HELPING END FOREST FIRES

After an effort covering several years the great tobacco companies of the country have been persuaded to enclose in their cigarette packages warnings to smokers of the dangers of setting forest fires by the careless handling of matches and cigarettes in the woods. It is difficult to understand why there has been any unwillingness to do this. That, however, is no longer a matter of importance. The companies have now agreed and are putting out the notices. Cigarette smokers, we are told, find in each package they buy a neatly printed slip urging caution while in the woods.

It is hard to estimate the publicity value of this action. Internal revenue records indicate a tremendous increase in the annual consumption of cigarettes, meaning, of course, that more people are using them than ever before. A great number is therefore having the warning placed before them almost daily.

It would be a mistake to suppose that because a long effort has been made to secure this action or because there is satisfaction in reaching so many people the cigarette is believed to be the chief offender in causing forest fires. There are many other causes. The cigarette is merely one of the contributors to the annual total of man caused forest loss and the notice in the package is one way of dealing with it.

Speed the day when there will be no need of any such warning.

moved to the Cascades will be counted and routed by Deschutes forest officials, since the flocks will be taken to the summit country through the Deschutes forest.

Range in the Cascades will in all probability be better this season than in many years, although snow still covers some of the higher country, according to reports. Many of the sheepmen will find it necessary to trail their flocks to the western slope of the Cascades over the summit snow. The Central Oregon Cascade sheep range extends from Mount Hood on the north to Crater lake on the south.
