STOCKS QUIET FOR WEEK END

Larger Operators Gone, Motor Shares Up

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)
 NEW YORK, June 20.—With many of the large operators away over Sunday, stocks were quiet in the week end session. However, the steadiness of the general list and the entire absence of selling pressure even in special issues, supplies a strong foundation for operations on the constructive side of selective stocks.

Motor shares furnished the largest number of features with General Motors and White particularly strong after lagging behind the rest of their class for some time. New highs in Chicago and Northwestern and Northern Pacific stimulated the rails, while public utilities were enlivened by brisk demand for Montana Power and Light.

The "Hoodoo" had just attacked the detective and was making his escape, and Vernon Clark, in the role of conductor, was pursuing him with a pistol, just as the role requires.

The "Hoodoo" fled and Clark fired four shots—almost point blank at Miss Weisbeck's face, and she could feel paper wads—deadly missiles at such close range—whizzing past her head. She was not hit, but when Clark stopped shooting, her face was smeared with powder.

Indian Y.M.C.A. Officer To be Redmond Speaker

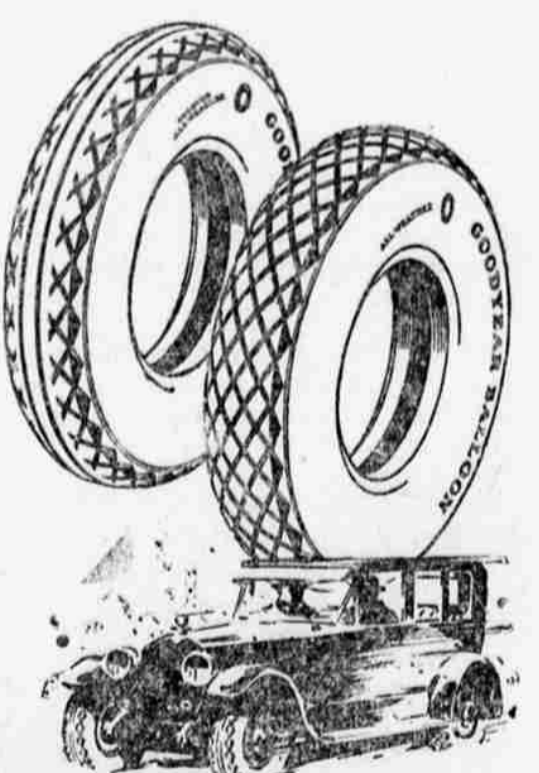
