

Stories Of Fight Gambling Ring Under Investigation

INSIDE SOUGHT FROM MANAGER

Kaplan Won When Not Supposed to, Claim

NEW YORK, June 24.—Stories, long in circulation, that a powerful gambling ring has been buying officials and fixing fights in New York, are being investigated quietly by the New York boxing commission.

The rumors gained ground when Benny Montelth, manager of Kid Kaplan, featherweight champion, was suspended until he can prove that boxing is not all on the square in New York or retract his charge that it is not safe for a champion to fight in New York.

He is said to have told the commission that the fight during the featherweight elimination tournament between Kaplan and Danny Kramer was "in the bag" for Kramer and that Kaplan crossed all the smart money in New York by knocking out the favorite.

The commission suspended him until he presents proof of his charges. Benny Leonard said several years ago that he did not like to defend his light-weight championship in New York, and Mickey Walker admitted he disliked to risk his welterweight championship here.

The commission has been looking for someone familiar with the game upon whom the evidence could be applied. Montelth was the first one to come right out with a bare and open charge, and the commission went after him.

If Montelth talks, there may be interesting developments.
