

HIGH OFFICIALS OF NORTHERN SYSTEMS LIKE BEND AS LOCATION FOR DIVISION

KELSO FACTION JOINED CLOSER AFTER MURDER

Deposed Mayor Brought Back By Tragedy

INVESTIGATE DEATH

Second Government of City May Be Set Up, Intimat- ed—Revolver Is Clue

KELSO, Wash., June 22.—The "Todd faction" in local politics today banded themselves together, pledged to bring justice to the murderer of Thomas Doversy, editor of the Cow-It County News, and "martyr to the cause of civic decency."

Doversy was slain by an unidentified assailant Friday night. He was the tempestuous leader of the faction supporting A. R. Todd, recently deposed mayor.

As a result of the shooting, Todd returned to the city at 4 a. m. today and reopened his political fight. "I have come back to stay and to see this through. I am Kelso's mayor and have notified Nat R. Smith, who is acting as mayor, that it is my intention to take over my position. Appointments of five new members of the city council by Smith is entirely illegal."

Criminologist Retained

Todd indicated he would set up a second government for Kelso, if Smith does not withdraw.

The Todd faction is open in its accusations that Doversy was murdered by political enemies.

"He either offended someone more than he would stand, or else he knew too much and threatened to expose certain persons," Rev. W. W. Switzer, new leader of the Todd crowd, declared today.

Chief hope of solving the crime is placed upon the ability of Luke May, Seattle criminologist and "Sherlock Holmes" of the Pacific northwest. May was the man who bared the facts in the Covell "star murder" at Coquille, Oregon, and other baffling crimes.

He was employed by county authorities and plunged immediately into his task, with about the only definite clue an old fashioned Colt revolver found near the man's body.

Grass and Brush Fire Fought In California

SAN JOSE, Cal., June 22.—A grass and brush fire burning on the Mount Hamilton ridges was being fought today by volunteers after having swept over 1,200 acres since noon Sunday.

Directly in the path of the flames is the Morrow cattle ranch, one of the largest cattle ranges in this part of the state. Ranchers for miles around were joining today in the battle to check the fire before it reaches the Morrow place.

High grass, brought on by late rains, has caused the fire to be of particularly stubborn nature.

The fire, burning over what is known as the Seeby ridge, is 10 miles east of the Lick observatory, on top of the mountain, and there is no present peril to the observatory.

Police Seek Murderer Of U. S. Customs Guard

SAN FRANCISCO, June 22.—Search for two unknown persons who called an ambulance to a downtown apartment house shortly before Albert Anderson, 35, United States customs guard, was found dying, was conducted today as a possible explanation of the crime.

Anderson died in the ambulance en route to the hospital after he had been stabbed and left in an elevator. He did not live in the building and no one has admitted seeing him there previous to the crime.

M. M. Brown, landlord, said a man and a woman passed in the hallway long enough to telephone a hospital for an ambulance and then left hurriedly. He had not seen them before, Brown said.

Three Lives Taken and Enormous Damage Done By Electrical Storms and Cloudburst In Idaho

Flood Rushes Down On Picnickers, Marooning Automobiles—Lightning Strikes Down Policeman As He Telephones—East Also Suffers Disaster

LEWISTON, Idaho, June 22.—Three deaths and damage amounting to hundreds of thousands of dollars were caused by an electrical storm and cloudbursts in Asotin county, Wash., last night, according to reports received here today.

Dwain and Leota Morrow, children, were drowned while picnicking on Asotin creek near Clarkston, Wash.

A sudden flood of water swept down the stream and marooned 15 automobiles.

William Dwyer, special policeman, was found dead in the office of Duthill and company. One hand was on the telephone receiver and it was believed his death was caused by a shock from the electrical storm.

Power and communications were down in some localities.

COOLER WEEK SEEN ON WESTERN COAST

Slightly cooler weather was to store for the Pacific northwest today, following the torrid week end in which the temperature mounted to 100 degrees in several places.

Walla Walla, Wash., and vicinity recorded an official temperature of 100 degrees; Medford, Ore., 98; Roseburg, Ore., 88; and Pendleton, Ore., 90.

The weather bureau predicted it would be slightly cloudy in places, but that it would remain generally warm.

The week end claimed several lives in the Pacific northwest among bathers and motorists who were attempting to escape from the heat.

PACIFIC CITY, Ore., June 22.—The body of H. L. Anderson, 49, who lost his life while bathing in the ocean here Sunday, has been shipped to McMinnville, Ore. It was not determined whether he drowned or succumbed to heart failure in the cold water.

