**Hijackers Must Hang For Murder of Pair**

 VICTORIA, B. C., June 19.—Owen Baker and Harry Sowash must be hanged for the murder of Captain William Gillis and his son, William, Jr.

The Americans were convicted by a jury this afternoon, after 74 minutes of deliberation.

They will be hanged at Okalla prison farm September 4.

Justice Aulie Morrison pronounced sentence.

The two men were convicted of murdering the father and son aboard the ram boat Beryl G last year during a hijacking raid.

**Fishing Boat Carries Large Load of Liquor**

 SAN FRANCISCO, June 19.—A fishing boat carrying 350 cases of whiskey was captured today by the coast guard after a chase off Pigeon point, and two men arrested.

The coast guard cutter 255, which made the seizure, chased another suspected liquor ship, the Emma S., for several miles, but the vessel had no liquor aboard when it gave up in response to shots from the cutter.

The skipper said 70 cases he had landed at Monterey had been taken by hijackers.

Hans Neilsen and Otto H. Meyer were arrested aboard the boat.

**Mercury Reaches 90; Warmest Day of Year**
