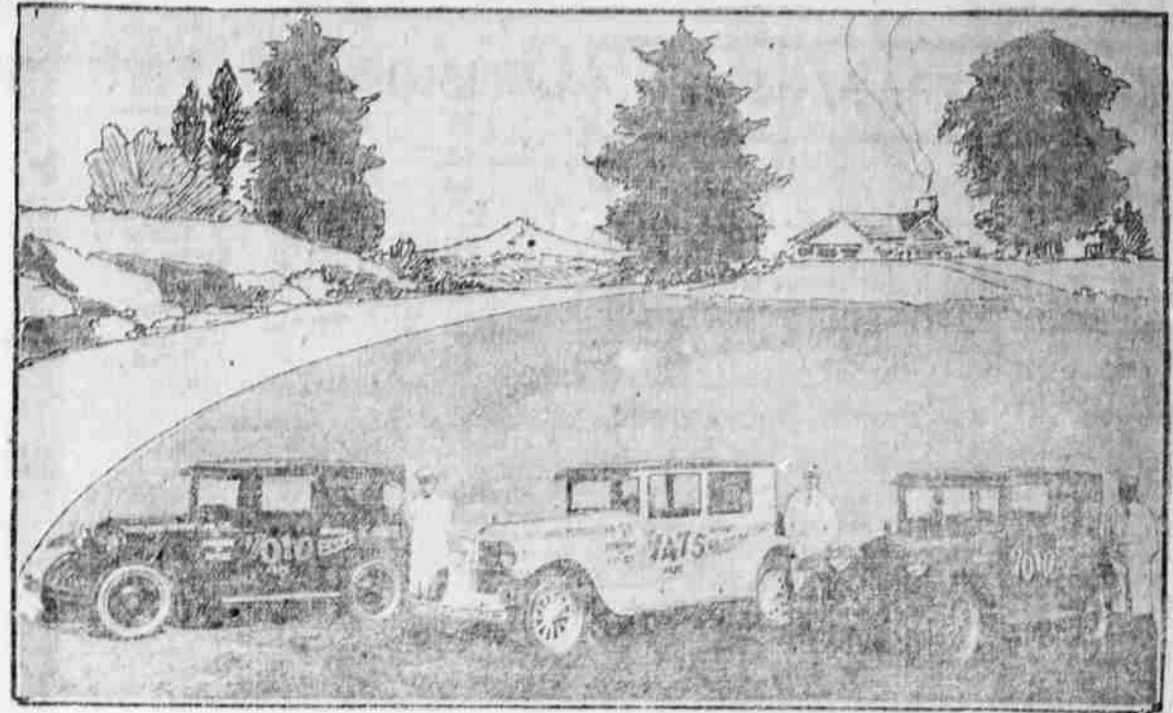

OSLO, June 24.—Captain Roald Amundsen, arctic air explorer, plans

to arrive at Horten, Norway, on a coal steamer on July 4.

He intends to write a book covering his flight almost to the pole. This will appear in the autumn, and thereafter he plans to lecture at home and abroad.