Many of Mill Workers Plan to Attend Picnic

Several hundred employees of the Brooks-Seaton Lumber Co. will spend the Fourth of July week end at the Cascade resort near McKenzie bridge, on the west side of the Cascades. It is the opinion of members of the outing committee who are securing the names of motorists who will make the trip. Ninety-two machines, each to carry a load of people, have been signed up already.

First planned for only members of the Brooks-Seaton baseball team, the outing has grown to such proportions that it has been necessary to place the plans for the visit to the Cascade resort in the hands of a committee of six. Members of this committee are George Gove, Horace Richards, Paul Hosmer, S. A. Blakey, Al Curtis, J. E. Smith and C. P. Wandichek.

A feature of the outing, being arranged for by employees of the Brooks-Seaton Lumber Co., will be two ball games between the Bend players and the resort players. One game will be played on July 4 and the other on July 5. The majority of the mill employees will leave for the McKenzie on the morning of July 4, camping out that night at or near the resort. A free dance will be given by the mill management.

MacMillan Expedition Will Stop At Sydney

MONEGAN ISLAND, Me., June 22.—The MacMillan Arctic expedition will complete the first leg of its long voyage into the far north Thursday when it is due at Sydney, N. S.

With the Peary, which sailed several hours before the Bowdoin, in the lead, the expedition today is steaming up the coast of Maine, after having been given a rousing send-off by the villagers and summer residents of this little island outpost.

The Peary and the Bowdoin, Commander Donald B. MacMillan's flagship, will meet in Sydney harbor where coal will be taken aboard Thursday.

MacMillan left here Sunday night without commenting on the international controversy which might be engendered by the discovery of the new continent which he hopes to find.

CHINESE STRIKE MEANT AGAINST AMERICANS TOO

Foreign Population In Canton Leaves

FUND TO GIVE HELP

Celestials In Frisco Raise Money to Assist Upris- ing Across Pacific

WASHINGTON, June 22.—Americans are included with British and Japanese in a general boycott and strike by Chinese in Canton, Consul Douglas Jenkins at Canton informed the state department today.

Two-thirds of the American women and children residents of Canton have left for Hongkong and other safe places, the message, dated 11 a. m., yesterday, said.

The strike, which went into effect yesterday morning, was the first instance during recent disturbances which Americans were boycotted.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 22.—The \$10,000 raised among residents of Chinatown here, is being cabled to the Shanghai chamber of commerce for strike relief, the Chinese newspaper Chung Shai Yat Po told the United Press today. Money raising efforts are being continued, it was asserted.

Japanese Complicate

The Chinese newspaper said that Shanghai advisers declared the situation there has been further complicated by the killing of a Chinese by Japanese on June 20.

The same source said that all English steamers between Hongkong and Canton have been tied up by the strikes, although Chinese boats still are making regular trips.

The Chinese Times told the United Press that the British authorities in Hongkong have posted rewards for the arrest of agitators, following the latest strike which has tied up all the street cars.

Canton advices to the Times said two Japanese had been attacked. One died and the other is dying. The cause of the attacks was not known. It was reported.

GIRL IS SENTENCED FOR KILLING GUEST

Seventeen Year Old May Spend Fifteen In Prison

NEW YORK, June 22.—Dorothy Perkins, 17 year old Greenwich village girl, convicted of manslaughter after killing a guest at her birthday party last February, today was sentenced to from five to 15 years in prison.

Dorothy came into court accompanied by her lawyers and three guards and sat quietly, waiting for sentence to be passed.

She listened intently while a plea for delay was made and vehemently rejected by the judge.

Finally the moment for sentence was reached. She stood firmly and listened to the pronouncement, which was accompanied by a 15 minute lecture on her case from the bench.

Then, shaken but still in control of her emotions, she was led back to jail by her three guards.

