STOCK LEADERS UNDER ATTACK

Increase In Brokerage Loans Frightens

(Wall Street Journal Financial Review)

NEW YORK, June 23.—Industrial stocks were forced to absorb substantial offerings in today's session owing to apprehension in the market of over \$100,000,000 in brokerage loans in the last month. This expansion was looked upon in professional circles as an indication that an over extension of some conservative lines existed and leading stocks were attacked with the idea of forcing liquidation of part of these holdings.

Good sized recessions were brought about in General Electric, Mack Truck, Steel, Baldwin, American Locomotive and other pivotal industrial. But the decline in these issues appeared to result from any bears' selling rather than from any important liquidation for trading showed a tendency to dry up the moment the crowd working for the decline allowed their aggressiveness to relax.

Wheat Runs Strongers Other Cereals Slump

CHICAGO, June 23.—Wheat finished sharply higher on the Chicago board of trade today. Strength in the leading cereal checked an inevitable slump in coarse grains.

Strengthening factors in the local wheat pit came from outside markets.

The sluggish corn market was due to the better crop outlook. Heaviness in spot suggested disappointment over the slow absorption of visible stocks.

Oats were relatively steady. Holders sold because of lack of aggressive interest.

Provisions were subjected to heavy selling by leading bulls, despite higher hogs and calves.

DEATH URGED FOR SHEPHERD

Arguments Start When Evidence Ends

Jury to Decide Penalty As Well As Guilt or Innocence of Defendant

CRIMINAL COURT, Chicago, June 23.—The state of Illinois today demanded the death penalty for William Darling Shepherd, who is accused of murdering Billy McClintock.

George E. Gorman, first assistant state's attorney, started the state's argument for conviction as soon as the defense completed its case with the testimony of Shepherd himself.

"You gentlemen of the jury are to decide whether or not William Darling Shepherd murdered Billy McClintock.

"Under the law of our state, you gentlemen are to decide the penalty—whether it be 14 years in the penitentiary, life sentence or death on the gallows.

"In this case the murder was so brutal that the state demands of you gentlemen that you find the defendant guilty and sentence him to the extreme penalty—death on the gallows."

CRIMINAL COURT, Chicago, June 23.

William Darling Shepherd today took the witness stand to deny charges that he killed his millionaire ward, Billy McClintock. His face was drawn and his broad shoulders sagged. But his eyes beamed with pleasant anticipation of "complete vindication" as he walked to the witness stand, high above the crowded court room.

Denies Crime

A hush fell over the court. The crowd sensed the drama of Shepherd's appearance. Shepherd's right hand was firm as he raised it to take the oath and pledged himself to "tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth."

Shepherd entered a "complete and positive denial that he murdered Billy.

"You are an inmate of the county jail charged with the murder of William Nelson McClintock," Stewart said. "Did you murder William Nelson McClintock?"

"I did not," Shepherd replied, the words coming out in sharp accents.

"The indictment further charges that you murdered William Nelson McClintock by inoculating him with typhoid germs. Did you do this?"

"I did not."

The words came loud, clear and positive.

"The indictment further charges you poisoned William Nelson McClintock by means unknown to the grand jury. Is this true?"

"It is not."

Shepherd then entered equally positive denial that he had ever seen "Dr." Charles C. Falman, the suave young president of the "National University of Sciences," who shared complicity in the alleged murder plot by giving Shepherd three tubes of typhoid germs with which to inoculate young McClintock.
