most surprising appearance in the crimson boat house and Yale, instead of offering odds, was looking for prizes that Yale would or would not sweep the river in the three races on the program.

Entries Come Quickly For Tennis Tournament

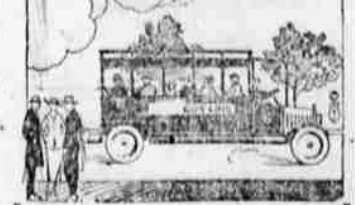