Fumes In Factory Blaze Overcome Fire Fighters

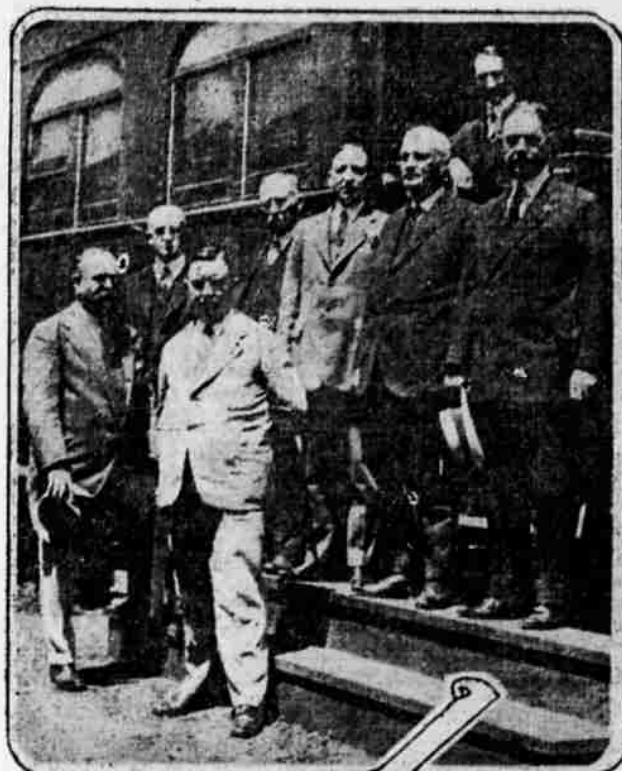
Total loss was approximately \$100,000. No one learned how the fire started.

One of the bottles Agnew succeeded in breaking, but the police seized the other one and later, searching Agnew's home at 345 West 12th street, found two gallon jugs full of whiskey and another half full.

Agnew pleaded guilty in Recorder Louis Bennett's court this morning, to a charge of liquor possession, and was fined \$500 and sentenced to spend 30 days in jail. He had not paid the fine up to this afternoon.

PROFFER OF SITE FORMALLY MADE TO EXECUTIVES

Rail Chiefs Meet Here Then Head North

TIMBER IS INSPECTED

Louis Hill Tract Is Visited With Mill Official's Ac- companying Party

Bend, nearly at the half way point between Klamath Falls and Fallbridge, is advantageously located for a division point, in the opinion of officials of the northern lines, it became known Sunday afternoon when an offer of a free terminal and trackage site was made by Mayor R. H. Fox, representing the city council.

The offer of the site for shops and trackage was made in connection with the visit to Bend of the most imposing array of rail officials ever to assemble in Central Oregon. Great Northern rail chiefs, coming here from Klamath Falls Sunday afternoon, joined in Bend the head officials of the Northern Pacific, who arrived here Sunday morning on a special train of nine cars from Portland.

Accompanying the two groups of rail chiefs who met in Bend were Ralph Budd, president of the Great Northern, and Charles Donnelly, president of the Northern Pacific. Both parties were accompanied by eastern directors of the northern lines, the majority of them being New York capitalists. The special train carried the combined party to the main line last night, leaving Bend at 5:45.

L. C. C. Action Awaited

Although the tract of land for the proposed terminal met with the favor of the group of officials who inspected the site, it was evident from remarks made by members of the party that no action will be taken until the interstate commerce commission gives the Oregon Trunk permission to extend its line south to Klamath Falls, and ultimately into California. The tract of land offered to the Oregon Trunk is the site originally secured by the city for the proposed Strahorn terminal.

Shortly after the arrival of Budd and his party on the special train here at 9:35 Sunday morning, the Great Northern chiefs left in three automobiles for the Sisters country, where the Hill timber is located, adjoining that of the Brooks-Seaton holdings. A request that automobiles be secured for this trip was made by Louis W. Hill, chairman of the board of directors of the Great Northern railroad, immediately after the arrival of the special train here. Harry K. Brooks, general manager of the Brooks-Seaton Lumber Co. in Bend, accompanied the officials of the Northern lines to the Hill holdings.

"Peaceful Penetration"

Leaving Klamath Falls at 9:23 o'clock Sunday morning, the Northern Pacific officials, headed by Donnelly, arrived here shortly before 5:30 yesterday evening. The two parties met at the station, where the special train was awaiting them. With the Great Northern chiefs, the Northern Pacific party immediately boarded the train, leaving for Seattle and Spokane. Donnelly, who addressed a meeting in Klamath Falls Saturday night at the White Pelican hotel, and his party made the trip from the south to Bend in five automobiles.

The visit of the Great Northern officials to the timber in the Sisters and Metolius districts Sunday is believed to have been for the purpose of giving the eastern directors of the line some idea as to the potential tonnage of the upper Deschutes basin. Likewise, the directors of the Northern Pacific on their trip from Klamath Falls to Bend Sunday obtained much first hand information rela-

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
