Speaker Asks for Earthly Immortality

Congressmen Join With the State Officials in Paying Unusual Tribute

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin) MADISON, Wis., June 22.—Under an oak tree out on a slope commanding a blue Wisconsin lake, Robert M. La Follette was buried today among the memories of his childhood.

With reverent simplicity, the body was taken this afternoon from the state house down through a two mile lane of silent thousands and returned to the dust from which it sprang.

MADISON, Wis., June 22.—Dignitaries of the state and nation paid honor to Robert M. La Follette in a modest funeral ceremony today in the rotunda of the state house, where for six years he served as governor. Senators and congressmen from Washington, the entire house and senate of Wisconsin, the state supreme court and all state officials gathered before the bier to hear the eulogy of La Follette's old friend, Dr. A. E. Hayden, who told them to devote their lives to perpetuation of his ideals.

"The future democracy of which he dreamed is still to win," Dr. Hayden said. "He has built himself into the life of America and into the structure of the world.

"But we must give him an earthly immortality in our lives. To be true to the vision as he was true, until every individual shall have a full and free opportunity for a satisfying life—this will be to re-

membre him truly. And here in his presence still, we may dedicate ourselves to that task.

Fears New Tyranny
"In this new age of industry and science, mankind the world over faces a new tyranny of economic power, lacking the saving graces and refining culture of the aristocracies of old. Confronted with the tragedies of soulless material civilization, Robert Marion La Follette had endeavored himself to the principle that government is the guardian and servant of the life of all the people. To the ideal that state craft should be an intelligent instrument for social amelioration.

"About him are entwined the hopes of millions—of the intellectuals of the youth, of the workers. Our leader has fallen. We are gathered to say farewell, but Robert Marion La Follette we will always remember."

Try to Prove Epidemic In Shepherd's Defense

CHICAGO, June 22.—Through the defense testimony of Dr. Herman N. Bundesen, the Chicago health commissioner, attorneys defending William D. Shepherd, against charges that he murdered Billy McClintock, this afternoon attempted to show that Billy contracted typhoid fever during a typhoid epidemic.

"There was an epidemic of typhoid fever in Chicago last November and December," Dr. Bundesen testified. "McClintock became ill in November and died in December.

"Our investigation showed it was caused by raw oysters—blue points on half shell," Dr. Bundesen said.

According to previous testimony, Billy McClintock ate raw oysters at a hotel early in November—about two weeks before he became ill.

SANDY FIRE CAUSE UNKNOWN

tive to the country which is to be tapped by the Oregon Trunk extension. This extension was referred to by the rail officials as "a peaceful penetration, not an invasion."

Many in Party
"Intention of the northern lines to extend their rails from Bend to Klamath Falls is not an invasion because the Southern Pacific and the northern lines made a joint survey over the same route in 1910," Budd said in referring to this extension on the eve of his departure to Bend from Portland. "It just happens that the Southern Pacific was the first to move in the construction and now that company wishes it to appear that we are trying to steal their territory. We belong there just as the Southern Pacific."

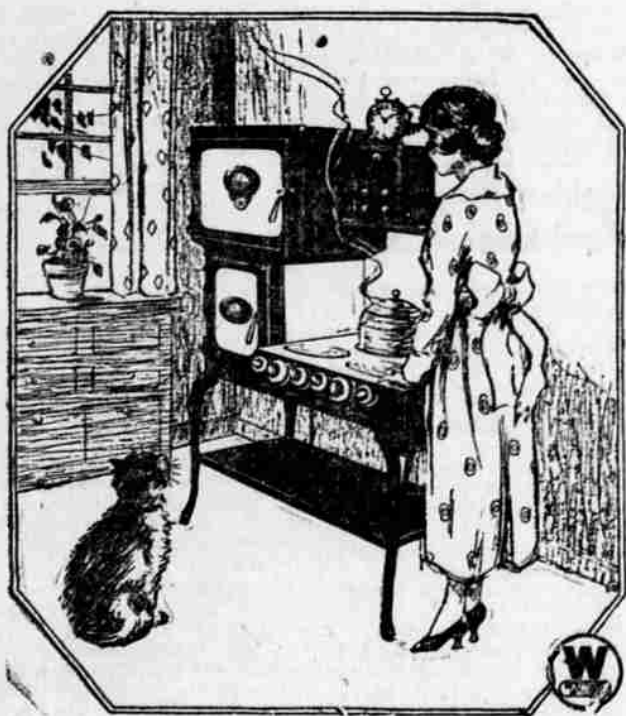

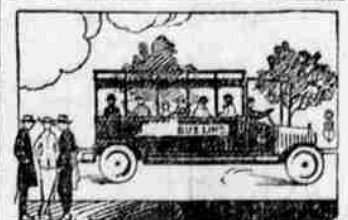
COUNTY IS SWEEP BY HEAVY STORMS

Hail and Rain Follow Electrical Display

Accompanied by a heavy wind, hail and rain, an electric storm swept over the country southeast and east of Bend Sunday afternoon, according to reports being received here today. The storm passed to the northeast, toward the Mitchell country, resulting in a heavy rain in the south part of Deschutes county and Crook county.

Bend anglers who were at East lake Sunday report that the storm broke over the Paulinas with the intensity of a cloudburst, soaking the fishermen before they could seek shelter. Considerable hail fell over the Paulina mountains and in the vicinity of Powell Butte, it is reported.

Although only a trace of rain fell in Bend, that part of The Dalles-California highway south of Lava butte was covered with water in places, motorists report. The road north of the butte was dusty. The Alfalfa community also came in for
