Foreign Trouble Bad Say Chinese Advices

Naval Protection At Amoy Is Requested

Student Agitators Continue Active Although Strike Not Yet General One

(U. P. Leased Wire to The Bend Bulletin)
 WASHINGTON, June 24.—American Consul Leroy Webber at Amoy, China, called the state department today that the anti-foreign situation there had assumed a "graver aspect as a result of the insistence of unruly elements to demonstrate on Kungang," the foreign settlement at Amoy.

The Amoy municipal council had requested naval protection for the international settlement, since the Chinese authorities informed the consular body that they could not guarantee protection of life and property in the settlement.

The Amoy consul announced that the settlement police were insufficient to protect foreigners and property there.

A boycott with a possible general strike appears inevitable and probably will take place Thursday, Webber said.

"Student and other agitators are active," the message said.

"A boycott has already commenced at interior points.

"All of the 100 Americans at Chang Chow are safe and well," General Chang has advised American authorities in China.

Chang is expected to give protection to the Americans if necessary for their safety.

The state department also received a cablegram from Consul Carlston at Hongkong dated Monday, stating that the strike which started last Saturday had not become general.
